

## SILVER REJECTED BY EUROPEANS ON GOLD BASIS

PARIS, May 24.—(AP)—European countries still on the gold standard definitely decided against silver experiments such as suggested by President Roosevelt for the United States. It was learned from an authentic source here.

Following recommendation of a silver purchase plan by President Roosevelt, it was learned, directors of banks of issue in the gold countries were sounded out on the subject by the Bank of France.

All agreed by telephone they would not attempt a silver experiment, but would continue an all-gold standard. Bankers of Europe regard the silver supplement as "just another economic experiment before the United States returns to a gold standard."

It was understood American officials conversed with the Bank of France, and a ministry of finance spokesman to obtain an opinion on the country's feeling on bimetalism. It was pointed out that substantially Europe is sympathetic, although still impatient for the United States to cease experiments.

A prominent Frenchman observed: "If we tamper with the gold standard, we logically inaugurate a partial wheat coverage, inasmuch as wheat overproduction can assure a gold controlled price. In economic logic the wheat theory is the same as silver."

## Man's Death Caused By Cable Breaking

William A. McBride, 20, signal man at the Cronin Lumber company here, was fatally injured Wednesday when his cable broke after he had given his signal. He was caught in the logs and crushed. McBride was rushed to the Eugene hospital, where he died at 11 a. m. Thursday.

McBride had lived in Lane county for 14 years, having come here from Doty, Washington. He was a graduate of Crow high school. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McBride, and a sister, Ida McBride, all of route 3.

The funeral will be Saturday, May 26, at 2 p. m. at Veach's chapel. Dr. E. V. Silvers is in charge of the service.

until fluffy. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Add flavoring and pour into oiled layer cake pans about 7 inches across and bake in a moderate oven. Cool. Then spread with:

**Honey Crust:** Bring 2-3 cup honey and 1 tablespoon butter to a boil. Cook slowly 5 minutes. Cool. Spread half over first layer and sprinkle with about 3-4 cup chopped walnuts. Then glaze the top with the remaining honey mixture.—Mrs. H. L. Wright, Creswell.

**Excellent Honey Sponge Cake**  
Beat the yolks of 5 eggs very light, then add 1 cup of strained honey and beat 3 minutes longer. Sift in 1 cup of flour, beat 5 minutes, add beaten whites of 5 eggs, stirring lightly, and bake in very hot oven.—Mrs. Frank Miller, Box 216A, R. 2, Eugene.

**Honey Salad Dressing**  
3 tablespoons of salad oil  
2 tablespoons of honey  
1 tablespoon of lemon juice  
1-8 teaspoon of salt  
Beat the salad oil, honey, lemon juice and salt together until it is well blended. Use at once. This is excellent on fruit salads.—Mrs. Paul Garboden, Springfield.

**Honey Squares**  
1 cup strained honey  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 T. shortening  
1/2 cup cream  
1/4 t. salt  
Pinch of cream of tartar  
1 t. lemon extract  
Put shortening, salt, honey, cream and sugar into a saucepan; stir over slow fire until dissolved; then add cream of tartar. Boil until forms a hard ball when tested in water, or 252 deg. F. Remove from fire, stir in lemon extract and pour into greased pans. Mark into squares before cool. Wrap in waxed paper. Makes 25 squares. Mrs. O. K. Burrell, Eugene.

## Gas Hearing Ordered By Charles Thomas

SALEM, Ore., May 24.—(AP)—Public Utility Commissioner Charles M. Thomas today ordered a hearing here May 29 on the application of the Natural Gas Corporation of Oregon to sell its Cottage Grove plant to J. H. Chambers and son of Cottage Grove. The hearing was ordered under a law of 1933 requiring permission of the utility department for any sale. The gas corporation operates in many Oregon cities, but the Cottage Grove property was the only one involved in the proposal.

