

NEW EFFORTS FOR SETTLING STRIKE STARTED MONDAY

however, to send longshore crews to the wharves. It may be several days, it was said, before this direct action is taken. Meanwhile, said an unofficial spokesman for the employers, "We are going to lay every plan for opening the waterfront before we make a move. The plans will be complete—and effective."

Plan Badly Defeated
Strikers strengthened their picket lines here today, following Sunday's adverse vote on Saturday's strike settlement proposal.

The situation was further complicated by the fact that even though longshoremen should return to work, ships still could not be worked, as marine engineers and firemen still are on strike, having left their jobs after the longshore workers walked out. The circumstance that the proposed peace move made no provision for meeting demands of the other marine workers was said by union leaders here to have been one of the main reasons why longshoremen turned down the proposed agreement reached at San Francisco Saturday afternoon. Leaders of the waterfront union said the peace plan was rejected by the Portland local by a 97 per cent vote.

New Parley Started
SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—(U.P.)—Mayor Angelo Rossi, discouraged by the apparent failure of Saturday's agreement signed by labor leaders to end the Pacific coast longshoremen's strike, called a new conference of union representatives at the city hall today.

Joseph P. Ryan, president of the International Longshoremen's association, William J. Lewis, district president; Michael Casey of the Teamsters' union, and T. J. McLaughlin, executive committee member of the longshoremen, attended.

The mayor pointed out towards the bay where approximately 100 ships are tied up as a result of the strike and said:

"Those ships are not going to stay idle out there very much longer. An agreement is an agreement and I signed one Saturday as mayor of San Francisco."

Ryan To Continue
The meeting then discussed the situation created by the complete rejection of Saturday's agreement by the longshoremen's organizations at the various ports affected. But no formal announcement of what was done was made.

It was believed that much of the discussion centered around the decision of the strikers that further negotiations be carried on by a committee representing not only the longshoremen, but also other marine unions involved. Ryan, it was believed, told the meeting that he would follow out his announced plan to return temporarily from negotiations.

Ryan pronounced the whole situation "very complicated." He said he found himself in a peculiar position in that the affairs of numerous unions instead of just the longshoremen, had become involved, and he could not speak for the others.

marchers, including several women, fell dead or dying.

Thousands of bystanders watching the parade were thrown into a panic and trampled one another as they rushed for shelter. Women screamed. Some fainted.

ABC members who were armed dropped to their knees and returned the fire. The attack came from behind some pillars. After six or seven minutes the assailants fled, leaving at least 12 dead and scores injured.

The line of march was reorganized and the parade continued.

During the shooting the ABC flag-bearer coolly held his banner aloft as comrades were left dashed by the outbreak. A number of the wounded were in a grave condition and physicians said they expected the death toll to grow.

