entering the grounds. They offered no other interference.

Three persons were arrested last night and held without bail when police found 20 home-made clubs in a private garage.

The clubs had been made, a note on the door, addressed to an unidentified man said "Dear Comrade. I hope they suit."

One of the arrested men referred to the clubs as "sleepers," police said.

Incorporation of the newly formed "Columbia River Longshoremen's association" was another development today.

It was described as a definite split in the ranks of union longshoremen. Members of the new group will return to work as soon as police protection is afforded, they said.

G. Triles, named as president of the new union in the papers of incorporation, charged the International Longshoremen's association now is controlled by a group "who are not longshoremen and who don't want to see anybody get work."

President notified Mayor Carson yesterday that President Roosevelt and Secretary of Labor Perkins to the city will use force, if necessary, to open the port.

"This," he said, "may entail unpleasant developments. If the recently enacted labor law authorized intervention, I urge you to demand longshoremen to return to work pending agreement. If intervention is to be of benefit, it must come now."

Police said they were advised that among the outsiders swarming into the city to participate in the waterfront controversy were some radicals who took part in eastern automobile factory labor troubles. These, officers said, are teaching recruits who have no direct concern with the strike outcome, how to use sling-shots which shoot three-quarter inch ball bearings. The slings are regarded as highly dangerous weapons.

Mayor Makes Appeal

The Portland local of the I. L. A. wrote Mayor Carson today suggesting the city deputize members of the longshoremen's union to aid in maintaining order.

"In view of your policy of deputizing special police who are in the pay of employers," the letter said, "we suggest that you also authorize the deputization of members of the I. L. A. to aid in maintaining order. Special officers chosen from our ranks would be fully as capable as those in the pay of the employers."

Governor Meier revealed today he talked by telephone last night with Marvin H. McIntyre, secretary to President Roosevelt, and to others at Washington, outlining to them the condition existing in the Pacific coast's major labor controversy.

The governor said he asked what might be done. He had received no reply this afternoon, but he was expecting one, he said, "almost any time."

"I want to find out," the governor said, "what can be done by the federal administration. I want to find out, also, whether there is anything in the new labor bill that will bring about an immediate end to the situation we have here. I have not given up hope."

OPENING ATTEMPT FAILS

TACOMA, Wash., June 20.—(AP)—First attempt to open the port here failed today when a gang of 35 to 50 men, reported to be deputized guards from Seattle, attempted to set up a barricade at the Milwaukee dock for loading a ship with non-union labor.

The men arrived in a chartered bus and private autos from Seattle. At the dock, they were met by a crowd of longshore pickets. There was no violence as the pickets persuaded the men to leave the dock.

One of the Seattle men, J. Gervasi, suffered minor injuries when the truck he was driving to the dock left the road and crashed.

TEAMSTERS OPPOSE PLAN

SEATTLE, June 20.—(AP)—Another obstacle faced shippers in efforts to forcibly open the Port of Seattle this afternoon when the teamsters' union announced it would not make waterfront deliveries until threats of violence were removed.

"We are not going to subject our men to brickbats and they won't make deliveries until peace prevails," Dave Beck, secretary of the Seattle teamsters' union, said.

Shippers indicated they were not hopeful of carrying out their plans to remove the blockade under police protection.

LONGVIEW WORKERS QUIT

LONGVIEW, Wash., June 20.—(AP)—The Kelso-Longview district was expected to be in the grip of a general strike tonight.

At noon today, approximately 600 members of the loggers and sawmill, warehouse, pulp and sulphite unions "walked out in sympathy with the striking longshoremen."

Later today, a strike vote was to be taken by the electricians, retail clerks and teamsters unions.

NEW GROUP FORMED

LOS ANGELES, June 20.—(AP)—Formation of a general strike committee

tee of 18 men to represent the four major Pacific coast ports and the 10 striking organizations was under way today under sponsorship of the local International Longshoremen's union.

The committee, which would be composed of two men each from the ports of Los Angeles, San Francisco, Columbia River and Puget Sound, and 10 men representing the various unions, will meet government and shipping representatives in San Francisco next week under the plan.

Strike leaders here hurried developments as shipping leaders gave their tacit approval to the project and announced they would be willing to consider any representative proposal.

The longshoremen's group announced at the same time that all radical elements would be excluded from the new setup and communitistic policies would not be included in any final settlement.

1 egg

Method: Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add milk, pineapple, syrup, shortening and egg. Mix well and place in greased loaf pan. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 45 minutes.—Mrs. R. O. Evans, 318 Adams, Eugene.

