

HEARING ON FUEL COST PRICES SET

A hearing on wood production costs in this area will be held at the Eugene chamber of commerce Saturday evening at 7 o'clock. It was announced Friday by C. A. Huntington, of the code board.

Clair McKinney, Salem, member of the compliance board for district number 43 of the retail solid fuel industry code, will be here to conduct the hearing. All fuel dealers, producers of forest wood, consumers, representatives of labor and any others interested are urged to be present.

The wood prices submitted for this district have been found out of line with prices in other districts and must be changed, Huntington said. The purpose of this hearing is to get accurate information of production costs since prices are based on these costs.
