

MERCHANTS ASKED TO BUY CONVENTION WELCOME PLACARDS

A plan to sell to the business men of Eugene placards of welcome to the Spanish war veterans as a means of assisting to finance the entertainment of the annual state convention of the United Spanish War Veterans here July 22-25 was presented to the merchants division of the chamber of commerce by the convention entertainment committee of the chamber Tuesday. The entertainment committee consists of Dr. R. C. Faust, chairman, F. L. Beard, J. A. McKevitt and F. A. Hand.

Attractive placards will be printed and placed in the windows of the merchant and business men who buy them. The committee has issued a warning that it has the exclusive right to all advertising of any nature for the convention and that none will be allowed unless it has the stamp of approval of the local camp of the Spanish war veterans or the sanction of the chamber of commerce.

The committee members are especially urging a spirit of co-operation in carrying out the plan of entertainment. Several hundred outside visitors will be here during the convention and a considerable sum of money will be spent by them while in the city for four days.

The placard to be placed in the windows of the business house will read as follows: "We extend a hearty welcome to the United Spanish War Veterans' convention, July 22, 23, 24 and 25. Beneath the inscription will be this line: 'Card approved by Camp No. 10, U. S. W. V.'"

cases in a fact amount not less than the cost of all silver purchased.

Silver certificates coming There would be maintained in the treasury as security for the silver certificates outstanding an amount of silver bullion and standard silver dollars of a monetary value equal to the face amount of the certificates.

All silver certificates would be legal tender and redeemable on demand in standard silver dollars and the secretary would be authorized to coin silver dollars for such redemption.

He would be further authorized, with the approval of the president, "to investigate, regulate and prohibit, by license or otherwise, the acquisition, exportation, or transportation of silver."

"We will answer anything anybody charges us with," Johnson said today when reminded that Darrow had intimated the second report would be more critical than the first.

The second report is expected to include the lumber industry code. Johnson said that while that code had been revised twice by NRA, "we'll revise it again if the board gives us helpful information."

NEW PLAN COMING

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(AP)—NRA Administrator Hugh S. Johnson announced today he had submitted to President Roosevelt a plan to "rationalize" the service code structure and another to establish future policy with respect to small industries.

NYE IS BITTER

square of unsweetened chocolate. Then add 1 teaspoon butter, continue stirring and cooking until it barely holds together when tested in cold water; softer than a soft ball. Remove from fire, add 1 level tablespoon of honey, but do not beat. Let stand until lukewarm, then add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat about 3 minutes until glossy. Shape into rolls or cut it into rough chocolate lumps.—Mrs. C. L. Huffer, 1819 Fairmount, Eugene.

Honey Icing

1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup honey
1 egg white

Bol sugar and water for a few minutes then add honey; be careful it does not boil over. Cook until drops of the syrup keep their form when poured into cold water or to about 250 degrees F. Beat the egg white until stiff and when the syrup has cooled slightly pour over the egg beating until the mixture will hold its shape. This frosting is suitable for between layers, but a little too soft for the top. It remains in good condition for weeks so a larger quantity may be made at one time and used as needed. This is nice to use between plain cookies.—Mrs. Fred E. Hughes, 795 7th Ave. West, Eugene.

Honey Crumb Pie

1/2 cup raisins.
3-4 cupful strained honey.
1/2 cupful hot water.
1 egg.
3-4 cupful of bread, cake or cookie crumbs.
1/2 cupful flour.
1 teaspoonful of cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon of nutmeg.
1-2 teaspoonful of ginger.
1/2 cupful of soft butter.

Line a pie pan with rich pastry and sprinkle the raisins over the bottom. Mix the honey with the hot water and beaten egg. Pour over the raisins, then sprinkle over the top the crumbs, flour, spices, and butter well mixed together. Place in a hot oven (450 degrees F.), until it begins to brown, then reduce the heat to (325 degrees F.) and bake for 20 minutes, or until firm in the center. Serve plain or with whipped cream.—Mrs. M. Johnson, 591 West Broadway, Eugene.

ROAD MONEY STORY

Carl Hayden, of Arizona, would reduce the federal highway appropriation in accordance with the wishes of President Roosevelt to \$100,000,000, and leave the remainder or any portion of it to be appropriated by the next congress, according to word received by the state highway department.

"Such a reduction in the federal appropriation at this time would completely disrupt the nature and distribution of the relief construction projects we have planned for the coming year," said Ballock. "It would bring employment relief operations on Oregon roads, which are now giving work to approximately 5,000 men, practically to a standstill after July 1."

No State Funds Available

"All new highway construction now under way on Oregon highways is being paid for out of federal funds. Ninety per cent of this work will be completed by July 1. No state funds are available with which to continue the program and without a sizeable federal appropriation we will have to close down on all major highway improvement jobs."

Ballock pointed out that reduction of the federal appropriation to \$100,000,000 for the coming year would reduce Oregon's share to about \$1,500,000 to be dispensed on a basis of \$750,000 on primary highways, \$325,000 on secondary highways and \$325,000 on primary routes through cities.

The highway commission would have to scrap the ratios by which it has been apportioning federal funds to the various districts of the state and concentrate the money in certain spots, or it would be compelled to disregard important unfinished projects.
