Summer Rushing Underway; Rules On
Entertainment Given Out By Local
Panhellenic; Date Cards Go Aug. 15

SUMMER rushing among the campus sororities has started for the active members and alumnae of the various groups in the city during vacation.

Revised rules were issued recently by the campus Panhellenic.

Regarding summer rushing, following are the rules listed:

"Summer rushing shall be conducted as follows: From commencement day until July 1, there shall be open rushing. From July 1 until August 15, there shall be rushing only for parties of six or under (this means the total number of house members and guests). From August 15 until the Thursday before freshman week there shall be open rushing. There shall be no rushing of any sort anywhere after the Thursday before freshman week until Sunday tea.

"All entertainment in Portland must be scheduled with Panhellenic representative after August 15."

The Panhellenic group here has issued all information about sororities and rushing in a new booklet, which is considerably simplified over the set issued previously.

A new feature for this year is that the date cards do not go out until August 15. Another new ruling is that all girls expecting to pledge live in Susan Campbell hall during rush week this year, thus bringing all girls within the university living rules during rush week. The extreme, average, and low monthly expenses of sororities, including board and room and all extra fees, except initiation and the initial pledge fee, are listed in a table in the new rushing rules, too.

All campus sororities are bound by the rules, including the following: Alpha Chi Omega, Alpha Delta Pi, Alpha Gamma Delta, Alpha Omicron Pi, Alpha Phi, Alpha Xi Delta, Beta Phi Alpha, Chi Omega, Delta Delta Delta, Delta Gamma, Delta Zeta, Gamma Phi Beta, Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Kappa Gamma, Phi Mu, Pi Beta Phi, Sigma Kappa, Zeta Tau Alpha.