## PORTLAND SURGEONS TO TREAT INSKEEP

Norman Inskeep, employee at the Eugene state game farm, who was seriously injured Tuesday night in a motorcycle accident eight miles north of Roseburg, is to be taken to Portland Friday morning for bone surgery treatments. His present condition was not known.

son, Johnson's assistant. All any one would say afterward about the conversation was that it covered historic and pre-historic things from General Ulysses S. Grant on back.

It was not believed Darrow had sought out the visit with Johnson to discuss either civil war generals or their forerunners, but apparently he received no encouragement on conversation closer home.

The NRA administrator earlier had conferred a long while with President Roosevelt over plans for remodeling many NRA processes, designed to eliminate the causes of some of the existing complaints. Johnson appeared pleased at the outcome but announcements of the new policies were held in abeyance.

Senator Nye (R., N. D.), a supporter of Darrow, fired another shaft at the NRA. After demanding that congress stay in session until existing "abuses" are corrected, he asserted he intended to take the senate floor daily on this subject.

Because of activities at a review board hearing on the garment code, the Darrow group was the target for a denunciation by American Federation of Labor leaders who compose the NRA labor advisory board.

These dropped their own complaints and quarrels with Johnson to charge the board with the pandering "to the worst elements in our political and economic life."

## Pond and Sabelli Are Down in Wales

PORT TALBOT, Wales, May 24.—(AP)—Capt. George Pond and Lieut. Cesare Sabelli, enroute from Dublin to Rome, made a forced landing at Aberavon beach near here today. Pond, who was at the controls of their great orange monoplane, said engine trouble developed as they were crossing Bristol channel, and he decided to make a quick landing. The plane landed gently on the sands of the Aberavon beach promenade.

## Westerners Injured In Automobile Crash

NORRISTOWN, Pa., May 24.—(AP)—Hurtled from a highway to the

water-filled bottom of an 85-foot deep quarry hole when a rear wheel rolled off their automobile, two western businessmen escaped with minor injuries yesterday.

After climbing on their hands and knees up the almost perpendicular quarry wall, the men, Charles Fox of Marshfield, Ore., and R. M. Singer of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., hailed a passing motorist who took them to a hospital.

## Ancient Pipe Has Doubtful Origin; Boasts Long Use

Charles Sullivan, Eugene park superintendent or "park tender," as he prefers to be called, defies any pipe smoker in Eugene to produce a pipe as old or having a history equal to one which he owns.

Sullivan has a pipe that has been used for over a century. It was made by hand, by a convict serving a life sentence in either Sing Sing or Dannemora prison, he said. It bears the hand carved date of 1807 on the bowl.

A careful examination of the pipe leads to the belief that it is made of clay. The bowl is covered with an intricate design, all hand-carved. On the front of the bowl is pictured a jumping deer, done in a life-like manner. The date 1807 is carved under it. A solid silver ring adorns the stem. The pipe is highly polished.

Sullivan says the pipe was given him 25 years ago in New York City by a relative of the man who made it. He could recall only the first name of the donor—"Jonnie" a truck driver for a metropolitan newspaper.

Dannemora prison is located in upper New York and was built in 1845 to employ convicts in the mining and manufacturing of iron. This leads to the belief that the pipe was made in Sing Sing, as the date on the bowl indicates that it was made before Dannemora was established.

## 2 Salem Men Hurt As Train, Auto Meet

SALEM, Ore., May 24.—(AP)—When an automobile crashed into a railway train and knocked two cars from the track last night, two Salem men suffered only nominal injuries.

The men, W. H. Graham, 45, and J. E. Gunnsley, 55, were at a local hospital today. Attendees said their injuries were not serious.

The train was moving slowly on a spur track when the automobile, traveling at a high rate of speed, struck it. Two empty log cars were derailed by the impact but not damaged. The automobile was demolished.

## FEDERAL CARS NOT IMMUNE

SALEM, May 24.—(AP)—Vehicles operated by the Crater Lake national park under contract by the federal government are not immune from the state truck and bus licensing act, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle held in an opinion today. Van Winkle based his opinion on the fact that the vehicles are owned within the state and are only under contract to the federal government. The opinion was requested by Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner.
