Local Agents Are Named By Leonard

-saving foot pedal door-opening arrangements, known as the Len-A-Dor. This pedal, greatly improved, is a distinctive feature of the 1934 line of Leonard electric.

"Many entirely new features are included in the new Leonard," said the new dealer. "All were created with the convenience of the housewife as the main objective. Leonard this year offers 12 freezing speeds. In addition, what is known as vacation temperature is provided. Although the family may be away from home over a considerable period of time, vacation temperature will preserve the contents of the box at minimum operating cost. "Automatic quick freezing is also provided in the control assembly." The rearrangement tray, Mr. Stocker explained, fits below the bottom shelf. It can be partly drawn out and used in the rearrangement of the contents of the refrigerator, thus saving steps to and from the nearest table and much "dish-juggling." The tray, of specially-treated aluminum, also can be used in the loading of the refrigerator or for serving, as it is removable.
