

OREGON STUDENTS PLAN RAZZ FUNDS FOR R. NEUBERGER

his sophomore year with the strong support of the athletic faction which felt that he would be ideal for their purposes due to past services as correspondent of The Oregonian on sports.

Campaigns Irv Opponents
Neuberger provoked anything but a docile editor, however, and before the end of his term as editor he was estranged from the athletic group because of his opposition to some of the policies of Coach "Pink" Callison who succeeded the famous "Doc" Spears. Neuberger's close friendship with Spears was blamed for this breach.

Toward the end of his term as editor, Neuberger began a strenuous campaign to lower student costs and was many times "on the carpet" before administrative officers, but survived movements to oust him from the editorship.

Optional Fees Won
During the present school year, came a movement to lower the fees which support student activities (\$5 a term, \$15 a school year). Failing action by the board the attorney general was asked to make a ruling as to whether these fees should be compulsory. The attorney general ruled the board has power to collect fees only for activities which can be classed as "educational."

As a result beginning with the spring term, student activity fees have been optional, and despite strenuous efforts at collection only about 60 per cent of the students have paid up. Special committees to investigate the situation and revise the system, though expressing its belief that the activities are in fact educational and that fees should be compulsory.

Though many of the students now in the lower-fee faction say that the movement has grown beyond Neuberger's leadership, Neuberger has been so closely identified with it that he has been blamed generally for the results.

Candidates Named
Two political parties were active before, during and after the nominating assembly, and both had complete tickets drawn up. No candidates other than those on the tickets were nominated.

The candidates named are:
Those nominated for president were, Malcolm Bauer, of Pendleton, and Joe Renner of Eugene. For vice-president, William Berg, Eugene, and Norman Laurits, British Columbia. For secretary, Gail McCredie, Portland, and Nancy Archbold, also of Portland.

For senior woman Althea Peterson, Eugene, and Elizabeth Bendstrup, Astoria. Robert Miller of Astoria and Erwin (Biff) Nilsson of Milwaukee were nominated for the position of senior man, and Cosgrove Labarre, Portland, and Howard Patterson of Portland for junior finance man.

The Neuberger resolution follows: WHEREAS, for the past two years, two and one-half terms we have had among us a man whose activities have been largely connected with causes of student welfare administrative policies of the University of Oregon, and educational programs of the State Board of Higher Education, and WHEREAS, student opinion seems to favor recognition of these aforementioned activities, and

WHEREAS, since entering the University of Oregon, this man has been one of the most active students on the campus, and one who with complete conviction that his causes were always right despite overwhelming opinion against him has continually been the champion of his own efforts to bring all possible change to a system of student self-government that through thirty years of progressive evolution has kept constant pace with the times and has proved satisfactory to approximately 99.44 percent of those students paying for its benefits, and

WHEREAS, of his own free will this man has expressed a desire to attend a distant eastern school, and WHEREAS, we believe that such distant eastern school might possibly better profit from the attendance of this person than has the University, and

WHEREAS, we students of Oregon are willing to make a sacrifice to see this plan carried through, feeling that the University of Oregon would derive more benefit from his activities if carried on at some distant school, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: We, the individual students of the University of Oregon, wish to contribute to a scholarship fund to aid Richard L. Neuberger to enroll in some such distant eastern college or university at his earliest convenience, and

Below is another group of salad dressing recipes from last week's forum:

No Egg Mayonnaise

2 T evaporated milk.
1/2 t salt.
1/2 cup oil.
1 T lemon juice.
Dash paprika.
Put salt and paprika in bowl, add milk, mix thoroughly; add oil slowly, stir constantly; add lemon juice. Use while fresh. Will keep only short time.—Heryl Deford, 1272 Williams-ette, Eugene.

Boiled Salad Dressing

2 tablespoons sugar.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon mustard.
1-3 cup butter.
1 egg.
1-3 cup vinegar.
Put sugar, salt, mustard, and vinegar in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Let boil for 10 or 15 minutes if preferred. Beat egg in separate dish. Pull saucepan to back of stove and let cool. Stir egg into boiled mixture then let boil slowly until mixture starts to thicken. Remove from stove and add butter. Stir rapidly. If a

quantity of this is made at one time simply add enough sweet cream to suit taste. This is excellent for any kind of salad.—Mrs. A. L. Kloak, box 159, Wendling.

Salad Dressing

3 medium eggs.
1 level teaspoon salt.
1 level teaspoon pepper.
1 level teaspoon mustard.
1 level teaspoon sugar.
1/2 cup vinegar.
1/2 cup thick cream, sweet or sour.
Break eggs in saucepan and beat thoroughly. Add salt, pepper, mustard, sugar and vinegar, and cook until it thickens. When cool, stir in cream. This dressing is good for any kind of salad and is so quickly made it can always be had fresh.—Mrs. W. J. Garner, Yoncalla.

