Housewives' Forum

Orange Bread
(This is one time you don't have to throw away your peel.)
1/2 cup ground orange peel.
1/2 cup water.
1 1/2 cup sugar.
1 beaten egg.
3-4 cup milk.
1 Tablespoon melted butter.
3 cups flour.
3 teaspoon baking powder.
Simmer rind in water until tender, add sugar and cook to thick syrup. Add butter and cool. Stir in beaten egg, milk and sifted dry ingredients. Bake in loaf pan about 45 minutes in moderate oven. This is a sure fire success for picnics, either buttered or plain. Nuts may be added or used between slices. More like cake than bread.—Mary D. Radmore, 1292 W. 5th, Eugene.
Baked Whole Oranges
Grate slightly the skin of small whole oranges and boil the fruit 30 minutes to make the peel tender. When cool cut a slice from the blossom end, pull out the core, and stuff in 1 teaspoon butter, and 1 tablespoon sugar. Place in a covered baking dish, add 1 cup pineapple juice, then water to make the dish two-thirds full. Bake closely covered about an hour and a half until the fruit is tender in moderate oven (375 degrees). Lift the oranges from the syrup and serve hot or cold with a sauce made as follows:
Orange Sauce—Measure the remaining syrup in the dish and for each 3/4 of a cup of liquid allow 1 tablespoon of cornstarch mixed to a paste with 1/4 cup of orange juice. Bring the liquid to a boil, thicken with the paste, stirring constantly and when sauce is smooth and thick cook it slowly for 5 minutes longer.
Baked oranges, hot or cold, make an unusual accompaniment for meat, or they may be used as dessert. In the latter case, a nice variation is to place in the top of each a marshmallow delicately browned or a spoonful of whipped cream.—Miss Helen Christensen, route 2, Eugene.
Candied Grapefruit Peel
(2 grapefruit peels)
Remove grapefruit peel in quarters. Cover with water to which 1 teaspoon salt has been added. Boil 20 minutes. Drain. Repeat process twice, omitting salt. Cut in strips. Cover with fresh water and boil until peel is tender, 20 to 30 or more minutes longer. Drain. Bring 1 cup sugar and 1/2 cup water to boil. Add peel. Boil gently until syrup is nearly absorbed. Drain. Roll in sugar. This may be colored by adding vegetable coloring to the syrup. Spiced Peel—A little cinnamon, clove, and ginger may be added to syrup.
Chocolate-Coated—Coat strips of candied peel with melted dipping chocolate.
Candied peel may be put inside date and rolled in sugar. This may also be used to decorate cakes, pies and cookies.
Also good in all puddings and desserts.—Miss Frances Pruitt, Crow Stage, Eugene.
