**Cleanup of Dump
Ground Approved**
SPRINGFIELD, June 12.—(Spe-
cial).—The city council approved ap-
plication for SERRA funds, amounting
to not more than \$1000, to clean up
the city dumpground. This is the first
project that the city has made ap-
plication for.

The city guarantees the compensa-
tion which must be paid on all SERRA
jobs. No material will have to be
purchased for the project. The num-
ber of men to be hired is not known
yet. The project must have the ap-
proval of county and state SERRA
headquarters.

The project calls for constructing
more adequate roads to the dump-
ground, cleaning up all the trash that
has been dumped there and placing it
in one spot, hidden from the general
view, which will be designated here-
after for all dumping and deepening
and narrowing the channel from the
city sewer to the river.

The council voted to prohibit haul-
ing loam from the dump-ground and
cutting any trees on the ground.

Other SERRA projects that the city
may apply for later were discussed.
The city's planning committee, headed
by F. B. Hamlin, is making study of
several proposals which will come up
later.
