

PROGRAM WELL UNDERWAY FOR LIONS MEETING

The program is well lined up for the 11th annual state convention of the Oregon clubs of the Lions International for which the Eugene Lions club will be host, Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, June 3, 4, and 5, at the Hotel Oregon, general chairman of the convention, Dr. Harry W. Titus is president of the local club.

More than 400 delegates, visitors, and their wives are looked to attend the meeting. Portland alone is sending nearly 100 to the meeting.

Rev. W. Murray Allen, Grand Forks, North Dakota, chairman of the Lions International board, and M. R. Mitchell, Seattle, member of the board, will be the honor guests of the main speakers on the program of the convention. Ed Shea, Portland, district president, and Frank Tate, Portland, district secretary, will be on the program, too. The Oregon clubs make up district thirty-six of the Lions International.

Convention headquarters will be at the Eugene hotel, the business sessions at the Osburn hotel. The convention opens with the start of the men's golf tournament Sunday afternoon. A musical festival in which the Eugene Gleemen, the Roseburg Gleemen, the Cottage Grove and other singing organizations and musical bands of the Willamette valley will participate, will be held Sunday afternoon in the auditorium of the University of Oregon campus.

A picnic supper on the banks of the Willamette and a band concert will be held in the evening. Monday brings the business sessions, the finish of the men's golf tournament, and the district governor's banquet and ball in the evening. Registration will be continued Monday. The Monday luncheon will be at the Osburn hotel.

This key members' breakfast will be held Tuesday morning and closing sessions of the convention will follow, including election of officers and selection of next year's convention place.

The Springfield Lions club is to be host to a fish fry up the McKenzie Tuesday for all delegates and visitors. The day will end with a big stunt light at the Rex theater.

Among speakers on the program during the convention will be Mayor Joe Carson of Portland, Mayor Elissa Large of Eugene, who is to give the address of welcome, and Victor P. Morris of the university.

The visiting women will be entertained at a number of events, including a luncheon and bridge party Monday; a breakfast and golf party at the Country club Tuesday morning of the convention. Election Judges To Scratch Out Name of Dodd

Judges of election at all the polling places in Lane county at the May primary elections Friday will cross out the name of E. P. Dodd, candidate for the nomination for the office of governor on the republican ticket, according to Walter B. Dillard, county clerk. Dodd has withdrawn from the race, official notice having been given Secretary of State Stadelman at Salem Friday.

Clark Dillard Saturday received a telegram from the secretary of state, instructing him to either have Dodd's name printed out on the republican tickets or have the judges cancel the name when the polls open as an alternative as provided by law. As the ballots are printed and sealed up in the ballot boxes and some of them already delivered, the clerk will simply instruct the judges to scratch out the name. This will probably be done as the ballot is delivered to the voter at the polls.

Grange Files List Of Campaign Costs

SALEM, May 12.—(AP)—The Oregon state grange expended \$372.15 in the campaign against the sales tax in support of the referendum measure on the ballot May 18 which if carried would repeal the sales tax law, notices filed with the secretary of state today revealed. The grange estimated it would expend \$400 more before the primary election.

Other expenses and estimates filed with the secretary of state, as required by a new legislative act, include that of the independent merchants association, also opposed to the sales tax, of \$103.75 already spent and \$10 to be spent.

Those in favor of the sales tax included the Oregon state teachers association, \$33.08 and estimated \$25.74 yet to be spent, and the
