

DUNNE GETS MORE BACKING AS MEIER GROUP STEPS OVER

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

There would be a heavy swing toward Dunne in the coming primary vote. "Rock of Marne" Deserter.

It also was reported that in Portland, the so-called Meier machine, which launched the candidacy of General U. S. McAlexander, of Newport, had left the candidate in much the position of a "Rock of the Marne," in so far as progress toward the nomination was concerned and had switched to Dunne as their only hope to defeat Holman.

So it seemed pretty certain Thursday that a very strong movement toward Dunne had materialized over the state in the past two or three days.

Locally, with Boehnke and the group he represents, pulling for Dunne, the republican party proper stands pretty solidly behind the candidacy of Dunne. The old-guard section of the party was aligned behind Dunne at the beginning and has been working hard for him since he announced. With the Meier group here also in the Dunne column, the Lane county republican party may fairly be said to be supporting his candidacy solidly.

Boehnke Writes Dunne

Boehnke announced his position by releasing for publication a letter to Dunne, in answer to a communication from the latter, regarding his position. The letter follows:

"I purposely refrained from answering your letter of April 10 for the following reasons:

"First, I had been very active in the proposed candidacy of Willard Marks; his refusal to run naturally left us pretty much undecided.

"Second: As you know I led the independent fight for Governor Meier when he was elected, and, there was considerable talk of an independent candidacy in the fall should certain candidates be nominated.

"After a careful analysis of the situation I wish to be considered on your side, and will do everything I can to further your candidacy for the high office to which you aspire. The reasons for my decision are:

"That, if you are nominated, there will not be an independent candidate as the entire republican party will be for you in the fall; and a great many democrats;

"That your knowledge of the state's business, your reputation for honesty and straight dealing will make possible your handling of the state's business for the best interests of all its people;

"That you will be the governor, not the pliable tool of such men as Os West."

Brown Pays Call

Pleasant Sam Brown, Gervais sausage maker and candidate for the republican nomination for governor, was in Eugene Thursday checking his political friends before he spoke to a group meeting west of Junction City Thursday evening. Brown, who has been in the state legislature continuously since 1915, sitting in the senate since 1923, is touring the state on gasoline and funds donated by his former friends, he says.

At the "party" given for him at his farm recently, he received enough gasoline and cash to carry him 10,000 miles.

In his "if elected" program, Senator Brown is gunning for state commissions, he revealed here Thursday.

Consolidation Planned

"If I am elected governor and the legislature will cooperate, I will have an investigation made into every state commission, looking to a more economic and efficient system of doing state business," declared the farm candidate. Brown stresses the fact that he is a "farmer, not an agriculturist."

Brown believes many of the present commissions could be consolidated and indicated that he might support a plan to abolish many of the present commissions and establish in their places individual commissioners.

Brown has no specific plans yet as regards the commissions, saying he is uncertain just what he will propose if elected. He emphasizes his intention, however, of doing something about the matter, and points out that a cooperative legislature will be of extreme importance in putting through any reforms suggested.

Farm Finances Stressed

The Gervais candidate is stressing a farm program in his campaign, laying special emphasis on the matter of reforms for present farm financing schemes.

"We must have a more practical form of farm financing. Everyone knows the present system is a failure with the average farmer overburdened with a debt load that he cannot possibly remove. No red-blooded man wants to repudiate debts, but we must have a system of farm financing that will enable farmers to save their property and make a decent living."

Brown recognizes that this is essentially a national problem and believes the solution must be based on a national scale, but believes that the state should be ready to cooperate with such a plan and be ready to offer suggestions for the solution.

Mahoney Talks Here

Mayor Willis Mahoney, of Klamath Falls, made two talks here Wednesday evening, one over radio station KORE and one at the county court house.

In his speeches, the militant Klamath mayor lashed out at the alleged Portland chamber of commerce domination over the state, struck out at the power companies in what he believed to be their plan to tie up Bonneville power distribution and urged the voters to place him in office to prevent all this.

He struck at the sales tax, declaring it was a tool of vested interests and emphasized his opposition to the measure. He likewise rapped the Knox liquor law, declaring the state "advertising liquor in the face of our children," and declared his intention of advocating the return of

home rule for the liquor problem. Frank Longman, republican candidate for the gubernatorial nomination, was scheduled to speak over station KORE Thursday evening at 6 o'clock.

Another state candidate, Earl Snell, Arlington, speaker of the house at the last legislature, and present candidate for the republican nomination for secretary of state, was in Eugene Thursday conferring with party leaders here.

He has completed a wide swing over the state and feels confident of enough support to win the nomination at the primaries, May 15. Two counties, Benton and Douglas, he feels uncertain of, but believes that his support in Multnomah county and in eastern Oregon will overcome the doubtful areas.

have given and will give Lane county and the state this kind of service.

It was pointed out that in the next legislature there will be many issues affecting the public schools, higher education, taxation and highway development and that Lane county's position will be strengthened by having a delegation of recognized experience, especially with many new members expected in other parts of the state.

Hill is running for his third term in the house and is prominently mentioned for the influential post of speaker. Huntington with one term behind him is regarded as a leader and is expected to receive important committee chairmanships. Merriam would be a first-term but his activities as president of the Lane county chamber of commerce and as a member of various state agricultural committees and boards have given him a wide acquaintance over the state. Wheeler and McCracken are both veterans in legislative service.

