Spencer Butte lodge No. 9 of the Odd Fellows will confer the third degree Tuesday night. A supper will be served in honor of the candidates.

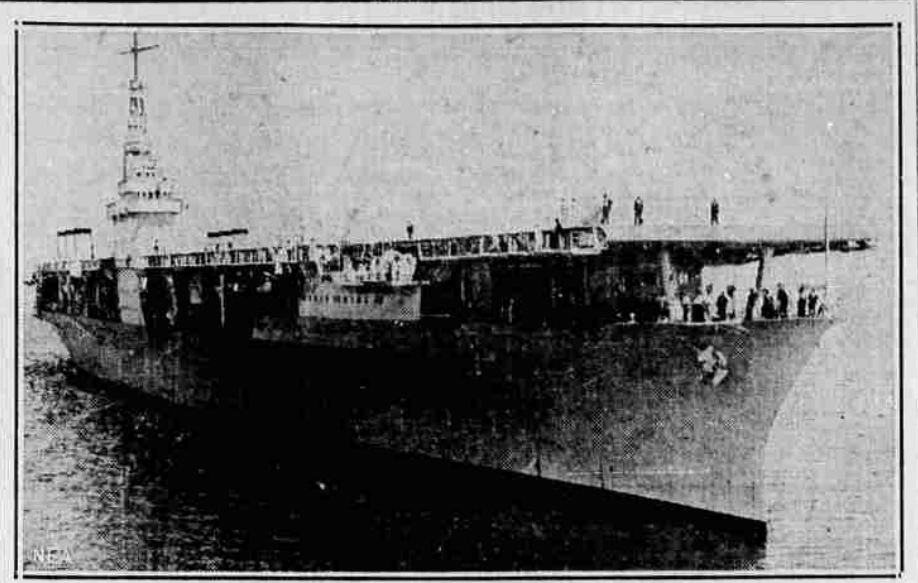
Attended Funeral
