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GRANGE SLAPS AT OUTSIDE PRODUCE

A resolution, backing up the home products campaign but decrying the fact that some disregard such a move and bring in outside produce to crowd out the local, was passed by the Willamette grange in meeting Saturday evening.

The resolution is as follows: "Whereas, the home products campaign conducted in Eugene has urged upon all her citizens the need and desirability of buying local produce from local merchants, and

"Whereas, as farmers of Lane county we believe that we should buy locally whenever possible thus building up our own community, and

"Whereas, certain groups of merchants in Eugene have seen fit to disregard the spirit as well as the letter of this campaign by bringing in outside potatoes on an already glutted market and conducting a 'price war' with potatoes as leaders driving the price down to as low as 5c for a 50-lb. sack, thus reducing the income of local producers for the balance of the season and injuring other dealers throughout the city who attempt to operate by practicing fair business ethics.

"Therefore, be it resolved, That Willamette Grange go on record as opposed to the practices of using local farm products as price leaders by local merchants and the bringing in outside produce when local supplies are more than sufficient to care for every need. We believe such practices should cease and recommend that a representative committee be set up composed of two members from each of the following organizations: (1) Eugene Vegetable Producers, (2) Eugene Grocers' Ass'n, (3) Lane Pomona Grange. This committee to bring all interests concerned into a frank understanding and attempt to work out a program of mutual helpfulness for the benefit of all concerned."

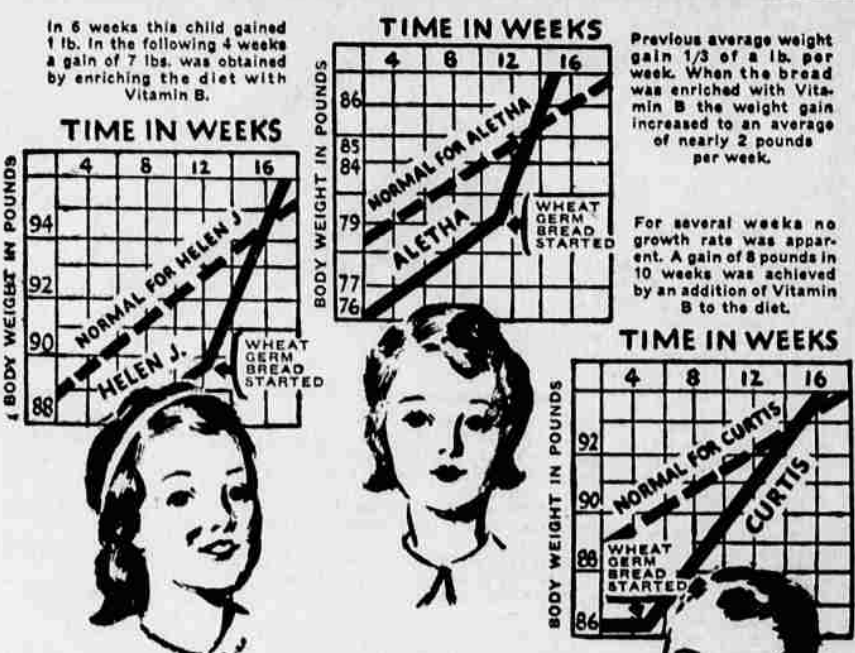
