Loses Federal Job For Raising Funds
WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP).—President Roosevelt's approval of Secretary Morgenthau's today suspended Alvin F. Fitz, Philadelphia collector of internal revenue, and five other employees on charges of soliciting political funds from civil service employees. Morgenthau said the suspension was effective pending an investigation by the civil service commission and a ruling on charges that political funds had been collected on the premises of a federal building—a double violation of law, it found sustained.

Ballot Titles Are Finished Tuesday
SALEM, May 30.—(AP).—The ballot title for the last of the 18 initiative proposals which will be circulated for signatures was prepared today by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle. This was the proposal by the Oregon State grange to convert the corporation excise tax to the common school fund. The petitions may now be circulated, and must be signed by 5,667 voters by July 5, to appear on the November ballot. The grange proposal would appropriate all over \$5000, not to exceed \$2,000,000, of corporation excise taxes to the school fund, and would repeal the present deduction of personal property taxes from the corporation excise tax.

Cable Snaps, Man Severely Injured
Fractures in both legs were suffered by Ben Russell, 455 West Seventh avenue, Tuesday afternoon when he was struck by a snapped cable at the Eugene Sand and Gravel plant on Franklin boulevard. Mr. Russell's condition was described as "quite favorable" Wednesday morning by his physician at the Pacific hospital, where he was taken. Both bones in each leg are severely fractured below the knee, and Mr. Russell also has a head injury. Whether his skull is fractured has not been determined.

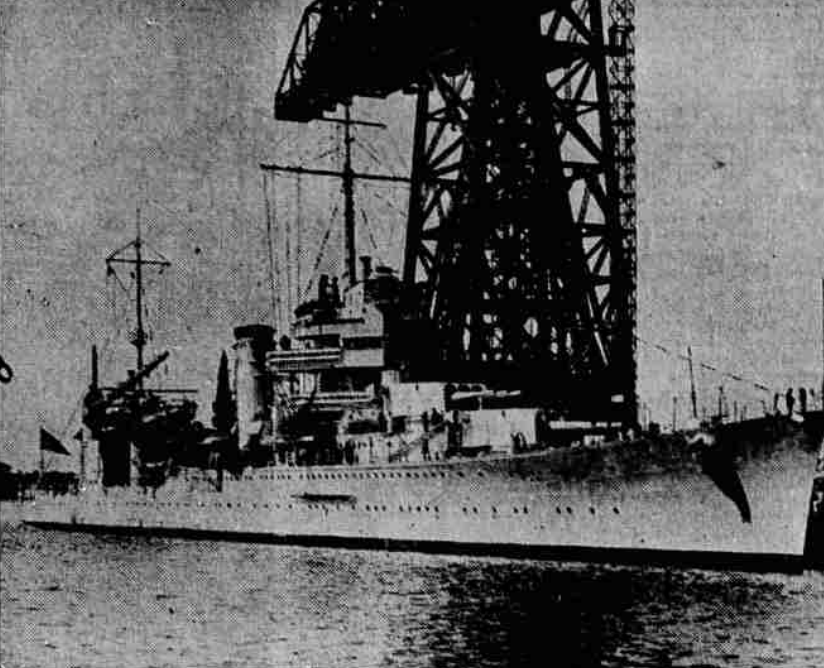
