Boys Defy Death In Escaping From Jail in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—In a daring escape in which death by an eight-story fall was at all times imminent, Charles Barnes, 15, and Harry Heurer, 17, broke from the juvenile ward of the county jail here today.

The boys used an iron bed post to spread one of the quarter-inch bars at the window. They crawled through the opening which looks down on a concrete-paved light well floors below, and reaching to their full height, grasped the ledge of the roof and pulled themselves to the top.

From there they went to a corner of the building where there were two ropes holding a platform on which building cleaners had been working. The boys used these ropes to slide to the ground level.

The escape was accomplished some time between 4 a. m. and 7:30 a. m.
