HOOVER FRIEND LISTED
WASHINGTON, April 16.—(AP)—Mark A. Regan, republican national committeeman from California, and described as "close friend and adviser" of former President Hoover, was pictured in the senate air mail investigating committee today as having volunteered to use his Washington influence in 1931 in the interest of an aviation company controlled by E. L. Cord.

Chairman Black (D., Ala.), read into the record a telegram from Lyndal L. Young, an officer of Century Air Lines, to L. B. Manning of the Cord Corporation, dated in September, 1931, which said Young knew Regan personally and believed "his influence with the Hoover administration can be used to our advantage."

Young said further:

"Have talked to Regan with reference to air mail situation and he is willing to help us in Washington if we desire."

The Cord company, it was shown in other correspondence, was seeking to have air mail routes thrown open for competitive bidding and was not trying to make a deal for any contract.

Previously Black had turned down the request of Senator Austin (R., Va.), to summon the stenographer who sat in on the interview between Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and Carl Ristine, special assistant attorney general, while the famed flier was here several weeks ago.

Reports got about that Lindbergh had been "grilled." Ristine denied them.

Black indicated, however, he would put up to the committee later whether to summon the stenographer.

Pickled Onion Dressing
Mix together:
4 tablespoons of Wesson oil
2 tablespoons of vinegar
1 teaspoon of salt
1/4 teaspoon of pepper
Dash of paprika

Then add 1/2 teaspoon of dry mustard and 2 tablespoons of pickled onions chopped fine. This dressing is for a salmon salad in tomatoes which consists of large red tomatoes stuffed with canned salmon that has been marinated and mixed with diced celery and whites of boiled eggs minced. The yolks are minced and sprinkled over the top of the salad.—Mrs. F. C. Swindall, 1975 Emerald St., Eugene.

Cooked Salad Dressing
Mix together 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, sprinkle pepper, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 6 teaspoons cornstarch, and stir into 4 egg yolks, well beaten and add 1/4 cup cream (or condensed milk). Boil 3-4 pint vinegar to which 1/2 cup butter has been added. Pour over first mixture and boil in double boiler until thick. Store in pint jar. Will keep indefinitely.

This is quite concentrated so it is well to mix it with milk, cream, fruit juice or French dressing for your various salads. This is splendid either as a topping for salads or to mix in with bowl salads.—Corinne Carpenter, 1143 Oak St., C-2, Eugene.

An Easy, Fool-Proof Mayonnaise
To 1 egg, add 1/4 t. mustard, 1/4 t. salt, bit of paprika, 1 t. sugar, few grains of cayenne, 1 T. lemon juice or vinegar. Beat with rotary beater, add salad oil a little at a time at first, beating after each addition, then add more oil each time. About one cup oil or more is used in all. When mayonnaise is stiff as desired stop adding oil but beat until well blended. The cheapest salad oil makes delicious mayonnaise with this recipe.

There are many variations to this recipe—1/4 c. maraschino cherries—for fruit salad.

To 1 cup mayonnaise add 2 T. chopped pickles, 1 t. chopped onions, 1 t. parsley and 1 t. chopped capers.

To 1 cup mayonnaise add 2 T. chopped olives and 2 T. chopped pickles.

To 1 cup mayonnaise add chopped together a large stalk celery and 1/2 a green pepper.

For a sweet fruit dressing add 3 T. powdered sugar, 1/2 c. whipped cream, to 1 cup mayonnaise and beat until fluffy.—Mrs. A. L. Klimas, Rte. 2, Eugene.

bids. This statement, combined with reports that retail prices were lower in Washington and California cities than in Oregon, resulted in the unanimous action of the board to seek some means to reduce the "excessive charges."

Bids Are Sought

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, some time ago declared he was studying the action of Washington in its attempt to lower retail prices by suit against the oil companies now pending in the supreme court at Olympia, and that he hoped to bring similar action in Oregon through legislative recommendations. Governor Julius L. Meier, in the meantime had taken up the gasoline price situation with Senator Charles L. McNary, he announced yesterday.

What reaction would result from the state's move to purchase gasoline outside the state and bringing it to Oregon for its own use could not be ascertained, but it was hoped oil companies would enter in competitive bids for the new contracts next month and that this action would be reflected in commercial prices.

The state the past year purchased gasoline in bulk, delivery at Portland, at 13 cents a gallon, including the state tax, while three cents additional was charged for service station purchases. In other parts of the state the freight charges from Portland were added. It was reported however that gasoline firms holding contracts with Oregon sold to other states under this price. The retail price of gasoline at Salem was 22 1/4 cents for the standard structure fuel.

"only the Kerensky of this revolution." The schoolmaster, with Counsel James A. Reed by his side, sat silent while some laughter in the large audience greeted the testimony. Once in a while there was applause for the witnesses.

Miss Alice Barrows, hostess for the dinner, Miss Hildegard Kneeland and Miss Mary Taylor—all government workers—challenged assertions by Wirt about them.

Early Reports Due
Then Laurence Todd—Soviet news agency reporter here—said he had called the president "a strong leader" rather than "only a Kerensky." Todd called the dinner "a most wearying experience."

The two remaining diners were Robert W. Bruere, chairman of the textile code advisory committee, and David C. Coyle, of the public works administration.

Expectations were for an early committee report finding the Wirt allegations unjustified. Republicans, however, were pressing to broaden the inquiry, with the democratic majority voting down their requests to call various administration officers.

French Cabinet Reverses Policy, Trotsky Must Go

PARIS, April 17.—(AP)—Leon Trotsky, exiled Russian revolutionist, was ordered to leave France by the government today because of his efforts to organize a world revolution.

Minister of the Interior Albert Sarraut announced the cabinet decided to withdraw the permission granted Trotsky to live in France because he "violated the political neutrality" which was made a condition of his stay at Harbizon.

Trotsky has been living in a secluded villa near Harbizon, about 35 miles from Paris, since granted secret permission by the ministry of the interior when he came to France from Corsica last July.

A nationwide clamor of protest for Trotsky's expulsion arose immediately after the public announcement of his mysterious Harbizon exile.
