

MEIER GIVES RUM BOARD 30 DAYS TO BETTER OPERATION

enior informally declared he would give them a chance to work out their problems first.

The letter to the commission referred to the steps in the formation of the commission for control of the liquor traffic and cited their responsibilities and "extraordinary and arbitrary powers." These, his letter inferred, did not include rejection of the sense of the legislature in reducing salaries not the board of control in opposing any salary increases for staff members.

"In accordance with my recommendation," the letter stated, "the Oregon legislature in special session last November enacted a law governing the manufacture, sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages, and a supplementary act appropriating the net revenue derived therefrom for unemployment relief."

The letter was expected to be read at the meeting of the liquor commission set for this afternoon in Portland.

The governor's letter to all three members—George McMorran, Eugene; Alex Barry, Portland; and James D. Burns of Condon—continued:

"To carry out the purposes of these acts (legislative measures cited above), the legislature authorized the creation of the liquor control commission, and as governor, I was vested with the appointive and removal power over its personnel.

"In the so-called liquor control act, the legislature specifically recited that its initial objective was 'the protection of the safety, welfare, health, peace and morale of the people of the state,' the prevention of 'the recurrence of abuses associated with saloons or resorts for the consumption of alcoholic beverages,' and the elimination of 'the evils of unlicensed and unlawful manufacture, selling and disposing of such beverages.' In order that its provisions might be fully and effectively carried out, the legislature conferred upon the commission extraordinary and arbitrary powers."

30 Days Granted
"A supplementary act appropriating three million dollars, or as much as might be necessary, from the net revenue derived from the manufacture, sale, distribution, licensing and taxing alcoholic beverages was enacted in accordance with my pledge to the federal unemployment relief administration that the state of Oregon would contribute its part in relieving unemployment. On the strength of this pledge, the federal unemployment relief administration has, since last fall, continued to advance federal funds for unemployment relief."

"It is with extreme regret that I am now forced to admit that the liquor control commission has failed to fully and effectively carry out the objectives of the above legislative enactments."

"Although patience and tolerance in connection with the administration of the commission have ceased to be virtues, I am, nevertheless, granting the commission an additional thirty days from the date hereof, in which to place its affairs on an economical, efficient and businesslike basis."

Among the salaries which were to be increased was that of George Sammis, administrator, from \$400 to \$500 a month. Sammis remitted his check for the extra hundred to the secretary of state following the board of control action, stating he "had not asked for it." Vouchers for the other raises were held up by the commission.

forces, chiefly through air and naval branch increases.

Poland—Raised her army strength from 280,000 to 341,000.

France's national defense program for 1934-35 is costing 13,500,000 francs—the longest since 1928. New armaments and fortifications are included in the army, navy and air budgets.

Belgium also is active, building forts along the entire German border.

Poland and Czechoslovakia are rearing defenses on the German frontier and Poland on the Russian side as well.

The United States is among the leaders in the building up of navies. Great Britain has built or authorized naval craft up to 94 per cent of treaty strength; Japan is up to 98 1/2 per cent.

Many nations are looking to the air lanes in building up their defensive forces.

Japan, for example, is shown by available figures to have increased her military planes by 450 to 5324. Most of her equipment has been purchased in Great Britain and in the United States.

France has made a slightly larger increase than Japan, while Russia, Great Britain, Poland, Italy and Czechoslovakia have been active in this respect.

STRAWBERRY FIELD DAY IS WEDNESDAY AT O. S. C. STATION

The annual strawberry field day at the Oregon State college experiment station at Corvallis has been set for Wednesday, May 9, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher. Growers and others interested in the breeding work of the station in cooperation with the United States department of agriculture are invited to take part in the inspection of the experimental plots that day.

In the fields from which have come the Corvallis berry and other improved strains and varieties, will be fruiting this year 5,000 new strawberry seedlings as well as more than 200 seedlings selected from thousands that fruited the first time in former years. Many named varieties from here and from test stations in the east will be seen in fruit.

The influence of irrigation on the several commercial varieties of berries will be examined during the field day, as well as the value of matted row culture under irrigation as compared with hill cultivation.

While the day will be devoted largely to strawberries, opportunity will be given to view the breeding work in brambles and other small fruit. Pruning and training experiments in raspberries and the Youngberry will also be seen.

Members of the plant pathology and entomology staffs will be present during the day to confer with growers regarding diseases and insect control problems.

County Agent Fletcher urges Lane county strawberry growers to attend the field day. He states that if there are any growers who wish to attend and who do not have transportation, he will undertake to arrange for them to make the trip if they will communicate with him. Growers who expect to make this trip and who could take another grower with them are also asked to notify the county agent.

lightly. Fill your crusted tin and bake in a moderate oven till crust is well done and cover with the stiffly beaten egg whites to which two tablespoons of sugar has been added. Brown lightly. The pie retains its gooseberry flavor, but loses some tartness.—Mrs. Isom Cox, Rt. 2, Eugene.

Blueberry Pie

2 cups blueberries
2 eggs
3-4 cup sugar
2 rounded tablespoons flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons lemon juice
Juice of 1-2 orange
2 tablespoons sugar

While the berries are heating on the stove, separate the eggs and beat the yolks together with the sugar, flour, and salt. Add this mixture to the hot berries and cook until thick, stirring constantly to prevent burning. Remove from fire and add the lemon juice and the juice of 1/2 orange. Pour into a baked crust and cover with a meringue made of the 2 egg whites and 4 level tablespoons sugar (beat whites till sugar is thoroughly dissolved in it). Brown in a slow oven, about 20 minutes. If canned blueberries are used, less sugar will be required in the filling.—Mrs. Gilbert Cays, 951 Alder St.

