

ROOSEVELT SIGNS NEW TAX BILL TO RAISE 417 MILLION

capital stock and a five per cent levy on earnings above 12 1/2 per cent of that capital were estimated to raise \$95,000,000 annually for the largest single item in the act. These taxes were imposed to finance the public works program but went out automatically with repeal.

Estate Levies Up
New levies on the transfer of estates after death ranged from one to 60 per cent as compared with the old range of one to 45. Credits on state inheritance taxes are not allowed on the increase.

Only railroads henceforth may file consolidated returns for themselves and subsidiaries. The privilege is abolished for other corporations.
The new income tax schedules levy a flat four per cent normal rate on the first \$4,000 of individual net income. They retain the \$1,000 exemption for single persons, \$2,000 for married and \$400 for each minor dependent, which may be deducted from net income to give the taxable income.

A 10 per cent credit is allowed for all earned net income up to \$14,000, thereby reducing payments on small incomes.

The old eight per cent normal tax on net incomes above \$14,000 is eliminated, but surtaxes now begin at \$14,000 instead of \$6,000.

Capital Losses Hit
These surtaxes start at four per cent and swell through 29 1/2 brackets to 55 per cent on excesses over \$1,000,000. Previously the rate started at one per cent on the excess between \$60,000 and \$100,000 and rose through 53 brackets to 55 per cent on those over \$1,000,000.

A new capital gains and loss provision was a direct result of senate testimony that partners in J. P. Morgan company and other New York houses paid no income taxes in some of the depression years. From now on, capital losses may be deducted from taxable income on the exception of capital gains, with the exception that \$2,000 of any excess loss may be charged off from ordinary income.

For tax purposes, capital gains are measured at 10 per cent if the asset is held less than one year, 80 per cent if from one to two years, 60 per cent from two to five, 40 per cent from five to 10 and 30 per cent if more than 10 years.

Charge-Offs Limited
Partnership allowances for losses are limited to certain deductions to the extent of gains from the sale of capital assets.

A new gift tax schedule runs exactly three-quarters of the estate taxes.

Charge-offs arising from exchanges of stock and corporate reorganizations are limited.

New language will seek to insure that gasoline and oil taxes are paid by the original producer. Though not in the law, the treasury expects to raise as much as \$25,000,000 by more rigid administration of depreciation allowances.

The new publicity provision will open to public inspection a separate statement to be filed by income taxpayers giving the gross and net income, total deductions and credits and the tax payable.

Taxes on candy and soft drinks, furs valued up to \$75 and jewelry not worth more than \$25 are repealed. The five cents a \$100 tax on the sale of produce for future delivery is slashed to three cents. January 1 is set as the date for repealing the bank check tax.

TUCSON, Ariz., May 10.—(AP)—The United States department of justice was preparing this afternoon to retire from investigation of the kidnapping of six-year-old June Robles at a conference between members of the family and heads of all official departments participating in the investigation. It was understood the relatives requested another "truce" on the part of the authorities to allow time for perfection, if possible, of new plans for contacting the child's abductors.

A new appeal to the kidnappers was to be issued, suggesting that they send the relatives of the little girl a new set of instructions, and expressing the opinion of the family that the directions contained in the original ransom note, delivered two hours after June disappeared 15 days ago, now are useless.

The action followed the authentication of a second communication received by the family from the kidnappers, which was understood to have submitted proof the child still is alive, but which did not alter the instructions for the making of a contact.

HOMEMAKERS GET DEMONSTRATIONS AT ANNUAL MEET

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homemakers of the county was made through the work of Miss Skow's office in renovating and remodeling clothes, she reported. Eighty-nine demonstrations were given, and 320 women were enrolled in this work.

Following demonstrations in seven communities of egg, milk, and cheese cookery, 646 improved practices in the preparation of these diet essentials were reported by women in those communities, Miss Skow concluded.

The morning session opened at 9:45 with a surprise feature, which was a demonstration and explanation of marionettes by Mrs. Ethel Christie and her hobby group from Eugene high school.

Half an hour later the meet broke up into three "interest" groups: organization and administration, Mrs. Ada Wright, chairman, Miss Claribel Nye, secretary; radio study courses, Mrs. H. A. Sims, chairman, Mrs. Azalea Sager, Miss Lucy A. Case, secretaries; recreation and dramatics, Mr. Arthur Baugh, chairman, Mrs. Cora Saunders, secretary.

At 11:15 Miss Case, who is extension specialist in foods and nutrition, gave a talk and demonstration entitled, "Does Food Make the Person?" She emphasized the importance of the use of spring greens in the diet, and showed how these may be prepared. They were later served at the luncheon.

In the afternoon the talk by Mrs. Sager, extension specialist in clothing and textiles, on "Color and Design in 1934 Fashions" attracted a great deal of interest. Mrs. Sager put on a style show, using two of the homemakers present as models, and explained how the colors and designs of this year's styles could be adapted to various personalities.

Several guests were invited to the luncheon during the noon hour. They included County Commissioners O. E. Crowe and Cal Young, George McMorran, chairman of the state liquor control commission, O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, Mrs. Ralph Laird, of Jasper, president of the state council for home economics extension, presided during the luncheon program, and introduced the guests.

Mr. McMorran spoke briefly on the work of the liquor commission, assuring his listeners that all members of the board are very sincere in their efforts to create and maintain an effective and honest control.

He emphasized the extremely complicated situation with which the board has to deal, and stated that while there were many things about which he was not at liberty to speak, nevertheless he wanted the homemakers to feel confidence in the board's sincerity.

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Minor frays took place between police and strikers along the Embarcadero. San Francisco's commercial waterfront section. The strikers were showing ill temper. Many carried clubs. They jeered police and shouted "scab" at strikebreakers, who boarded docked vessels under police protection.

PORTLAND SEES FIGHT

PORTLAND, May 10.—(AP)—Water-borne commerce was held on a dead neutral here today as a strike of longshoremen entered its second day. At 10 a. m. not a ship in the Portland harbor was being worked. The International Brotherhood of Teamsters announced a sympathetic strike and pledged full support to the International Longshoremen's Association which called the general dock walkout.

Fists flew in earnest here this morning when the waterfront employers' association attempted to transport 100 strike-breakers through picket lines. Three large motor stages had been chartered for the move. Strikers disabled the stages, punctured tires and broke motor parts.

Walkout Far-Reaching
Employers advertise for workers and promised housing facilities and protection. Extra police converged on the waterfront.

Action of the teamsters' union in joining the striking longshoremen made the walkout far-reaching. The teamsters' union membership includes wholesale and retail drivers, general truck drivers, taxicab drivers, stage operators, laundry drivers, garbage drivers, and dairy and ice cream truck drivers.

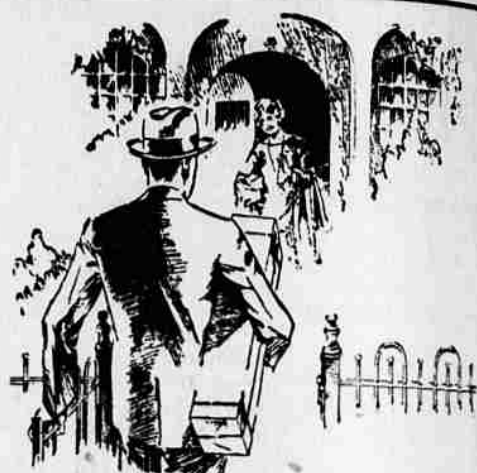
Pullman in the hips and reaching ward. He died a few minutes later in a hospital.
