HARRISBURG, June 18.—(Special)—Mrs. Margaret Moody died at her home here Saturday morning after a brief illness, in the house where she had lived continuously for more than 63 years. The funeral was held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock with interment at the Odd Fellows cemetery and the Rebekahs in charge. Rev. Gilbert Carey, Christian minister, was in charge.

Mrs. Moody was born at Corvallis, May 1, 1852, and lived to the age of 82 years, one month and 15 days of age. When 11 years of age she moved to the Mohawk valley near Eugene. April 15, 1868, she was married to M. W. Canter, who died about 23 years ago. They lived at Brownsville a year and then came to Harrisburg. Mr. Canter was a carpenter and contractor and 63 years ago built the house that was to shelter them both for the remainder of their lives.
