

ONE O. N. G. MEN PREPARE FOR CAMP TO BEGIN JUNE 11

The four Oregon national guard units in Eugene and Springfield are preparing for the annual encampment at Camp Clatsop, between Astoria and Seaside, beginning June 11. The camp is always attractive to young citizen soldiers and as usual is reported to be quite full in all the companies.

The encampment will last 15 days of state training. The supply crew will leave Salem for the camp site on Friday, June 5, and the other units will leave their respective stations on Saturday.

The local companies are Company (Machine gun unit), 188 Infantry, Captain J. C. Koepke commanding; Company C, 162nd Infantry, Captain James Meek commanding; the medical detachment, 15th Infantry, Major D. S. Stannard commanding; all of Eugene and the headquarters detachment, first battalion, 162nd Infantry, Captain C. A. Swartz commanding, Springfield.

The Cottage Grove company of the state artillery will serve at one of the coast forts and Lieutenant Alvin O. Waller, head of all the units here, will serve at Fort Lewis, back later in the season.

PORTLAND BUTTER PRODUCTION HIGH

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—Continued heavy flow of butterfat is keeping local production to the highest point not only of the season, but for all time. This is due to the increased churning operations of ice cream manufacturers who are turning their surplus butterfat into butter.

There was no change in current values on either cubes or prints for the day.

There was no change in egg market prices or conditions for the day. Late receipts of fresh stock have been decreased but demand is being hurt by the sale of storage eggs as fresh arrivals.

Demand for live chickens of all sorts remains good locally and without general price change. There were only moderate offerings reported out of Oregon sections.

Prices are being generally maintained in the hog market for country killed offerings and there is a good call for beef and especially for bulls. Lambs and veal remain weak and in overload.

Liberally increased shipments of strawberries were shown and this is considered the most vital influence in the market. Shipments to outside points are still moderate, notwithstanding its possibilities.

There is a better movement in the loganberry market although only a fractional improvement was shown in price. Raspberries were also a trifle more active and slightly increased in price.

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Greyhound Racing Season Open Tonight

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—The 1934 greyhound racing season will open at Multnomah Stadium tonight.

Hundreds of the fleet dogs including many of last year's favorites, and many newcomers from Florida, California and Australia are kennelled at Heaverton and other Portland suburbs for the 90-day racing season.

The races will be run nightly except Sunday.

Speculation Fails To Spur Wool Mart

BOSTON, June 1.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The interest—evidently speculative—which was shown a week or two ago by certain mills in bright fleeces, on account of their relative cheapness, has flattened out again and the market is decidedly dull so far as spot transactions are concerned."

"In the country, likewise, there has been a slowing up in the bright wool states and only odd lots as were being taken are being bought—as in Texas for average 12 months wools around 64-70 cents, lean landed, Boston."

"Foreign markets have been generally slow."

"Stories from the piecegoods markets are somewhat conflicting but generally indicate a dull market with no particular sense of direction."