Boiled Salad Dressing

Yolks of 6 eggs.
3-4 cup of vinegar.
1/2 teaspoon of mustard.
1/2 teaspoon of salt.
1 tablespoon of sugar.
1 teaspoon of flour.
Butter size of a walnut.
Several dashes of both red and black pepper.
Beat yolks until very light; pour in slowly the vinegar. Add the rest of the ingredients. Beat all well together, put in double boiler and cook until thick like custard. Put away in glass jar. When needed, thin with rich cream, whipped if possible.

This is a good recipe to use yolks after baking white cakes, etc. By adding more mustard, 2 or 3 teaspoons, it makes a very good mustard for meats.—Mrs. H. J. Lister, Harrisburg.

Mineral Oil Mayonnaise

(For reducing diets)
"Vary the dressing and you vary the salad you know."
1 egg yolk (slightly beaten), 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/4 teaspoon red pepper, 1 cup mineral oil. Stir egg yolk, salt, dry mustard, red pepper, and 1 tablespoon lemon juice until well mixed. Beat in oil, slowly at first, until 1/4 cup is added, using a rotary beater. Then add oil more rapidly. When dressing becomes thick, add remaining lemon juice and proceed with remainder of oil. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.—Mrs. W. R. Armstrong, 1302 Eleventh avenue west, Eugene.

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WEB OF EVIDENCE WOVEN BY STATE IN MANNING CASE

ney's office shortly before the young legislator was killed.

Clothes of the slain man were offered and accepted as exhibits. Already the space before the bench is filled with desks, chairs and bookcases—all scarred by bullets—taken from Manning's office.

The sheriff identified a bottle removed from Horan's car where it was found parked on a side street the night he was shot. Low said he believed it contained whiskey.

Low examined and identified articles taken from the office by Dr. O. E. Heinrich, criminologist, and brought back to Klamath Falls Monday from Berkeley. Heinrich took charge of the state investigation shortly after the slaying.

Miss Guthrie's part in the case was brief. She identified two cards found near the body.

"I called but you were out," the cards said.

They were addressed to Horan and were dated in January. The stenographer said they referred to some work she planned to do for Horan's firm.

Dr. Rugh described in detail the course of two bullet wounds. He told the state the force of the shots were sufficient to "knock a man out."

Later the physician, upon cross examination by the defense, said he believed it possible for a man to have muscular control of his body briefly after a shot passed through his heart.

One bullet, he said, had coursed through Horan's heart.

Rugh told Deputy District Attorney Van Vactor that no liquor was found in Horan's stomach. On cross examination he related to the defense that it might be impossible to trace liquor more than fifteen minutes to a half hour after it was consumed.

Horan Called Inmate
The notepaper of court reporters were filled today with testimony and identification of exhibits. The story was piling up rapidly and the spectators awaited eagerly the first move to link the evidence.

Yesterday afternoon Bert Finch, a county engineer, identified a chart he had made of the Manning office.

Rex McMillan, deputy sheriff, described his visit to the office after Manning called the jail and informed him of a scuffle for guns and the death of Horan in a duel.

Walter Walker, state policeman, was the third witness yesterday. He related his part in the investigation last February.

This statement of Walker's was taken with considerable interest by the courtroom.

"I have befriended many young lawyers in this county. Ralph Horan is the only inmate among them."

The officer attributed it to Manning as the attorney left the death office for the county jail.

Springfield SERA Men Grouped With Eugene Laborers

Springfield has been designated by the state SERA headquarters as a part of the Eugene industrial area and men in that city employed on SERA projects will be paid cash instead of groceries as in the case of the rural workers.

The order placing Springfield in the Eugene area was received Thursday by Tom Sheridan, placement officer here. He announced that workers in that city are now being enrolled on the same basis as those in Eugene.

No order has been received up to Thursday afternoon by Earl M. Drew, county manager of the SERA activities, as to when work will be resumed on the Eugene airport or any other Lane county projects, started some time ago under the CWA.

instrument of a foreign office "white paper" to make the situation public.

This paper, of the sort that is used to explain the most critical international situations only, disclosed one that brought to many a picture of great gravity.

Aside from French note refusing to continue disarmament negotiations on the present basis and demanding that the world disarmament commission—from which Germany withdrew last October—reassume charge, there was a second note of first rate importance.

This note, hitherto unpublished, was sent by Germany to Great Britain last Monday. It put concretely for the first time the full intent of Germany's military ambitions, demanding that in any "disarmament" agreement Germany be permitted:

1. The right to possess an air force of short range military airplanes, excluding bombers, not to exceed 30 per cent of the combined air forces of all her neighbors, or alternatively 50 per cent of France's, whichever number was less.

2. At the end of five years to enjoy full equality in the air with any nation.
