

STRIKERS REJECT EMPLOYERS' OFFER OF PEACE PROGRAM

situation here and in other Pacific coast ports.

Edward F. McGrady, assistant secretary of labor, conducting settlement negotiations, also announced that a spirit of cooperation had been displayed in the meetings to arrive at a peaceful settlement.

"Reports that the strike is settled are absolutely untrue. The strike has just started and will probably involve other unions which have no connection with the marine industry," Mallen declared.

General Strike Expected

"The possibility of a general strike on the Pacific coast is almost a certainty. Even if the employers' proposal were acceptable, the longshoremen will not return to work until the other marine unions on strike also get a satisfactory settlement."

Mallen said the statement represented the attitude of the local I. L. A. branch, and added that the members were to meet tonight for further discussion on the situation.

The proposal, which came while injured were being carried from the scenes of rioting yesterday, would grant recognition to the International Longshoremen's association and joint operation of hiring halls at all ports.

One clause, however, declares for the "open shop" in stating that longshoremen shall be hired without regard to their membership or non-membership in any union.

STRIKERS TO VOTE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—(AP)—The most critical labor controversy Portland has experienced in a generation reached a crisis today.

Whether a longshoremen's strike which has bottled up commerce here for 21 days will be ended on terms agreed upon at conferences of negotiations at San Francisco last night, will be determined by the ballots cast by the International Longshoremen's association here.

Ben T. Osborne, secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, today urged the strikers not to accept the terms.

Should the proposal be rejected by the striking longshoremen, the outcome of the controversy is unpredictable, observers say.

NEW OUTBREAKS FEARED

TOLEDO, May 29.—(AP)—Threat of further rioting caused national guardsmen to be rushed to three automobile parts manufacturing companies today while federal mediators strove unavailingly to bring peace on Toledo's troubled labor front.

While one detachment patrolled the riot-torn Electric Auto-Lite plant, scenes of disturbances which killed two men and injured scores last week, other troops were called out by Col. William A. Marlin for riot duty at the Bingham Stamping company and Logan Gear company.

Guardsmen were ordered out when many offices were informed that unruly crowds, armed with bricks, stones and clubs, had gathered about the two plants and had voiced open threats against strikebreakers at work inside.

son made it impossible to find a solution of the problem of disarmament and declared:

"Armed peace is only an armistice—it is a negation of the basic principle of the Kellogg anti-war pact."

Then he suggested complete renunciation of armaments.

The Soviet official painted the world as seeking goals of national policies and as sometimes undertaking hostilities within the borders of neighboring states.

In suggesting that the conference be made a "permanent conference of peace" he warned the world that this machinery is necessary because there are dangers of a bloody war "rather a series of wars which include all continents and all humanity."

Ambassador Davis told the nations of the world that the United States is willing to join them "in a substantial and proportionate reduction of naval tonnage" and is likewise willing to join an international agreement regulating sales of war materials.

His statement regarding naval reductions were anticipatory of the great naval conference of 1935 which will seek to supplement the present naval agreement by which Great Britain, the United States, and Japan are armed at sea on a 5-5-3 ratio.

Ambassador Davis announced that the United States is willing to work out by an international agreement an effective system for the regulation of the manufacture and sales of arms and ammunition.

After quoting from President Roosevelt's message to congress concerning the traffic in arms, Davis declared:

"The people of the United States are aroused at the evils which are being revealed in the production of and traffic in the munitions of war."

Lightning Causes More Forest Fires

Three lightning fires that started during a storm Monday are being fought in the north Santiam section of the Willamette national forest, according to C. C. Olson, assistant supervisor of the forest. Aside from these fires in the woods there is one in a bog area in the same section of the forest.

The fires that started in the vicinity of McKenzie Bridge during a lightning storm Sunday evening have been extinguished, Mr. Olson said.

that those who had purchased property with the expectation of selling it at a future date at an increase in price, due to its desirability as business property, would be deprived of that opportunity. It was pointed out that churches, now in the business district would be unable to sell their property at a profit if the business district was limited and not allowed to spread over the area occupied by the churches.

Others attacked the proposal on a constitutional ground, declaring that it deprived citizens of their constitutional rights to build what and where they pleased.

The committee named to appear before the hearing consists of Prof. Kelly, Larry Watson, E. U. Lee, Marcus Petersen, Raymond Torrey and Loyal Rugh. The committee will meet at the Miner building at 4 o'clock Tuesday to prepare their formal protest which will be submitted later at the hearing.

Russell Joins Opponents

T. O. Russell, engineer, in voicing his disapproval of any kind of zoning ordinance for this city, traced the development of business during the years since 1909, declaring that every new important business block had been built south of Broadway and east of Willamette with the exception of the Public Market. He stated the business district tends to move toward the center of population which, in Eugene, was established by a government survey at Fifteenth and Oak.

He mentioned Eugene churches with buildings near the business district, declaring that they probably had been built with the view of selling the property at the end of the average life of 25 years for a church building, hoping to profit by an increase of the price of the lot due to its value as a business property. He said it would be unfair to take this profit from the churches.

"I apologize for my part in the early stages of zoning plans for this city and declare now that I am against any form of zoning ordinance for this city," Russell declared amidst applause.

Other speakers who spoke against the plan were N. R. Gaylord, Raymond Torrey, F. G. Reese, Al Williamson and others.

BLACK WIDOW STORY

cer, was ordered to obtain immediate member, who purposely let a "black widow" spider bite him to determine the effect on human beings.

Dr. Blair had made a study of the insects several months watching the effect of their bites on mice, rats, guinea pigs, and other small animals, and injecting the venom hypodermically.

The results still left the question in Dr. Blair's mind as to whether the venom was poisonous to human beings.

After keeping a specimen for ten days, he let the glossy, black, red-spotted spider bite his left little finger.

Then he recorded his symptoms.

The bite was followed by a stinging sensation. Pain rapidly followed in his hand, then the forearm, and up to the arm-pit.

The pain in the arm was followed by cramps in the abdomen, dizziness and sub-normal blood pressure. Dr. Blair refused treatment until the effect on the heart muscles had been recorded on the electro-cardio-graphic table.

He then went to bed and his pain was relieved by opiates.

For two days he was unable to eat, but after three days his strength began to return, and today he is hale and hearty.

But a question still remains, does the bite of the spider immunize the person bitten?