Banana Muffins

2 tablespoons shortening

1/4 cup sugar

1 egg well beaten

1 cup milk

1 1/4 cups flour

1 1/4 cups bran

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup chopped bananas

Cream shortening and sugar. Add egg, milk and bran. Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Add bananas and first mixture and stir until flour disappears. Bake in muffin tins in a moderate oven 20 to 25 minutes.—Mrs. F. C. Swindall, 1975 Emerald St., Eugene.

Southern Sherbet

1 cup water

1/4 cup sugar

1 banana

1 orange

1 lemon

1 egg

1/4 teaspoon salt

Beat egg, add sugar, water, crushed banana, juice and pulp of orange and lemon. Mix well, freeze, stirring twice during freezing.—Mrs. L. E. Johnson, 2445 Agate St., Eugene.

Pineapple Custard

1 quart milk

4 or 5 eggs

1/4 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups pineapple cut in small pieces

Method: Heat milk, sugar and salt in double boiler. Beat eggs lightly and pour slowly into the heated milk. Four back in to double boiler and stir constantly until custard coats the spoon. Remove at once and stir in the two cups of pineapple, cut in small pieces or crushed pineapple can be used. Place custard in pan of cold water and stir until cool. Add vanilla.—Mrs. Mary R. Uniform Salesman Sought by Officials

City and chamber of commerce officials were seeking information on George T. Allen claiming to represent the Colonial Uniform and Supply company of Kansas City, Missouri, Wednesday, following reports that he had "worked" this city to the tune of many dollars in cash. Chamber officials said he had been taking orders for uniforms from beauty parlor operators, waitresses and other business women, taking 25 per cent of the price in advance.

Several weeks elapsed after the orders were taken and when no merchandise was received, investigation was made and it was found there was no such address in Kansas City, according to H. E. Cully, secretary of the Eugene chamber of commerce. One operator paid the man \$6 on a \$24 uniform, but never received the uniform.

"After people had lost their money on this racket, they called the police and chamber of commerce, both of whom are powerless to do anything at this late date unless the man can be found," Cully pointed out.

service here will have to be abandoned.

He said that a site in the vicinity of the new gravel plant of the Eugene Sand and Gravel company near the end of East Broadway had been considered but the matter of erecting suitable buildings had to be taken into consideration. He estimated that it would require something like \$1500 or \$2000 to put up the buildings.

The CCC barracks cost something like \$9000 but it is not necessary to have such an elaborate layout. He said there would be no objection to moving some of these buildings if the consent of the war department could be had.

Parents Held Opposed

Miss A. M. Smith, Mrs. Hazel Scherling, Mrs. W. H. Maxham and others, representing the Business and Professional Women's club, took the floor to oppose the establishing of the camp in the park. They declared that parents would not feel that their children would be safe if transients were allowed to frequent the park, which was declared to be the one choice spot in the city for playground purposes.

Arthur Hendershott, who is chairman of the city playgrounds commission, Councilman Zimwalt and Gilbert Sprague, playground director in the park, were unalterably opposed to the move. George H. McMorran, who is a member of the relief committee, declared that it was up to the city council to work out this problem. He said he was not sold on the plan to move the transient service to the park and that if it were not the proper thing to do some other plan should be adopted. It was he who made the motion to put it up to the city council to decide.

Mayor Large, who is chairman of the relief committee, said that a subcommittee had been working on the problem for weeks and it concluded that the CCC camp site was the logical place for the headquarters of the service under the circumstances, but that if the people do not want it there something else will have to be done.

Only the executive's signature is needed to make it law.

By joining the organization, McReynolds said, the United States would acquire a mass of information on social problems gathered since before the World War. It is to be used in formulating the president's program designed to guarantee economic security through unemployment insurance, old age pensions, and other means.

Four delegates, two representing the government, one labor and one industry, will be sent to Geneva to attend conventions which will seek to have all nations adopt the 40-hour work week, eliminate child labor, prohibit forced labor, raise wages and improve working conditions.

McReynolds, chairman of the house foreign affairs committee, said low wage and living standards in other countries made it difficult for the United States to combat such competition in world markets. Influencing others to adopt higher standards would increase those here, he said.

"Low wages in other countries and other inferior standards of living, decrease purchasing power and make the demand for the products of American agriculture and other industry in other countries less than should be the case. On both of these grounds, accordingly, the success of the administration's program of reciprocal trade would be definitely enhanced in proportion as standards of living in other countries may be leveled up so as to approach rising standards of living in the United States."

The resolution specifically prohibits the United States from becoming connected with the World Court or the League of Nations by joining the labor organization.