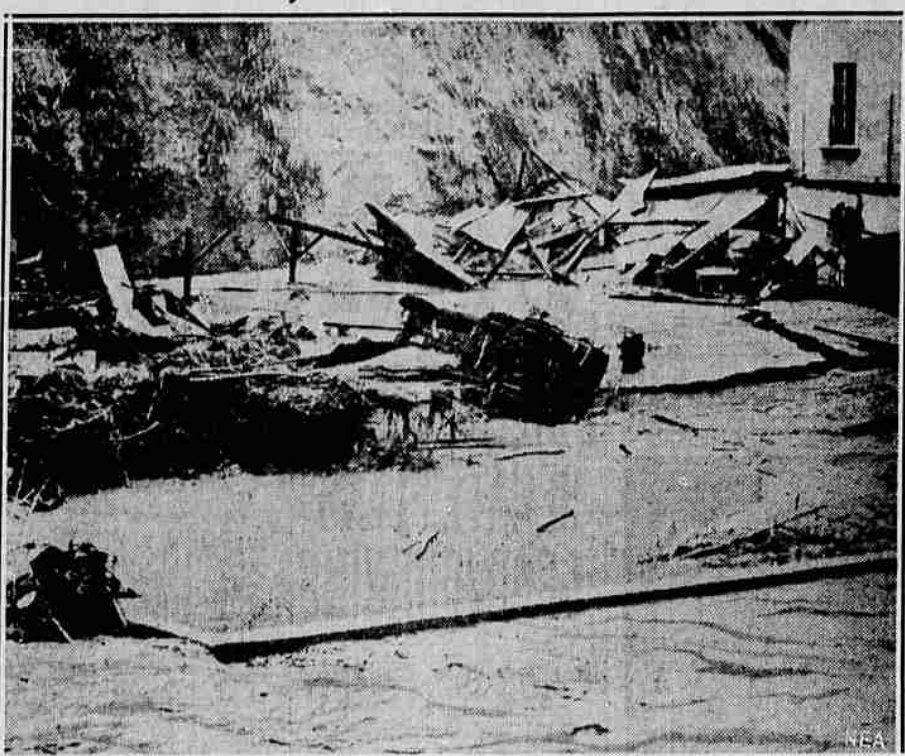
ENGLAND HAS 'EM

of selfishness, lack of character, untruth, ungentlemanliness and arrogance that is trying to spread out under the cover of the German revolution."

As one of those responsible for the events when the Nazis went into power, von Papen said, he was being more and more pressed by voices which demand that I take a positive stand concerning events transpiring in Germany and the conditions obtaining here.

"It would be a mortal sin, both from the human and the statesman's point of view, not to say what must be said at this decisive juncture of the German revolution."

One of von Papen's first darts was at the muzzling of the press. "The press is no longer a safety valve," he said.

"The real purpose of the press would seem to inform the government of defects that have crept in and point out where corruption has secured a berth, where serious mistakes have been made, where unfit men have been put in wrong places and where sins are being committed against the spirit of the German revolution."

"An anonymous or secret intelligence service, be it ever so excellently organized, can never be a substitute for this task of the press."

Code Authority
May Be Organized

In order to eliminate the possibility of administering the local retail code from some other city, like Portland, Eugene merchants will meet at the Eugene chamber of commerce Monday night to discuss organization of a local retail code authority. Edgar Freed, state compliance director, will be here to assist in forming a local organization. The meeting will start at 8 o'clock.

While no local code authority exists here, local retail merchants come under provisions of the retail code and in order to get best results, there should be a local code authority, Freed declares.

Robert Mount, manager of the Portland Better Business Bureau, and chief investigator for NRA in the Portland territory; Harvey Wells, secretary-treasurer of the Portland retail code authority; and Jack Lubin, head of the Portland food dealers code authority, will attend the meeting.

Ministers Discuss
Liquor Situation

Various phases of the liquor situation and control were discussed by the Eugene Ministerial association in meeting, Monday morning, and the members are going ahead, pushing the petitions, confident the matter will go on the November ballot, said Rev. Frank S. Heisel, head of the association. The ministers are working to have a measure go on the ballot providing for Lane county to have local option in voting out liquor for this section.

The matter of union services was referred back to the committee. Each summer a group of the local churches holds union services. The committee reported to have the services start last Sunday in July but the association referred it back to the committee to start on the first Sunday of the month. The matter will be definitely reported later.

Meetings for the ministers are held at call during the summer weeks, the regular meetings being postponed until fall.

School Election
Held Here Monday

Eugene voters were to elect a director for the Eugene school board, district 4, Monday afternoon, the polls being open from 2 to 7 p. m. Only one candidate filed this year, Fred Stichel.

be required for continued occupancy," Pasquill's report continued.

Practice of having main offices in both Salem and Portland was characterized as "unwise." The law required that headquarters should be maintained at Salem.

"The necessity of maintaining two offices for carrying on the activities of the commission is one which should receive serious consideration, for it necessarily requires executive employees in both places, results in divided responsibility and does not permit of complete control supervision by the administrator."

The audits, as a whole, were favorable to the commission's operations. Some practices were criticized mildly but both reports took cognizance of the fact that the state's venture into the liquor business was a new experiment.

Starr's report reminded that "another factor of importance is the consideration of the primary purpose for which the liquor commission was created, namely, the control of liquor, which fact obviously subjects the making of profits to a secondary consideration."

"During the period of development an excessive number of employees were used, probably due to overestimating the volume of business to be transacted."

Starr explained profits must be listed "with qualifications" because "excess of assets over liabilities for the stores division shows values of certain assets are not absolute."

