

ARGUMENTS FOR SALES TAX ARE GIVEN FOR CLUB

Various angles to consider in favor of the sales tax to be voted on in May, were discussed informally by Mr. E. Strain, for many years assessor in Umatilla county and now actively engaged in the sales tax campaign, at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Eugene Kiwanis club, Monday noon at the Osburn hotel.

Mr. Strain is appearing before several groups in Eugene and surrounding points the next few days. As a member of a school board in a small, country school, he said he became interested in the sales tax because of the experience he gleaned with the board in trying to pay teachers and keep up the school bus when there was no money from the regular sources to do it. The state legislature dealt harshly with the country schools; moreover, it has been harsher in its regulations that school must be maintained 180 days or the district loses its share of the county school money, and that teachers must be paid a minimum wage of \$750 or the directors of the district personally look after the difference.

From the limited sources from which the schools are allowed to get only meager sums, Mr. Strain said he knew schools that had been able to secure only \$17 per pupil when they needed \$80.

The sales tax makes a different distribution of the money, since the bulk of it goes where the teachers and the school children are, he said. He hit at the grange and the sales tax opposition several times during his talk. "I regret to say that the opposition has based its arguments on a low level. They appeal to the selfishness of people," he declared.

He scored the grange for not printing any arguments for the sales tax in its Bulletin. "There is extreme danger when any one group set itself up over the electorate," he commented. "This grange is a secret society and is holding a club over its members, he said, adding, "Such activities ought to be curbed before they go too far."

Mr. Strain said he had a piece of property in California on which the taxes had been \$26 until the sales tax was put in effect there when they dropped to \$34.

He cited several charts of figures showing the number of closed schools in the various counties, the number in some counties going as high as 10.

The business men are the goats, he said, declaring he did not want to conceal anything from them. They are made the tax collectors, and must report their cash sales and the business received on their books, as well as collect the tax from the customers. He mentioned names of outstanding business men, who as patriotic leaders were for the sales tax, however.

The sales tax will be a means to make every voter of the state tax conscious was another statement by the speaker.

Ben F. Keeney, veteran Lane county assessor, introduced the speaker. Guests at the luncheon included J. M. Devers, state highway commission attorney and republican candidate in the first district for the nomination for congress, Mayor E. L. Lantz, and Mr. Keeney. Arch A. Bernard made presentation of the pair of men's socks made from rabbit wool from a local industry to Mayor Lantz.

Mr. Devers is to address the club next Monday on the coast bridges while on May 14 a music week program will be put on by George Hopkins and Roy Bryson.

on the cake. Add fruit and nuts. Spread between layers, over top and sides.

If desired for picnic use it is best to divide the icing before adding fruit and nuts, using the fruit and nuts mixture only between layers and plain icing on top and sides, since the fruit has a tendency to make the icing become sticky; hence difficult to carry in a lunch box.

The above recipe is a modernized version of a recipe which has been successfully used in our family for several generations. It is a rich cake and especially liked by the men folk. —Margaret I. Ferguson, 1571 High street, Eugene.

Burnt Leather Cake — Put 1 cup of brown sugar in a granite pan on stove. Stir constantly until it melts; then burn until it throws off smoke. Pour in 1/2 cup of boiling water.

Cake — Beat 1/2 cup of butter, or shortening and 1 1/2 cups of sugar to a cream; add the yolks of 2 eggs well beaten; 1 cup of water, and 2 cups of flour. Beat 5 minutes then add 3 tablespoons full of the caramel syrup, 1 teaspoon of vanilla, and 1/2 cup of flour with 2 teaspoons of baking powder. Then stir in the whites of 3 eggs well beaten. This makes three layers.

Filling — Make a boiled icing of 2 cups of white sugar and the whites of 3 eggs, add 4 tablespoonsful of the caramel syrup and flavor with vanilla. This cake has taken a great many prizes at fairs. —Miss Chloe Robertson, Junction City.

Sunday Special Cake
2 cups sifted cake flour.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.

2-3 cup butter or other shortening.
1 cup sugar.
3 eggs, unbeaten.
1-3 cup milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
Measure sifted flour, add baking powder and salt. Sift together three times. Cream butter. Add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy, add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Add flour alternately with the milk, a small amount at a time. Beat well. Add flavoring, bake in moderate oven 25 to 30 minutes. When cold, put together with whipped cream, thinly sliced oranges and bananas. Cover with same. —Mrs. M. Doney, R. R. Cottage Grove.

Aladdin Layer Cake
2 cups sifted cake flour.
3 teaspoons baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1-2 cups sugar.
1/2 cup butter or shortening.
3 eggs well beaten.
1 1/2 cup sweet milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt and sugar and sift together three times, add butter or shortening, combine eggs, milk and vanilla, and add to flour mixture. Beat vigorously 1 minute. Bake in 8 well greased 8-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375 degrees) 25 minutes. Spread lemon yellow frosting between layers and on top.

