

LIONS CLUBS PICK GILLENWATERS AS DISTRICT GOVERNOR

Resolutions of appreciation to Eugene and all assisting with the successful convention, and to state and international officers; and to a move to have the Lions clubs of Oregon support a proposed act to have the state board of control administer to the eligible needy blind of the state, were before the convention during the early afternoon session.

Reports read Tuesday asked for an appropriation to buy new radios and make other needed improvements on radios at the children's farm home at Corvallis, the Lions state radio committee making the request which was turned over for decision at the early afternoon session. Other reports stressed one or more major activities for all clubs, and gave recommendations on improved programs for club meetings. The credentials committee reported 78 delegates in convention session.

More than 200 men and women from outside points registered for the entire convention, the registration booth reported Tuesday noon.

Blind Orchestra Plays
Dr. Harry W. Titus, president of the Eugene club, presided at the noon luncheon at the Eugene hotel. The blind school orchestra played. An impressive feature of the luncheon meeting was the marching around the room of the 30 Boy Scouts from Portland, all playing their instruments. Wade Bishop was introduced as leader of the group. The Eugene Kiwanis club Yodeling Yippers sang four numbers as another feature and for the rest of the music the Texas Longhorns performed.

The annual governor's banquet and ball was an event of Monday evening at the Osburn hotel, places being laid for 275. Dr. Paul Dutton, president of the Portland club, was toastmaster and Fred Walker, past district governor, presided.

Creative Work Urged
A stirring address was given at the meeting by Rev. W. Murray Allan, Grand Forks, N. D., chairman of the Lions International board of governors, who was the chief speaker for the evening.

He discussed Lionism as it applies to the world at large and as it is related in the general service club movement. Men of the service club must adjust themselves to make contributions to assure mankind that it is headed in the right direction, he told the club.

"We must think in creative terms, think courageously, think unselfishly, think originally, think in facts, think in the remote and the immediate, think in the probabilities and possibilities, think in the reality," he declared, adding, "our thinking must not be superficial but come from way down deep."

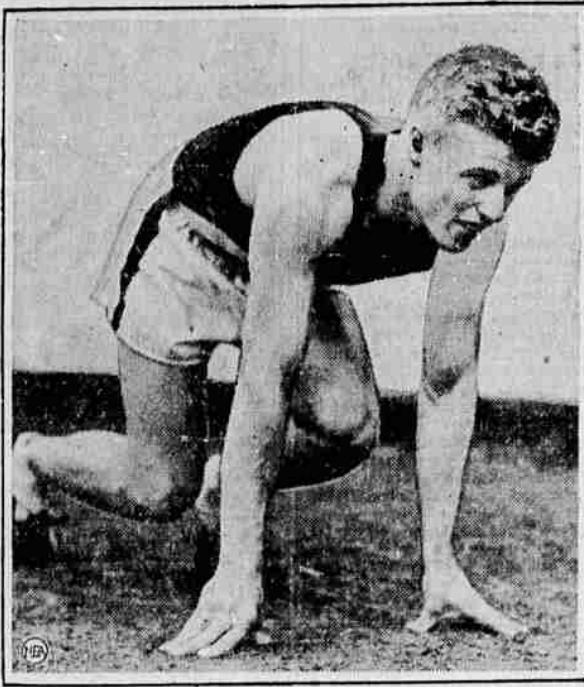
World Big Neighborhood

"It must be remembered, however, that the pageant presentation is a tremendous undertaking and will require the united support of every citizen, civic organization and other groups of the city."

Tentative plans discussed Tuesday morning call for a pioneer parade and an industrial parade to be held in connection with the show.

The pageant proper will be presented each evening and it is thought a Sunday evening presentation may be arranged in order to allow those who would be unable to come to the city on any other night, due to living a considerable distance away, to see the presentation.

Cal Young Ready
Members of the board and the chamber committee felt that a Sunday evening presentation would be necessary to assure sufficient revenue to make the show self-supporting. It

was pointed out that a proper atmosphere of reverence would accompany the Sunday evening presentation of the pageant so that it would not be objectionable from any standpoint.

Cal Young, who had charge of the pioneer features of the last pageant and who has been actively interested in the presentation this year, expressed satisfaction that the show was to be held this year.

