Walker of Seattle, Washington. Two brothers not living were Paul and Girard.

The immediate relatives coming to Eugene for the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Charles P. Long and Mr. and Mrs. Tad Eastwood. Funeral services were held at the Branstetter-Simon chapel at 2 p. m. Monday, June 11. Rev. Cecil F. Rislove of the First Methodist church officiated. The Modern Woodmen of America conducted the burial service at Rest Haven Memorial park.