Lemon Yellow Frosting — 4 tablespoons butter; 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind; 1 teaspoon frosting tint (yellow); 1 1/2 tablespoon lemon juice; 4 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar; 5 tablespoons water or cream.
Cream together butter and lemon rind. Dissolve tint in small amount lemon juice, add to butter, and blend, add sugar alternately with remaining liquid, beating until frosting is creamy and right consistency to spread. Makes enough frosting to cover top and sides of 3 layer cake. —Mrs. John Putnam, Springfield.

Rich Sponge Cake
1/2 cup Snowdrift.
1 cup sugar.
Rind of 1/2 lemon.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.
3 egg yolks, beaten light.
1 1/2 cups flour.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon soda.
3 egg whites.

Sift the Snowdrift and gradually add sugar, lemon juice and rind and then egg yolks. Sift together dry ingredients and add alternately to first mixture with the egg whites, beating stiff. Transfer to layer pan and bake in moderate oven 25 or 30 minutes. The layers will have a delicious crust, similar to that of lady fingers, and it is not absolutely necessary to ice them. But is very delicious served with whipped cream between layers and on top. —Mrs. Atwood Foster, 1031 Jefferson avenue, Cottage Grove.

Chocolate Peppermint Angel Food
1-1 1/2 cups egg whites.
1 teaspoon cream of tartar.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup granulated sugar.
1 teaspoon peppermint flavoring.
Few drops green liquid coloring.
1 cup cake flour.

Beat egg whites with a flat whip until frothy and then add cream of tartar and salt, continue beating until a point of the egg whites will stand upright when whip is pulled out. Gradually beat in 1 cup of the sugar which has been sifted twice. Fold in the peppermint and coloring. Fold in the flour which has been sifted three times with the remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Pour into ungreased pan and bake for 1 hour in slow oven 325 degrees F. Invert pan until cake is entirely cold.

Split cold cake and spread the chocolate filling between layers and on top and sides.
Chocolate Filling and Icing — 3 squares chocolate, shaved; 2-3 cups powdered sugar; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup scalded milk; 1 1/2 tablespoons gelatin; 1/2 cup cold water; 1 pint whipping cream.
Combine chocolate, sugar, salt and milk and cook in double boiler until smooth. Soak gelatin in cold water and add to the chocolate mixture. Stir until well dissolved. Cool, and when chocolate begins to set fold in the stiffly beaten cream, chill and spread on cake. —Mrs. C. L. Huffaker, 1819 Fairmount, Eugene.

NEW PURITANISM BY YOUNG PEOPLE ASKED IN SERMON

A challenge to young people in leading a new puritanism was given by Rev. Milton S. Weber, pastor of Central Presbyterian church, Sunday in a sermon. His talk was based on his recent trip to the state Christian Endeavor convention at Salem. In part his sermon follows:

"I beseech you brethren by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind." Rom. 12, was the text.

"A new Puritanism says Dr. Weigle of Yale University, must be the inevitable spiritual attitude as the next stage in this evolution of our social and religious structure, or else chaos is inevitable.

"His words would never have been spoken had not the above text been forgotten or ignored by members of the Body of Christ. It seems quite apparent that by the historical emphasis placed on a living devotion to Christian ideals, the Christian Endeavor hosts in the world are the logical groups to take the lead in the establishment of this new puritanism.

This new puritanism must be based on a sincere search for the mind of Christ. It must lack any desire for self-justification. It must include the loving and devoted loyalty of the family of members for their church. It must be constructed around obedience to the highest and perhaps most difficult interpretation of the will of Christ. It must receive lubrication for the organization wheels from the sincere motives of good will and service to all.

"By its constitution, historic service, and present objectives no group is so fitted to render this new leadership as the well tried and experienced membership of the Christian Endeavor groups. The member of the Christian Endeavor society signs a pledge which is a daily reminder of his fellowship with God in Christ, as follows: 'Trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ for strength, I promise Him that I will strive to do whatever He would like to have me do.'

"There is nothing new, in the words but they have new content in these days, with new forms of sacrificial service. Another objective which should challenge every Endeavorer is that with our lives and by actual presence in the work of the church we should so ornament the work of God that present day society may find growing faith and an increasingly abundant life in the Christian way of living.

"In such matters as good citizenship—which to Christian young people suggests temperate habits to point where there is no place for any such harmful commodities as beverage liquors, the Christian Endeavorers should renew their fight for a dry society. Recent results at the polls in which suburbs around Boston and Chicago, voted dry by surprisingly large majorities ranging from 8 to 1 up to 10 to 1, should rouse us to new courage in an old fight. It is our reasonable desire."

