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to the courthouse and joined those already gathered.

The little girl was abducted yesterday afternoon as she returned home from school by a man who drove up beside her in an automobile, called to her and then sped away when she entered the car.

Two hours later Rosendo Estrada, a small boy, brought to the girl's father, Fernando Robles, member of a wealthy Arizona family, a roughly printed note which demanded \$15,000 before the release of his daughter and warned the father not to report her abduction to authorities.

Father Gives Alarm

Disregarding the threats, Robles called in authorities and word of the girl's kidnapping spread quickly. Ranchers and cowboys quickly offered their services in the search.

Today the Morgan McDermott post of the American Legion was ready to mobilize its members to aid in the far-flung search for the little girl.

Late last night three unnamed men were taken into custody by police after a newsboy said they resembled the trio who offered him \$10 to take a note to June's father. Two of them were released early today. Police said a third, a college student who admitted making the offer to newsboy Leon Castor as a "practical joke," would be held in jail overnight chiefly to "teach him a lesson." No charges were preferred.

With every road in this vicinity watched, authorities today searched every corner of the city with the same determination they showed a few months ago in capturing Dillinger, notorious mid-western desperado, and three of his companions.

WOMAN KIDNAPED, SHOT

PHILADELPHIA, April 26.—(AP)—A woman resident of Washington was shot and critically wounded in suburban Upper Darby early today, police said, after she had been kidnapped from the national capital to prevent her from telling about the gangland murder of a friend.

Police said she was Mary or Elizabeth Fontaine, 31-year-old brunette. She was found clad only in pajamas, lying on the steps of a house and screaming, "I'm dying."

Washington detectives told Darby police they believed she was seized and shot to prevent her from telling what she might know of the killing of George Phillips, an alleged gangster. Phillips was killed in a machine gun battle in Washington 10 days ago. His two companions and the woman are said to have staid police in a wild chase through the streets of the capital.

CHILD RETURNED

MINNEAPOLIS, April 26.—(AP)—Five year old Mary Lou Caroline was found and returned to her Minneapolis home today, less than four hours after she had been forced into an automobile by a strange man.

DEATH PROVIDED

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—A measure to permit the death penalty for interstate kidnappings was approved today by the house judiciary committee.

The bill also provides that failure of the kidnaper to return the victim in 7 days shall be presumed as evidence of his having been transported across a state line.

Minneapolis Doctor Held

Thus Dillinger, the outlaw who escaped a large force of federal agents in a Mercer, Wis., summer resort Sunday night, has been shot twice within six weeks. The desperadoes shot their way to freedom, killing two men and wounding four others.

Dillinger's other wound was sustained March 31 when he and at least two associates blasted their way out of a police and federal trap in a St. Paul apartment. Dillinger was shot in the leg and later attended by Dr. Clayton E. May, Minneapolis physician. May and his nurse are now held on charges of harboring a criminal.

WOMEN'S RECORDS TRACED

ST. PAUL, April 26.—(AP)—Officials today checked reports that John Dillinger had been wounded and was receiving medical care within a few miles of the headquarters of a search for the notorious killer that spread over five states.

Reports persisted that one of the three men seen several times in this vicinity and identified as Dillinger, John Hamilton and Tommy Carroll, was wounded and that the injured man was the leader of the gang of gunmen that has taken 13 lives and \$500,000 in loot since last November.

Meanwhile federal agents directed attention to five women. It was learned that federal agents had identified three young women captured after a series of gun battles Monday near Eagle River, Wis., in which two men were killed. Records of these women were traced in an effort to establish new avenues for the search in which 5,000 men were engaged.

Sweetheart Quizzed

One of the girls, who was arraigned in Madison as Marian Marr, is a sister-in-law of a prominent Chicago labor organizer, it was reported.

Agents here questioned Evelyn Frechette, Dillinger's sweetheart, and investigated an apparently authentic report that Dillinger failed to keep an appointment Tuesday night with a police character here from whom he was to have obtained money to aid his flight from officers.

Scant information on the search was available at federal headquarters.

BRITAIN TO SPEAK

LONDON, April 26.—(AP)—The government intends to make a public declaration of its attitude toward Japan's new Far Eastern policy.

It was understood the declaration would be made Monday, probably in the form of a statement in the house of commons by Sir John Simon, foreign minister.

The foreign office today received from Tokyo a report from its ambassador, Sir Francis Lindsay, on his conversation with Japanese Foreign Minister Koki Hirota yesterday.

It received another report from Sir Ronald Lindsay, ambassador at Washington, of conversations he had at the state department.

Examination of both reports was begun at once in preparation for Simon's definition of the British attitude.
