Examination For U. S. Jobs Slated
The U. S. civil service commission has just announced that an examination will be held in Eugene for storekeepers and gaugers. Applications will be accepted until the close of business May 1.

The duties of storekeepers-gaugers are to check and supervise the gauging, testing, and branding of wines, liquors and other spirits, to have custody of keys to safeguard the same in bonded and tax paid warehouses, bottling houses, etc., to make reports on same, and to perform similar duties.

A salary of \$2000 to \$2500 a year is paid. Those between 23 and 66 at the close of business May 1, who are U. S. citizens, are eligible. Age limits do not apply to those entitled to preference because of military or naval service.

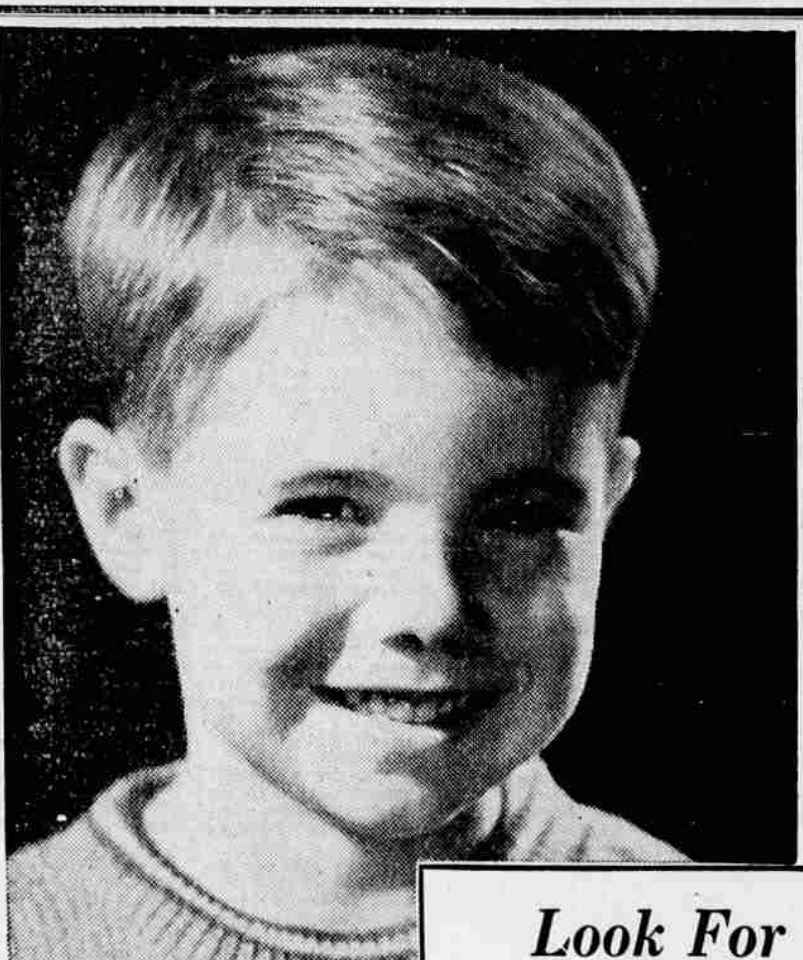
