Speaker Stopped

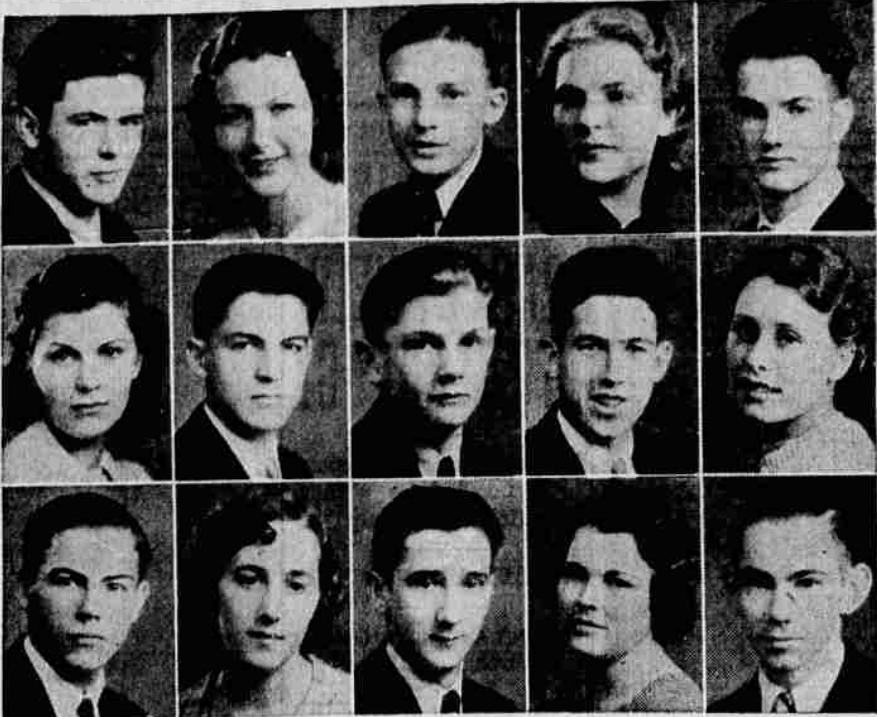
A detachment of 15 riflemen fired a volley into the air when part of a growing throng of some 1,500 persons tried to prevent militiamen from taking a prisoner in the crowd.

Nobody was hurt, and the guardsmen got their man. They said he was intoxicated, and had been trying to make a speech. A few minutes later, not far away, a guardsman fired on an automobile, he said the driver had failed to back out of guard lines upon order to do so.

The first injury of the day was reported mysteriously from women's and children's hospital. Nurses said they had admitted a man to the institution with a serious shotgun wound. How he was shot, or other details, were not immediately available.

4 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt.

Rub in 2 tablespoons shortening and mix to a light dough with ¼ cup milk.

Roll to a ¼ inch sheet, brush with 1 tablespoon melted butter and sprinkle with 2 cups green apples pared and sliced fine, ¼ cup seeded raisins chopped and 1 tablespoon each of sugar and cinnamon mixed together. Roll like jelly roll, moisten edges and pinch together and place in a greased baking dish. This should be slightly larger than the roll. Mix together ¼ cup light colored molasses and ½ cup light colored butter and 1 cup hot water. Pour over roll and bake, pasting frequently, in a moderate oven 350 degrees from 35 to 40 minutes. Serve hot with cream.—Mrs. Waldemar Christensen, route 2, Eugene.

Green Apple Pudding

Grease a pan with butter. Then put 1 cup brown sugar in the greased pan. Dot the brown sugar with 1 tablespoon butter. Pare, core and cut into eighths, 8 or 10 green apples according to size. Place the pieces of apple on the sugar. Then over the apples pour the following batter, mixed well:

2 eggs, beaten
1 cup brown sugar
4 tablespoons water
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup flour

1½ teaspoons baking powder
Bake 55 to 60 minutes in a moderate oven. Turn out on a platter while hot. This may be served with cream or whole milk with a little sugar and grated nutmeg.—Mrs. Fred E. Hughes, 705 W. 7th, Eugene.

Baked Stuffed Green Apples

6 large green apples
1 cup chopped bananas
1 cup raisins (chopped)
1 cup sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon

Chopped nut meats

Whipped cream

Wash, cut off the stem end of the apples, but do not peel. Remove all the core and part of the pulp leaving the walls of the cup about three-fourths inch thick. Mix bananas, raisins, sugar and cinnamon. Fill the cavities of the green apples with this mixture, cover with chopped nut meats, and bake in moderate oven until tender. Serve cold with a spoonful of whipped cream on top of each apple. This has a very delicious flavor.—Mrs. James A. Welch, 1397 Lincoln street, Eugene.