The stores division showed a loss of \$94,577.51 in receipts below disbursements chiefly because \$107,088.71 borrowed by the commission from the general fund was charged against disbursements. Total receipts for the stores division were listed at \$453,750.22 against disbursements of \$548,327.53.

License fee funds totaled \$98,000.17, against \$92,448.17 disbursements. Privilege tax collections amounted to \$40,072.02 against \$533.13 disbursements.

Total cost of goods sold from Dec. 15 to April 30 was \$233,171.84. Gross sales on this amount totaled \$322,581.49.

Net merchandising income was \$20,229.30. Permit fees and miscellaneous items accounted for the remainder of the \$58,808.74 total stores income.

Gross markup on goods during the month of April averaged 30 per cent of the selling price, the audit disclosed.

Stores operating at a loss were located at Oregon City, \$264.98, La Grande \$220.68, Grants Pass \$113.34, 8033 N. Jersey street, Portland, \$488.44, and Milwaukee and Powell, Portland, \$2.91. Largest profit was made by the 11th and Alder store, Portland, \$6,833.93.

Among the agencies operating at a loss were Prineville, \$32.50 and Ashland, \$24.88.

Roosevelt Signs
New Roads Bill

WASHINGTON, June 18.—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt today signed a bill authorizing \$522,000,000 for road construction over a three year period.

In signing the Hayden-Cartwright road measure, the president issued a statement notifying state legislatures that the road program will be only on a 50-50 basis and that unmatched emergency grants are to be abandoned.

for 10 years, was today designated as vice-director, with no change in salary.

Maris, who was granted a sabbatical leave at the last meeting, had his request approved that the leave start Sept. 1 instead of July 1 pending developments in his present position as federal director of rural rehabilitation for the western states. Meanwhile he is on straight leave without pay.

Raises Approved
Pay increases, some involving only federal or other restricted funds, were approved for E. T. Stubb, associate professor of pharmacy; C. W. Smith, county agent of Morrow county; H. E. Seiby, associate economist of the agricultural experiment station; Dr. Victor P. Morris, professor of economics at the University of Oregon, and F. A. Cuthbert, assistant professor of landscape architecture who teaches on both campuses. H. H. Gibson, professor of agricultural education, was restored to full time.

Chancellor Kerr pointed out that these men have been offered positions elsewhere at figures well above what these increases will amount to and that it is imperative that the institutions hold all key men possible if standards of work are to be maintained.

Mining Degrees Asked
Several proposed major curricular changes came up in communications to the board and were either held to need no action or were referred for further study. F. M. Lewis, secretary of the Oregon Technical Council, transmitted a resolution asking the degree work in mining engineering be restored at the State college, given in a department of the school of engineering. The board recently acted to re-establish service work in mining there and will inform Lewis of that fact, it decided.

A request from the alumni association of Oregon State college that degree work in physical education be placed on an equal basis at the University and State college just as education is now was referred to the chancellor and the curricula committee for further study.

Only six of the nine members attending today's session, these being President Marks; C. A. Brand, Roseburg; E. C. Sammons and B. F. Irvine, Portland; Leif Finseth, Dallas; and F. E. Callister, Spokane.

Callister has been given a federal appointment in connection with the Intermediate Credit bank but is maintaining his legal residence at Albany.

DR. MORRIS TO STAY
Dr. Robert H. Seashore, professor of psychology at the university, was granted one year's leave of absence without pay, and his place will be taken by Dr. Lester F. Beck, who will be employed for one year at a salary of \$2,410.

Dr. Victor P. Morris was given a salary increase from \$2,551.50 to \$3,120. It is understood that Dr. Morris was invited to the presidency of Willamette university, but has decided not to go to the University of Michigan next year. He will continue to handle landscaping of both campuses.

Musette Made Curator
Dr. A. R. Moore was given an additional year's leave without pay. In the meantime an instructor in zoology will be hired to take his place at a temporary salary of \$1,720. Dr. Moore has been studying and teaching at the University of Sendai, Japan, on a traveling professorship this past year.

Mrs. Anne Landsbury Beck, John Stark Evans, and Rex Underwood, all of the school of music, were advanced in indefinite tenure with no change in salary.

Dr. R. R. Heustis was made curator of the vertebrate collection at the University, with no change in salary. The board approved the outline of fees and the faculty for summer session.