Uncooked Strawberry Pie

1 baked pie shell
Enough fresh, ripe strawberries to fill shell.
3-4 cups sugar.
1-2 pint whipping cream.
Stem and wash strawberries. Cut each berry into about four pieces and cover with the sugar. About an hour before ready to serve put berries in pie shell and cover with the cream whipped very stiff. Put in the refrig-

erator or in a cool place until time to serve. Cut and serve the same as any other pie. A most delicious and novel way of making strawberry pie.—Mrs. F. J. Bergham, 922 Polk St.

Non-High District Board to Meet to Plan For Election

STATE CONVENTION MEETING PLACES ARRANGED BY VETS

RESURRECTION OF JESUS' MINISTRY TOPIC OF SERMON

"The Resurrection Ministry of Jesus" was the topic for a sermon given Sunday by Rev. Frank S. Beistel, pastor of the United Lutheran church, at his regular morning service. His text was Luke 24:43-47.

"Then opened he their understanding that they might understand the scriptures . . . that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations."

Rev. Mr. Beistel's sermon in part follows: "An eminent sociologist freely expresses his conviction that improvement of the social order must come through organized religion yet he fails to recognize that the Christian church of the ages have kept the stream of man's activities or his mental processes, Christ has done things and these things must be recognized in any correct analysis of the forces that move the universe. Salvation is ultimately the accomplishment of Christ and not of man."

"How largely Christ enters into the affairs of all the race is apparent from the announcement made in the New Testament that from His resurrection and the results accruing therefrom lie all the hopes of the race. St. Peter declares in his first epistle that after Christ's quickening (coming to life) He went to the souls of men departed and preached (heralded) to some and to others brought the gospel so that all souls in the spirit world had knowledge of and participation in His resurrection. Whatever may have been accomplished in the world of the dead there remained a world full of living people and innumerable more yet to be born. These, too, must share in the fruits of His resurrection. To living men Christ appeared in visible form, gave unmistakable evidence of the fact that He was alive and arranged for the publication of the gospel of His kingdom throughout all the world and for all time. 'Go into all the world' . . . 'every creature' . . . 'end of the world' are significant statements in His charge to men. It simply staggers the imagination to know that out of the rock-bound grave on the slopes of Golgotha came forth a living personality that touches every human life from the gates of Eden to the end of time and beyond."

"Through the Resurrection Ministry during the 40 days before His final ascension, Jesus set up and put into operation His program to reach the living. It reveals certain distinct purposes:

"First, He establishes in His followers the habit of faith. Their belief in His messiahship and the hopes they had entertained of an earthly kingdom over which He would rule were now completely shattered. Death had claimed their friend. The resurrection ministry must first re-establish their faith. Fear not! He is as sure as words. Then He shows to them from the scriptures that these things that have happened are parts of a program reaching down through the ages. He appears and re-appears many times and under different circumstances. The doubting Thomas must be convinced. Not a shadow of doubt must cloud the disciples' clear vision. The fullest evidence is offered. A doubting church cannot win the world. Conviction must be so positive that men will declare it everywhere and even die for it."

"It may not be amiss to state that the church still needs the habit of faith. In our modern days where men are puffed up with the importance of their own wisdom too many human notions are mixed up with the principles of God's revelation that men do not know what to believe. The church is drifting in a troubled world that still needs the habit of faith."

"Second, Jesus re-assembles His apostolate. 'Meet Christ in Galilee' is the first message of the angel in the empty tomb and Jesus confirms this request as He speaks to the frightened women as they fled to Jerusalem. And the eleven disciples went away into Galilee into a mountain as Jesus had appointed them. It is to this assembled body that Jesus gives the Great Commission. Whatever may be the Christian's personal and individual faith and labors, he should always keep in mind that the church is a corporate body, a fellowship, a communion of saints into which he is to enter and of which he is a part."

"Third, the church is founded and its program announced. During His public ministry, Christ had spoken of building His church. It was then future, but here on the mountain in Galilee the time has come. The apostolate is re-established and Jesus, announcing to them the tremendous fact that all power in heaven and in earth now belongs to Him, commissions His church and commands it to go unto the ends of the earth, to baptize, to teach and to establish in men's hearts faith in the unfolding of His kingdom. In this church so constituted He will abide until the end of time. His power shall flow through it and in it and through it men shall find Him. Thus was set in motion among the hills of Galilee the greatest forces ever released upon the earth—the church of the Living Christ!"

"Fourth, Jesus opened their understanding that they might know the scriptures. The events of which they were witnesses explained the prophecies and interpreted the meaning of the Old Testament. The whole scripture is God's Word. The minds of the leaders in this tremendous undertaking are opened to know the whole truth that they might be unfailing teachers, writers and witnesses before the whole world."

"Forty days! What mighty influences were set in motion by the Resurrection Ministry!"

WOODIN IS BURIED NEAR BIRTHPLACE

BERWICK, Pa., May 7.—(AP)—The body of William H. Woodin, the frail smiling man who piloted the nation's treasury department through the 1933 banking crisis, lies in the family mausoleum in Pine Grove cemetery, six blocks from where he was born.

President Roosevelt's secretary of the treasury, who resigned several months ago because of ill health and died last Thursday in New York, was committed to his final resting place yesterday while thousands of his fellow-townsmen looked on in mourning for the man they knew as neighbor.
