 1 level tablespoon Knox gelatin
 1 cup boiling water
 1 cup boiling water

 Pinch salt.
 Soak gelatin in the cold water about five minutes, add boiling water, salt and lemon juice. When almost set, add sugar berries to baked pie shell and pour mixture over berries. Chill. When firm and ready to serve, cover top with whipped cream.
 Note—Other berries may be used in the same way.—Ruby C. Plouffe, 41 W. 18th, Eugene.

Gooseberry Cobbler
 1 quart gooseberries
 2 cups sugar
 3-4 cup flour
 1/4 tsp. salt
 1 tablespoon shortening
 Water.
 Add sugar to gooseberries and place half of the mixture in a deep baking dish. Sift together the flour and salt, rub in the shortening and mix to a dough with the water. Divide into two portions and roll each out the size and shape of baking dish. Place one portion over the fruit in the pan, add the remaining fruit and cover with the other portion of the crust.
 Cut a few openings in the top crust to allow the steam to escape. Sprinkle a tablespoon of sugar over the top and bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes. Serve with either plain or whipped cream. If desired, a few finely chopped nuts may be sprinkled over the top.—Mrs. C. L. Huffaker, 1819 Fairmount Boulevard, Eugene.

Forest Men to Fight Pine Blister Rust

A crew of ten men in the employ of the national forest service has established a camp at Hebo in the Siuslaw forest to work on pine blister rust control, according to R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest.

Sixteen years ago a tract in that vicinity was planted to white pine and a short time ago blister rust began to attack the trees. Some have died and others are badly affected. The work of these men will be to destroy the trees that have been attacked by the disease and to eradicate as far as possible the wild current vines on which the spores of the rust thrive and from there transmitted to the pine trees.
 This disease has in the past attacked the pine forests in central Oregon and a continual fight is being waged against it by the forest service and the private timber owners.