A second meeting of the new association has been scheduled for noon Thursday next week.

ready to draft a memorandum to Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

The official said the point at issue is whether to dismiss Secretary Hull's statement with a brief, courteous acknowledgment and send Washington a full restatement of Japan's claims to a special position as the keeper of the peace in the Far East and the guardian of China's foreign contacts.

Nothing has been done so far, the official emphasized, toward actually preparing the Tokyo government's reply.

In his statement, precipitated by Japan's recent assertion of her "hands-off China" policy, Secretary Hull said, in brief, that the United States expects to observe all treaties and expects other powers to do likewise.

FRANCE ADDS PROTEST

PARIS, May 3.—(AP)—The French government today called upon Japan to observe the nine-power treaty to the letter in a straightforward reply to Tokyo's note, explaining Japan's "Asia for Asiatics doctrine."

ed without a record vote despite a strong plea for its rejection by Senator Tydings (D., Md.), on the ground it retained the 3 cents a pound tax on Philippine coconut oil.

Senator Couzens (R., Mich.), author of the 10 per cent individual income tax amendment, said he would not insist on the proposal in view of the large house vote against it, but assailed the Hearst newspapers for what he termed their "vicious" attitude against the emergency levy.

"Yellow journalism," he shouted. "He congratulated congress for not enacting a sales tax as advocated by the Hearst newspapers."

Couzens said the senate conference had won a great victory over the house, making its managers on the bill accept nearly every major senate amendment except his own.

Publicity Planned

The Michiganian said the 10 per cent he proposed was not a "bite of the cherry" compared to what we will have to pay to balance the budget and get out of the depression."

The individual taxpayer with small income is given a sizeable decrease in taxes especially where the income is all earned. In that case a 10 per cent credit is allowed on all net income up to \$14,000.

The normal income tax rate is made a flat 4 per cent on all net income against 4 per cent on the first \$4,000 and 5 per cent above that in existing law.

Surtaxes are raised, however, especially in the higher brackets, the rates ranging from 4 to 50 per cent in 20 brackets as against 1 to 35 per cent in 33 brackets in the present law.

Under a publicity section, taxpayers will be required to file a separate statement with their returns which will be subject to public inspection under regulations prescribed by the treasury. The separate statements would contain net income, deductions, credits and tax payable.

waxy; gradually cream in sugar, add beaten egg yolks to sour milk. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with sour milk. Add flavoring and nut meats. Lastly fold in beaten egg whites. Bake in 375 degree oven, which is a little over a medium oven. Bake for 30 minutes or until done.

Frost with Caramel Nut Ice: 2 egg whites, 2½ cups brown sugar, 5 tablespoons water, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup chopped nuts. Put egg whites, sugar and water in a double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water. Beat constantly with rotary beater and cook seven minutes or until frosting will stand in peaks. Add vanilla after removing from fire, beat until thick enough to spread. Sprinkle chopped nuts over frosting or place half nuts on top to decorate as one wishes before frosting becomes cold.—Mrs. H. E. Slattery, 322 E. 11th St., Eugene.

Burnt Sugar Cake

3-4 cup shortening
1½ cups sugar
3-4 cup cold water
1 cup sweet milk
2½ cups flour
2 eggs
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon salt

Burn ½ cup sugar in a steel spider until very brown, add water and shake until sugar is all dissolved, set aside to cool. Sift flour, oats, measure and sift 3 times with baking powder, salt and soda. Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly and add egg yolks.

developed in the schools seems desirable, then we need to make possible the financial aid necessary for such a program," Dr. Boyer stated. Salaries have been cut absolutely as much as possible. Costs of materials, too, have been greatly advanced.

Preceding these remarks he had outlined briefly the ideal for education, to the individual and to society, trying them in with the relations of service clubs and to education.

Motives for education he said, can be classified in the following values: comfort and health, ambition and efficiency, beauty, religion, play, and the social side, taking in the love of country, the love of community and home.

Service clubs, the speaker said, are founded on the ideals of love for community, on the desire to make the community progress. The service clubs give and give through their identification of their interests with those of the community.

Education, he said, works to develop all the finer interests of men to make them better citizens. We have to find out what are the best interests and to socialize them for the betterment of the whole community, he added.

In another statement, Dr. Boyer pointed out how we must be rich within ourselves to enrich the

community. Service club and teachers have much in common in that they give and seek to find the best things to do.

Suburb Surrounds

Both were members of the Barrow gang when it cut a swath of lawlessness through Oklahoma, Texas and the southwest, eluding capture in the same miraculous manner as Dillinger. The frenzied hunt for Dillinger, the son of a Quaker farmer, was converged on a new subdivision on the

extreme northwest side of Chicago. Federal agents and police, working on a tip that the outlaw was hiding out with his lieutenants in a bungalow there, threw squads around a suburb known as Saganash.

FEDS SEEK ARMS

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—Attorney General Cummings told reporters today the department of justice was planning to add to its crime fighting force about 270 investigators and to purchase a supply of automobiles, armored cars and machine guns.

Cummings said an additional appropriation is desired to better equip the department for the battle against the underworld.

The law chief did not say how much money was desired. He explained the division of investigation needed about 200 additional special agents and about 70 more accountants.

The motor equipment of the division was characterized as "pitiful." "You can't catch a man who has a car that will go 70 miles an hour with one that will go only 45 miles an hour," he said.
