

Derby Won By Windsor Lad, 100 To 9 Shot Local Wheat Up Cent; Oil, Metals Lead Gains

FAVORED COLOMBO PLACES THIRD IN ENGLISH CLASSIC

EPSOM DOWNS, June 6.—(P)—Windsor Lad, an outsider in the betting today won the 150th running of the English derby.

Easton, second choice in the wagering, was second and Colombo, the favorite, third.

Windsor Lad, quoted at 100 to 9, carried the silks of the Maharaja of Rajpalia while Easton represented Lord Woolvington. Colombo, unbeaten in nine previous races carried the silks of Lord Glanville.

Colombo upset

Colombo, which beat Easton by a length in the two thousand guineas, went to the post the choice at 6 to 4 of the crown of 250,000, including the king and queen. Easton was sold after the two thousand guineas by Ralph Strassburger, of Philadelphia, to Lord Woolvington for \$75,000.

Tiberius, running for Sir Abe Bailey, was fourth to finish the one and one-half mile journey while William Woodward's Bondsman, the only American owned horse in the field, was unplaced.

Windsor Lad, ridden by I. Smirke, finished a length in front of Easton while a neck separating the latter from the fast closing Colombo, 100 to 9 shot.

After a mad rush in the first quarter of a mile, Medieval Knight took the lead from Colombo and Bondsman. At famous Tattenham corner, Tiberius was in the lead but Smirke had rushed Windsor Lad into second place with Medieval Knight and Colombo close behind. In the long home stretch, the Maharaja's colt, proved the gamer as he held command in a driving finish.

The official odds quoted Windsor Lad at 100 to 9, Easton at 15 to 2, and Colombo at the short price of 11 to 8. In view of Colombo's dominance in the betting there was a special pool in which Windsor Lad was held at 18 to 1.

Practices will be held Wednesday night, with the Register-Guard and McDonald teams to appear at the freshman field and Dinty's slated for the high school diamond. All will be at 6 o'clock.

Because of many substitutions, it was difficult to keep a box score, so, with all due credit to Dinty's for their victory, we'll run today only the names of those girls turning out.

N. Y. YANKS BACK IN PROMISED LAND

NEW YORK, June 6.—(AP)—New York Yankees enjoyed a three percentage point advantage over Detroit today in the American league.

Detroit split a doubleheader with Cleveland, winning the first 20 to 2, and dropping the nightcap, 5 to 4.

At the same time, the Yankees, minus the presence of Joe Mauer, lost to the Boston Red Sox, 8 to 3.

The Philadelphia Athletics and Washington split their doubleheader, the Senators winning the opener 4 to 3, and dropping the second, 8 to 7.

Both were 10 inning contests. Chicago defeated St. Louis Browns 2 to 1, but the Browns came back to take the second game, 10 to 5.

In the National, St. Louis Cards defeated the Chicago Cubs 6 to 3, while New York hammered out a 13 to 4 win over Boston. Brooklyn lost a doubleheader to the Phillies, while the Pirates and Cincinnati Reds were rained out.

The ability of the Los Angeles Angels to come from behind and defeat their Pacific Coast league opponents started the 1933 champions off on another successful week today.

The Angels were a run behind when they entered the ninth inning of their contest with the San Francisco Seals yesterday. In less than no time, so it seemed, the league leaders filled the bases, an infield error let in a run, and an infield roller scored another. In their half of the final frame the Seals had a double and a single but could not produce the tying run, so the game ended in an Angel victory, 5 to 4. It was the 12th win of the campaign for Ray Thomas, Los Angeles right-hander.

In the only other game played yesterday in the circuit, Seattle defeated Portland, 7-3, by an eighth inning rally that scored four runs. Mike Hunt's homer helped the Seattle cause. Craghead was the winning pitcher and Bryan the loser.

The Oakland-Sacramento and Missions-Hollywood contests were called off because of wet grounds.

PAYNE SLAUGHTERS CAVELLI TUESDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—(P)—With a cool, calculated, murderous attack Cecil Payne found his range and scored a technical knockout over Ernie Cavelli in the third of a scheduled 10-round fight here last night.

The four knockdowns which brought the decision climaxed a spectacular card on which five of the six fights ended in knockouts. It was whole hog or none in every fight.

Cavelli, 138, Walla Walla, took the first two rounds on aggressiveness, while Payne studied his style and sent a few feeler rights at his face. Then in the third the devastation started. Payne, 141, Louisville, Ky., floored Cavelli with a looping right 20 seconds after the round started. At the count of nine Cavelli clambered to his feet and ran into another knock-down punch.

The Walla Walla Italian advanced definitely, only to be dropped with a short right. When he laboriously regained his feet, with the aid of the ropes, he was doubled with a left to the midriff and then spun around with another right. The referee saved him from further punishment.

Deep, satisfying revenge was gained by Bud Chambers, 163, when he stopped Tiger Jimmy Monroe, 160, in the second round of a scheduled four-rounder. Two weeks ago Monroe knocked out Chambers.

The only bout which did not end in a knockout went to Orrie Krepps, 132, Portsmouth, on a decision after he knocked down Ike Bostwick, 134, Portland.

Local Wheat Up Cent; Oil, Metals Lead Gains

CARROTS, BEETS DROP; PRICE ON SPINACH IS CUT

Wheat advanced a cent in Eugene Wednesday. The new buying price per bushel is 74 cents for red and white wheat.

Carrots and beets and now being bought at 30 cents a dozen bunches by local grocers. The top price for several weeks has been 40 cents.

Shading of the price of spinach was indicated in the report Wednesday that some producers are getting only 3 cents a pound. The demand has fallen off recently, grocers state.

Because Salem cherries are being shipped in here for 4½ cents a pound, local producers are asking and getting 5 cents for Bing and Royal Annes.

Strawberries are almost a thing of the past, growers state. Clinton Shiley of Goshen, who has been getting a dime or 15 cents a crate more than anyone else all season for his Dewey's, reports that he will have berries only every two or three days from now on, and other growers are making similar reports.

The new hay crop is not in yet, although some is being harvested. The first cutting of alfalfa has been put in, and the second cutting is now in progress. The rain Wednesday morning is not expected to do much damage since not enough hay is on the ground yet.
