

U. O. GRADUATES RECEIVE DEGREES HERE ON MONDAY

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American people," he said. "This job will require all the skill the universities can give you, and all the ambition and energy you can muster."

At the impressive ceremony academic degrees and other awards were conferred upon 520. Of this total, 487 were made bachelors of art or sciences, or received the higher degrees of master of arts or sciences. Two received the hood of doctor of philosophy, the highest that can be attained, and 30 others secured certificates.

Kerr Praises Unification

The organization work done by the state board of higher education during the four years that the present graduating class has been in the university has been watched with interest by the entire country, Dr. W. J. Kerr, chancellor of higher education, told those present. A demand for elimination of duplications and rivalries and greater co-operation and efficiency of state-supported higher educational institutions has also been made in many other states, he pointed out. The Oregon plan is now regarded as successful, with each of the institutions functioning in its own field, and all working for the greatest interest of the entire system and the state as a whole.

Boyer Stresses Ideals

Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the university, in his farewell message to the students, pointed out to them that there were no grades of "C" or "D" in the life they were entering. "You cannot adopt an attitude of just 'getting by' as some do during their college years," he said. "The world's measurement is either success or failure."

Advantages of a university education, cited by Dr. Boyer, included the inculcation of admiration for things admirable, establishment of high ideals of service, and a realization of the better things in life and ambition to attain them.

William L. Marks, chairman of the board of higher education, brought greetings and best wishes from that body to the graduates. Gifts to the university during the past year were announced by Burt Brown Barker, vice-president. Cash and property with a definite cash value amounted to approximately \$100,000, while numerous other gifts of books and supplies were made.

World Needs Youth

The world needs the genius and energy and creative ability of youth more than ever before, and if world, national and local conditions are to be righted, young men and women must form a vigorous, aggressive "rear guard," it was declared Sunday by Rev. David James Ferguson, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Astoria, in his baccalaureate sermon before graduates of the university and friends.

After describing the exploits of young men and women who at other times have led the world out of chaos, or who have made great scientific or art contributions, Dr. Ferguson declared that the world, since the world war, has been in a state of "retreat." He pointed out that during the maneuver of retreat, the rear guard must bear the burden until such a time as forces can stiffen this "rear guard" and not only halt the retreat, but start the march forward again.

The baccalaureate service was especially impressive as the Eugene Gleemen furnished the music. The group sang "Prayer of Thanksgiving," by Kremsier, "Now Let Every Tongue," by Bach; the beautifully harmonious "Hosanna Praise," by Lvovsky, and the impressive "O Fill us with Thee," by Leising. Rev. Bryant Wilson, pastor of the First Baptist church, Eugene, gave the invocation.

MANY PRESENT AT JUBILEE EVENT OF EUGENE K. OF C.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of founding of the Eugene council of Knights of Columbus was celebrated Sunday with a full day's program ending in the evening with a banquet for nearly 175 at the Osburn hotel.

The first Oregon farmer was a Catholic. The first Oregon mother was a Catholic mother. The first emigrants were Catholics, the speaker pointed out.

Father Leipzig said he did not list these facts to belittle in any way the outstanding work of other pioneers and those of other faiths, but to show that the Catholics too, gave much and sacrificed much to make this a great commonwealth.

The capital city is receiving drinking water again although it is only issued two hours daily.

Train Is Caught

The work of burying the dead is being carried on as fast as the army can get rescue workers into the stricken settlements.

Thus far, only the locality around the capital can be reported upon with any exactness, but the isolated villagers are handling their own work of covering up the ravages of the 25-inches-in-24-hours rainfall of last Wednesday.

The flying fields can be used again today and the government is depending completely on airplanes to establish contact with the outlying districts.

Lakes Guila and Coatepeque have risen far over their banks and swept away every vestige of civilization around their shores.

Airplane observers over the international railroad of Central America, which has been completely washed out for long sections, saw the international train lying upside-down several hundred feet from where the mountain track had been.

Gasoline Confiscated

Practically all the agriculture in El Salvador has been wiped out.

Federal decrees are guarding against profiteering. The main fear at the present time is that the destruction of sanitary facilities and the presence of many unburied bodies may cause a pestilence.

In order to provide as much emergency transportation by truck and airplane as possible the government has confiscated all the gasoline in the capital.
