

RYAN PROPOSAL TURNED DOWN BY DOCK EMPLOYERS

requirements of 2,500 men, what possible chance can any man not a member of that association have in obtaining employment?

Proposals Held Fair

"Mr. Ryan has known since May 24 the employers would not agree to a closed union shop because it is contrary to the N. R. A., deprives an employer of his fundamental right to select employees and prevents a qualified longshoreman of continuing his employment or obtaining employment except on condition that he will join the union."

"Mr. Ryan now proposes a 'preference union agreement,' which is the closed union shop under another name. 'We expressed our desire to arrive at a just settlement. This has been manifested by the fact that as far back as May 28 we presented proposals which were accepted as fair by federal authorities and Mr. Ryan himself.'"

Holds Union Responsible

"Responsibility for continuance of this difficult situation must therefore be borne by Mr. Ryan, the striking longshoremen and the teamsters' union which has refused to transfer cargo to or from the docks."

"The employers reiterate their willingness to recognize the I. L. A. for the purpose of collective bargaining, to arbitrate wages and to establish jointly supervised hiring halls with the government participating to guarantee they shall be fairly run."

SMITH GRANTS TIME

SEATTLE, June 14.—(AP)—Striking longshoremen met in the union hall this afternoon to consider a new strike settlement proposal advanced by operators at a conference with Mayor Charles L. Smith today.

Although the strike had not been settled at the 1 P. M. deadline set by the mayor, he withdrew action until after the strikers' rank and file action on the employers' proposal. The mayor said he would take action to open the port if a settlement was not reached today.

PORTLANDERS WEARY
PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—(AP)—Determined, they said, to move definitely toward an immediate end of the longshoremen's strike in Portland, a group of leaders in the waterfront controversy met here this afternoon.

Those attending the conference expressed weariness over the prolonged negotiations, numerous proposals, counter proposals and appeals, this having characterized negotiations to date.

VIOLENCE RESUMED
SEATTLE, June 14.—(AP)—One man was critically injured and three others were arrested following a riot by a milling mob of 300 striking seamen about the Todd Dry Docks, Inc., today.

Strikers halted all automobiles and blocked with heavy timbers a highway for a mile leading to the dock.

Albert Nordee, 40, suffered multiple fractures after he was assertedly run down by a truck operated by M. F. Jacoby, employee of the General Petroleum company at Harbor Island.

Two strikers, A. S. Johnson, 38, and J. Dibble, 34, were held on open charges with Jacoby. They were said to have tried to beat up Jacoby.

Strikers had apparently been misinformed that the Luckenbach Steamship company intended to try to sail a ship or two from port.

John G. Eason, district manager, said the company had no intention of manning its ships with strike-breakers. He said the mob became angry when three company engineers returned to a ship.

It was reported that a rock was hurled at an automobile occupied by Clarence W. Wiley, president of the Todd Dry Dock. It missed the car.

DEATH SENTENCE GIVEN BARROW PAL

HUNTSVILLE, Texas, June 14.—(AP)—Raymond Hamilton, 29, desperate companion of the slain Clyde Barrow, was under sentence of death today for killing a guard in escaping from Eastham prison.

Already under prison sentences totaling 302 years, the outlaw was convicted last night under the statutes governing trial of "habitual criminals." It was the third attempt Texas has made within a month to obtain the extreme sentence.

Hamilton was described during his trial as the leader of a prison break in which Major Croshaw, a guard, was shot to death. Barrow and his outlaw girl companion, Bonnie Parker, allegedly engineered the delivery.

Barrow and his gang covered a group of guards and convicts to make the break possible.

Barrow and Miss Parker were slain recently in Louisiana a few weeks after breaking with Hamilton.

GRANGE PROPOSES NEW CONTROL FOR COUNTY SCHOOLS

The provision is also made for joint and suspended districts.

Each district participating in the equalization fund would be required to maintain a standard elementary school and employ a teacher holding a valid Oregon certificate.

Districts would be required to submit budgets to the county equalization board, which would have the right to recommend changes to promote efficient handling of school finances. The board would also have the right to determine minimum salaries to be paid any teacher.

Schools having less than 16 resident pupils would not be permitted to participate unless the county board was unable to arrange transportation, or some other means of caring for the pupils, in which case funds could be provided up to 75 per cent of the equalization level.

If it is found that consolidation of districts is justifiable and warranted through transportation of pupils, the county board shall have authority to make such consolidation.

The act would also provide that where districts are in sound financial condition and have no unpaid obligations, that the levy against such districts shall be proportionately lowered.

No school district participating in the equalization fund shall be permitted to erect a new building, without the authority of the county board.

School districts of the first class, and counties now operating under the county unit system would not be affected by the act.

The bill was submitted to the convention of the Oregon State Grange with the committee's recommendation for adoption, and resulted in considerable discussion. The general opinion of the grange members was favorable, and it was voted to submit the proposed law to the next session of state legislature.

tober receipts of the commission are the largest of the year."

Flagg attributed the present financial condition of the commission to "expenditures of approximately \$800,000 by the state game commission in order to obtain federal aid." Most of this money was spent in construction of new buildings and other improvements.

Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, stated there would be no letup in enforcement of state game laws. He declared the state police had 30 men in the game division, four less than a year ago, and that in order to enforce the game laws efficiently, that number would have to be retained.

Under existing laws Pray draws his allotment from the game commission through the general fund, and this is subsequently collected from the commission by the secretary of state.
