The Eugene Townies will cross bats with the Albany Aces at the Lane County fairgrounds, today in a regular scheduled Oregon State League game. This will be the first of a three game series to be played between these two teams this season. Last year the Townies won 2 out of 3. The tilt is called for 2:30.

Tomorrow's game will see two youngsters opposing each other from the mound, as Bill Reinhardt will probably send the elongated Wilshire against Treadway Charles. Both better than average pitchers. Wilshire pitched for the University of Oregon freshmen whereas Charles has been pitching for Monmouth Normal. Charles was enrolled here at Oregon but was ineligible.

New Faces Seen
Albany will have two new faces in their catcher and first baseman, both of which are very capable players, and must very well be in order to replace Bill Wilkinson who with McClain have been catching for Albany for a good many years. Wilkinson is one of the most dangerous hitters in the league and probably will be used elsewhere. Their first baseman is a newcomer in these parts, having been with the Missions in their training camp.

Receiving Bob Wilshire will be Dick Bishop. Both Bob and Dick Bishop are ineligible for Townies baseball up to now on account of being enrolled in the University of Oregon.

Joe Gordon and Ray Koch with a doubt the snappiest keystone combination outside of organized baseball, will be seen at short and second tomorrow. Both of these boys are capable of entering professional baseball right now but have made up their minds to finish their education at least before taking a try at the professional game.

Albany so far has won 3 games and lost none, and are now heading the league, whereas the Townies are fairly well down the list.

Jack Gordon has a batting average of .500 having made 4 hits out of 8 times to bat. Hong also has an average of .500 for 6 hits out of 12 times at bat. Cotter Gould has smashed out 3 of 7 for an average of .429.

The Register-Guard girls baseball team will tangle with the Dinty's girls softballers Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Swimmer's Delight in the last pre-season tilt before the regular schedule gets under way Monday evening.

Both clubs have practiced several times this week, and both are confident of victory. This will be the initial meeting of the teams in a regular game, and the girls will get their first test under fire.

Duck 1933-1934 Athletic Annals Reveal Success

Fighting University of Oregon teams continued the run of Webfoot athletic successes by winning a championship in baseball, second in track, third in golf, and second in tennis for their spring record.

Possibly the most outstanding team in the quartet of sports was the university track and field team, coached by the perennial Bill Hayward, who is in his thirty-first year at the Webfoot institution. The first meet, the relays with the Oregon State representatives, ended in a 4-4 tie. In the second affair, with Washington May 12, the much-abused dope bucket was kicked all around the field, and the Ducks squeezed through with a 67-64 victory over the heavily favored Huskies.

Despite this startling victory, the Lemon-Yellow was predicted a heavy loser to Washington State, and although the Staters came through, it was only by a 72-59 victory. In the closest meet of the season, the Webfoots came out victors in a surprising strong Oregon State team, 68-64.

The track and field season for Oregon was closed in a blaze of glory June 2, when the W. S. C. Cougars won the conference track meet, 44-12 to 42-7-12 for Oregon and 40 for Washington. The Webfoots were leading until the final event, the discus, where W. S. C. collected eight points and the victory.

The outstanding performance of the meet, from an Oregon point of view, was the javelin, where Bobby Part, surpassed all previous efforts to hurl the spear out 220 feet, 7 1/2 inches, for a new northwest record. This establishes the tow-headed captain of the grid forces next fall as the best thus far in the nation. Other features were Bob Wagner's thrilling victory in the two mile, Bud Shoemaker's mark of 30.6 in the hundred, and the upset victory of the Oregon plowboys in football and basketball, Scharpf, Bowerman, Burr.

Oregon men who qualified this season for the National Collegiate meet at Los Angeles June 22-23, include Bud Shoemaker in the 100 and 220, Bob Wagner in the mile, Maxon McCoy in the high hurdles, and Bob Parke in the javelin. At this time it seems that Wagner and Parke will be the only representatives of Oregon. Men who will be lost to the Oregon team next year include Burr, McCoy, and Bowerman.

OLIN DUTRA WINS GOLF OPEN WITH GARRISON FINISH

MERION CRICKET CLUB, PHILADELPHIA, June 9.—(AP)—Swarthy Olin Dutra, 33-year-old Californian of Portuguese extraction, who has been so ill during the past few weeks that he doubted his ability to withstand the tournament strain, shot from the rear today to overhaul a pack of faltering pace-setters and win the 1934 open golf championship of the United States.

The last man to finish in the entire field and his deciding shot the last to be played in the 88th annual tournament, Dutra came from behind to whip Gene Sarazen, stocky former champion, by a single stroke, 294 to 293 for the regulation 72 holes.

Dutra Comes Up
Eight strokes behind the front-running Bobby Cruikshank, at the end of 36 holes, and five shots back of Sarazen at the same stage, Dutra unfurled two sensational rounds today to overhaul them both, with only four holes to go, and then outplayed them decisively down the stretch.

Dutra posted successive rounds of 76-74-71-72 for his victorious total as he carried off the open crown for the first time. Sarazen, making a strong bid for his third title, saw it fly from his grasp when he took a weird seven on the 11th hole of the final round, and finished with scores of 73-72-73-78 for his 294.

Cox, Cooper Share Tie
In a triple tie for third place with Cruikshank, the Richmond, Va., professional, who tossed away a gorgeous chance for triumph today with 71-71-77-76—295, were Whiffy Cox, the Brooklyn veteran, also the victim of some bad luck, and Lighthouse Harry Cooper of Chicago, who came out of the pack with one of the day's best finishes to wind up with 73-74-74-71—295.

Buried almost out of sight in the rush was the departing champion, youthful Johnny Goodman, Omaha amateur, who had final rounds of 82 and 75, a grand total of 311 for 72 holes, 18 shots back of the winner and in a tie for 43rd place.

Split Season Is Result of Angels' Lead

LOS ANGELES, June 9.—(AP)—A split season for the Pacific Coast league was believed assured today by agreement of David P. Fleming, president of the pace-setting Los Angeles club, to a divided schedule.

Fleming wrote Hyland W. Baggerly, league president, proposing that the second half of the race start July 3 to stimulate attendance. The Angels' 15-game lead has dulled fans' interest in the campaign Fleming said.

Previously, advocacy of a split season had come informally from other club owners. With the Angels definitely in line, it was believed almost certain here that the proposal will be adopted.

There seems to be a demand that we split the schedule, Fleming wrote. "Thus far no one has made any move in that direction. Therefore Los Angeles club will advance in the proposal in an effort to create more interest in Coast baseball."

The Angel head stipulated, however, that his players should receive an award of some character if they fail to finish first in the second half. He said the club was being "unselfish" in the matter, "although it seems unfair to both our players and Manager Jack Leiselt to forfeit such a commanding lead."