"This is the proper year to give the pageant and I am very glad the decision was made as it was," Mr. Young declared. "We have on hand stock and pioneer equipment and pioneers of the county are solidly behind the plan for the pageant this year. The presentation has been postponed from year to year till it began to look as though the pageant were dead and buried and pioneers of the county felt that if it were not revived this year, it never would be."

With headquarters established and committees appointed, actual work on the pageant will get under way and rehearsals started, Mr. Rosson said. While it is only a short time before the time to present the show, Mr. Rosson pointed out that the preparation will be much simpler this year and it is believed there will be no difficulty in getting ready for the show by the end of July.

Names of those who underwrote the pageant will be published as soon as they are tabulated, it was announced by Joseph Koke, chairman of the chamber pageant committee, who had charge of underwriting the event.

RAIN TOO LATE

CHICAGO, June 5.—(AP)—Rain has come to parched farms of the west, but in many places too late to pour life back into burned grain fields.

Water was still precious in spite of heavy rains in seven states last night. Additional rains were forecast generally for the ravaged area, leading hope that the peak of six weeks drought damage has been reached. Although rain fell in Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, Nebraska and Indiana, a survey showed today that much of the early small grain was beyond redemption and the need for immediate relief acute.

Water Shortages Loom

South Dakota farmers, their small grains heavily damaged, watched for rains to save forage crops.

Idaho estimated its water supply only 16 per cent of normal. Double the \$250,000 drought relief fund granted the state was declared necessary to save imperiled districts.

In Utah the water supply was from 10 to 40 per cent normal. Its \$600,000 drought relief program was

estimated to make up only from 15 to 20 per cent of the deficiency. A plan was considered of moving farmers out of the worst drought areas.

Water supplies in Iowa towns constitute one of the most serious hazards at present, A. H. Wieters, chief sanitary engineer of the state, said. In western and northwestern Iowa most communities depended on shallow wells, some of them already facing shortages.

RANGES DRY UP

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Although the situation now is not described as "critical," range conditions in southeastern Oregon are becoming serious, it was pointed out here today by Paul C. Newman, assistant federal crop statistician.

Already in Harney and Malheur counties, an area embracing the great livestock country of Oregon, ranges have seared and dried and the stock water supply is diminishing. Recent rains have materially aided the wheat crop in eastern Oregon.

In southeastern Oregon stockmen already are hauling water from streams, as water holes dry up. Harney, Malheur, Jefferson and Wheeler counties are described as "very dry."

With 50 additional applications received over the week-end, tryouts for the new women's chorus will probably have to be extended to Wednesday evening in order that all applicants

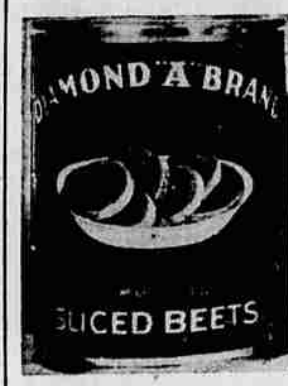
may be judged, John Stark Evans, director, stated Tuesday.

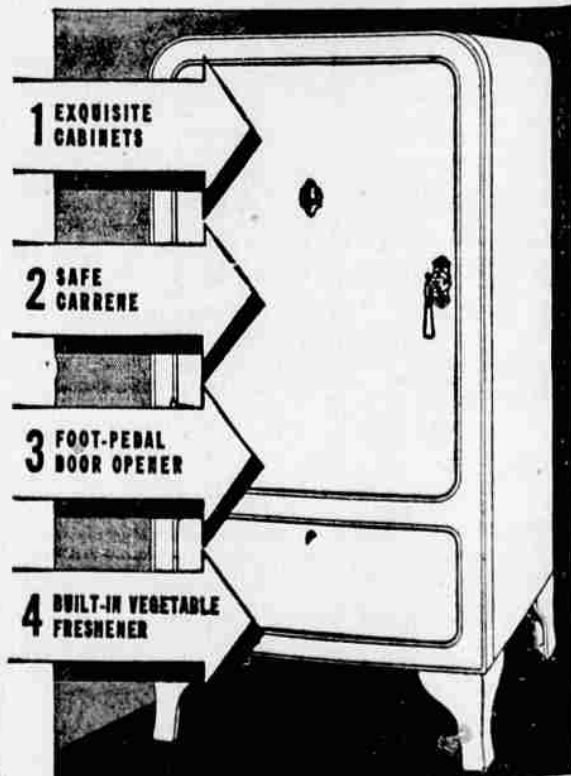
