

BOARD DISCUSSES PLANT INSURANCE

Various insurance policies that may be applied to the Eugene steam stand-by plant were discussed by the Eugene water board with insurance company representatives at the regular meeting of the board at city hall Monday night.

The board is contemplating means of lowering insurance costs on this plant. No action was taken and the matter will be discussed at later meetings of the board.

Financial problems constituted most of the business transacted by the board. Interest of \$12,703.99, due July 1 on city light and water bonds was ordered paid. Interest of \$5,166.40 on water and electric bonds; interest of \$3,037.50 on water bonds; and interest of \$4,500 on McKenzie water supply bonds is due and was authorized.

The board voted to purchase \$60,000 of its own bonds due in 1937 and \$200,000 of Salem sewer bonds for the sinking fund. All bonds due Sept. 1, 1937, will be called in Sept. 1, of this year. It was decided.

Beardsley Named Hospital Chief Of Staff Monday

Dr. Grant S. Beardsley was elected chief of staff of the Pacific hospital at a meeting of the staff Monday evening. Dr. Beardsley succeeds Dr. W. H. Dale, who has served in this capacity for the past year.

Other officers named include Dr. O. A. Walker, assistant chief; Dr. H. C. Boring, secretary of staff; and Dr. Carl H. Phetteplace.

At a meeting of the Pacific hospital association held the same evening, Dr. A. F. Barnett and Dr. Geo. I. Hurley were named as additional officers.

Stating that the hospital had completed a most successful year, the staff members pointed out that it is standardized and accepted by the American College of Surgeons. It has modern x-ray equipment supervised by an x-ray specialist, Dr. Barnett. Thorough laboratory facilities are under the supervision of Dr. E. D. Furrer, pathologist. The hospital also has the services of three electrocardiographs, owned by private physicians on the staff.

Modern obstetrical facilities are at the disposal of the hospital's patients, also, members of the staff pointed out. Only graduate nurses are employed at the institution. Eighty-five beds are available at the hospital.

NORTH RAY, Ont., June 13.—(AP)—Dr. A. R. Dafoe and nurses attending the Dionne quintuplets redoubled efforts today to halt temporary setbacks suffered by four of the babies.

Only baby Marie, smallest and hitherto weakest of the five daughters born to Mrs. Olive Dionne, continued unchanged at one pound 12 ounces. Her sisters lost from a half to one ounce each in weight over night.

Yvonne, largest of the mites, gave attendants a bad scare yesterday when she refused to eat and failed to respond to emergency treatments of oxygen-carbon dioxide. Her decline was halted when Dr. Dafoe administered two drops of rum. Although much improved today, Yvonne had lost half an ounce.

Each of the five is fed 2 1/2 ounces of milk every two hours, with a small quantity of water given between feedings.

AIR MAIL BILL SIGNED
WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today signed into law the administration's bill for regulating air mail transportation. The president's signature climaxed months of investigation and controversy over the handling of air mail under this and former administrations. Among other things, the bill eliminates some of the practices denounced by Postmaster General Farley when he cancelled mail contracts of all private air lines in the United States last January.

Liberalization Of Bank Deposit Insurance OKed

WASHINGTON, June 13.—(AP)—A bill to continue bank deposit insurance in liberalized form and to authorize additional aid to depositors in closed banks was sent to the White House today by congress.

Congressional action was completed when the senate adopted the conference report on the bill. It will extend the temporary deposit insurance law for another year covering deposits up to \$5,000 instead of the present \$2,500.

Authorize the Reconstruction Finance corporation to purchase as well as lend on the assets of closed banks from a fund available of about \$1,000,000,000.

Permit the RFC to lend the federal deposit insurance corporation \$250,000,000, on demand of the latter.

Give banks which are members of the federal deposit insurance corporation but not of the federal reserve system until 1937 to become a member of the latter.

There was little debate in the senate on the conference report, which had been approved yesterday in the house. The senate acted without a record vote.

Cannery Audit to Be Used by Code

SALEM, June 13.—(AP)—The state labor commissioner's audit of cannery payrolls, now in progress, will be acceptable to the national code authority, Charles H. Gram announced today following telegraphic confirmation from Washington.

The state provides for an audit of payrolls of canneries to ascertain if employers are paying the scales legalized. An audit is also required under the national cannery code.

The state labor department is also authorized, if cause is shown, to extend working hours during the canning season of perishable produce, when application is made. The state law provides 60 hours a week maximum during these rush seasons.
