

Colonial Offers Summerville-Pitts; McDonald Bills Gable In "Men In White"

Comedy, Problem Play Complete Bills At Two Local Picture Houses

Clark Gable and Myrna Loy head the cast of "Men in White," new MGM production which opens today at the McDonald theater. This marks the first time these two popular players have been cast opposite each other.

"Men in White" is based on this season's famous New York stage play of the same name by Sidney Kingsley. It is a story told in vivid strokes of life in a great modern hospital. Medicine men—men in white—are its heroes and its villains. The nobility of a superior profession is extolled in high drama.

Clark Gable, as Dr. Ferguson, a young interne, is ambitious to become a great surgeon like his mentor, Dr. Hochberg (Jean Hersholt). But he is also in love with Laura, a young actress (Myrna Loy). The two, in the demanding business of surgery, do not get together.

A breach is inevitable, and in disappointment Gable enters into a liaison with Barbara, a nurse (Elizabeth Allan). As a result of this Barbara is forced to visit a "quack" for an operation, which results finally in a peritonitis. During Barbara's operation, which is a futile attempt to save her life—at the hands of the man she loves, Gable, with Hersholt's help, performs the operation while Myrna Loy, faint and trembling, stands against as a witness. The play ends on a high, poignant note of promise and retribution.

W. C. Fields, stage and screen comedian, who has been a featured player for many years, has at last brought himself into a starring position. His first starring picture, "You're Telling Me," is double billed with "Men in White" at the McDonald.

Featured with Fields in this Paramount film are Larry "Buster" Crabbe, Joan Marsh and Adrienne Ames. Eric Keaton directed from the screen play by Walter DeLeon and Paul Jess.

The limitless expanse of the Great American Desert forms the setting for the greater part of "Love Birds," the Universal comedy which opens at the Colonial theater today, with Slim Summerville and Zasu Pitts in starring roles.

Much of the action takes place in and around a dilapidated ranch house, El Mirage Rancho which was constructed by studio technical departments a few miles outside of the desert town of Indio, Cal., and here the company spent three weeks in filming scenes. In many scenes the vista extends for miles, with a desolate floor of sand stretching away to the horizon, and not a habitation in sight.

When a subsequent gold rush brings hundreds of eager prospectors flocking to the ranch house, a tent city springs up overnight, with makeshift tented saloons and even a burlesque show to provide entertainment for the miners.

"Love Birds" is double billed with "Broken Dreams," starring Randolph Scott and Martha Sleeper. Buster Phelps is also seen in an important role. Story of a father's love for his boy, and the child's loyalty to both father and stepmother serving as a stepping stone to a more lasting love.