"With students all over the country expressing their ideals for a world in which arguments between nations shall be concluded in the courts, as are arguments between people and institutions, rather than by murder and hostility, Christian Endeavorers should rouse to their old cry and their old command which was given by our commander-in-chief, the Lord Jesus Christ, when he ordered that we should 'make disciples of all nations.' For Christ in international disputes. When groups outside the church are preparing for the peaceful settlement of all problems by signing pledges such as this, 'I will never cross the boundary of another nation to kill or destroy, nor will I support my government in doing so,' it would seem that the followers of the prince of peace could well endure the taunts of the rumormongers and witness for Christ in international peace and make a definite contribution to the cause by active support of churches and missionaries who are real peace makers in the world."

"Christian Endeavorers, old and new, will make it the rule of their lives to pray and read the Bible every day as the pledge of C. E. requires, the principles of Jesus will take such hold of us that we will not be conformed to this world, but will be transformed by the renewing of our minds."

"May we stand in the strength of our youth today. That the work of the Lord may grow and determine the Master shall have His own way. In our hearts as alone we go. A new puritanism is coming and the Christian Endeavorers are well equipped for it."

American-Japan Student Meeting Planned By Tokyo

An American-Japan student conference, called the "discover and analyze coincidences and conflicts of opinions of the people on various problems confronting the world today," will be sponsored in Tokyo, July 19 to 26, by the Japan Student English Union, according to an announcement reaching the campus Monday. The announcement also brought word that two Japanese students, Harudo Endo of Waseda university and Edwin T. Tabata of Kelo, would be on the University of Oregon campus May 3 and 4 to confer with any university students who may wish to attend the session.

While on the campus the Japanese students will be guests at a meeting to be held Thursday, May 3 at 8 o'clock in Guild hall. At this time they will describe the aims and purposes of the conference, and will show motion pictures of Japan. They will go from here to Corvallis for a similar meeting.

"We have recently become conscious that the international affairs cannot be left to our politicians and diplomats alone," the announcement of the conference says. "Real peace can be built only upon the combined hearts of peoples, especially of promising students upon whom the world of tomorrow depends."

"We cannot deny the fact that the realization of international cooperation between the United States and Japan is absolutely necessary to guarantee world peace."

Townpeople are invited to attend the meeting with the Japanese representatives in Guild hall Thursday. No admission will be charged.

people at large can change the apparent direction of the course now being laid down for them by the authorities in Washington.

Dr. Wirt implied that "government officials" have blocked rather than aided recovery. "We actually had recovery in 1933," he declared, "and destroyed it."

"The new dealers stated they did not want that recovery," he said. "They wanted to wait for their own type because it would be more substantial."

"Private industry cannot possibly assume the burden of restoring jobs to the unemployed so long as government officials are actually placing obstacles in their way. I have not called this treason, but I do consider it most deplorable."

Dr. Wirt quoted former Senator Brookhart as saying his own farm bill was in itself a revolution, and repeated statement that Speaker Henry T. Rainey predicted last fall that the government would shortly take over "certain industries."

A new name appeared today: on the Wirt lists.

"I call your attention to Rose Schneiderman," he said, "who, I understand, is now in the Virgin Islands in the interest of a socialistic experiment of the brain trust. The American people should ask for an explanation of the plan there."

As for the question of who called President Roosevelt the "Kerensky of the American revolution," a major issue in the Wirt investigation, Dr. Wirt today quoted a magazine writer as having written that the president had "half jokingly" referred to himself that way.

"A government official was reported to have threatened a certain newspaper with punishment," he said, "if it did not stop criticizing the government."

In closing, he mentioned three more "new dealers" whose records, he said, he would like to examine. They are A. A. Berle, Jr., Leo Weisman and Mordca Erekial.

J. M. DEVERS HERE LOOKING OVER HIS POLITICAL FENCES

Proper recognition by the federal government of its obligation to those western counties in which are located large government holdings is being stressed by J. M. Devers, candidate for the republican nomination for congress from the first Oregon district, who was in Eugene Monday.

Devers was district attorney for Lane county from 1913 to 1917 when he joined the staff of the attorney general at Salem.

"The federal government owns and controls in this state and thereby has removed from the tax rolls 50 per cent of all of the real property in the state," Devers pointed out. "Those counties in which are located large government holdings, including Lane, should receive from the federal government proper and equitable recognition and treatment to compensate for the loss of taxable property."

River and flood control, reclamation, irrigation, drainage, and power development are all problems of national scope in the opinion of Devers. "Contributions by the national government to the development and maintenance of these projects should assume a national obligation instead of a federal donation," Devers declared.

"Local communities should be relieved of the burden and obligation of the development, promotion and achievement of such enterprises and the state should assist in bringing these projects to the attention of the federal government."