Green Apple Whip Tarts

Line muffin tins with a rich pastry, place in each tin a square of bread to keep them from shrinking when baked. Fill them with the following mixture:

To one quart of green apple sauce add 1 cup sugar and ½ teaspoon cinnamon and the whites of 2 eggs, beat this stiff. When ready to serve place on each one a spoonful of whipped cream flavored with a little cinnamon and place a small square of cream cheese on the side of plate.—Blanche Eckels, 1481 Lincoln street, Eugene.

Damage Mounts High

Meanwhile maritime commerce on the coast was all but paralyzed. Ships by the dozen were anchored in the streams of various ports, unable to load or unload. The strike which began with about 12,000 longshoremen quitting on May 9 had swelled to about 23,000, and 200 welders went out in Oakland this morning in a sympathetic move.

Costs of the strike mounted into the millions but there was no direct means of ascertaining the amount of loss in exact figures.

OREGON GOP WILL MAKE EFFORT TO RECOUP STRENGTH

Many political observers recognized manifestations of the older party interests attempting to influence the new movement, but the general attitude was that younger leaders would be able to iron out early difficulties and create a credible party organization, it was said.

One of the chief hopes of those supporting the move was that the new organization could re-formulate sound republican principles and then draw into the field candidates of high type to work out these policies.

With the possible exception of Rufus Holman, defeated candidate of the republican gubernatorial race have declared themselves for his election next November. It is reliably reported, Frank Longman, Sam Brown, and General U. G. McAlexander are said to have notified Dunne of their support. Holman is supposed to have tentatively aligned himself in the Dunne camp.

"Big Biz" Bourbon Now

Campaign observers, placing credence in the report that Os West is doing much of the work in the General Martin campaign, add to this the fact that big business interests and power groups appear to be upholding the democrats' war chest and deduct from that the fact that the republican candidate may expect wide support among the average voters of the state. This belief is accentuated by the known Dunne support among farmers, laborers, veterans and other lines of voters. Veterans, of course, will not vote for Martin to any great extent. His record is just the same as it was when they worked against him in the primary campaign, pointing out that his vote invariably was against veterans' interests.

Political observers see in the early stages of the campaign the likelihood that an attempt will be made to work Dunne into controversies of a personal nature, but most republican leaders believe Dunne will be too smart to enmesh himself in squabbles over personalities.

Hill Held Favored

In the speakership campaign, Earl Hill is generally rated as the most likely choice providing he goes to the legislature. George Winslow, of Tillamook, was mentioned in connection with the post, but straw ballots indicate his support is not general.

Lowell Paget, Portland, chairman of the group which sponsored the formation of the state republican clubs, is mentioned as a candidate, but it is not believed he will actively court Hill. In the event it becomes evident Hill cannot gather enough votes, however, Paget is expected to make a strong campaign. Traditionally, the speakership belongs to this district this session and so long as a man from this district is elected, Lane leaders declare they will be satisfied.

Sales Tax Dead

Informal conversations with representative house leaders gathered in Portland this week indicate that the sales tax will not be again considered when the legislature meets at Salem. Voters of the state have knocked this issue for terrific losses twice and candidates who have taken their political courage in their hands and gone to bat over this issue have suffered at the hands of the voters. As a result, legislators generally are fed up on that particular issue and declare they will not attempt to force it further.

This brings up the necessity of formulating some other plan to get needed revenue for the state, since indications are that there will be plenty of need for funds to take the place of the hoped-for sales tax revenue. Just what will be done is uncertain, but it is generally believed that Dunne may have some sort of program to offer the voters as a part of his campaign material. Those interested in legislative matters are watching with interest for an indication of what Dunne's program might be, if he decides to offer one.

Committee to Meet

Republican and democratic central committees will meet in Eugene, Saturday, June 2, at the court house. Joe Dunne is scheduled to be at the republican gathering to make a short address, according to Dr. M. C. Harris, chairman of the Lane county republican central committee, who conferred with Dunne in Portland Friday.

Election of chairman, state and national committees will be the principal jobs of the precinct committee. Dr. Harris will not be a candidate for the republican chairmanship this year and it is expected Fred Stickle will be one man boomed for this post. E. G. Bohneke is mentioned as a candidate for the post of state committeeman.
