CHICAGO, June 22.—(AP)—Nine children were injured, two seriously, when an abandoned frame house collapsed today.
The rooms of the old house were filled with the happy shouts of many neighborhood children who had made it a rainy-day playground when the crash suddenly turned the scene to one of terror.
Six crews of firemen were rushed to the scene and worked feverishly to extricate the children. George Weisz, 10, was found to have suffered a fracture of the pelvis and lacerations and Stanley Bazonek a fractured right leg.

Railroads Report Loadings Increase

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—The American Railway Association announced today that loadings of revenue freight for the week ended June 16 were 617,640 cars, an increase of 2,084 above the preceding week, 24,890 above the corresponding week in 1933 and 99,251 above 1932.
Miscellaneous freight loaded totaled 247,402 cars, an increase of 5,223 above the preceding week, 15,725 above 1933 and 38,994 above 1932.
Total loadings for the year to date were 14,133,887 cars, against 12,062,943 last year and 13,129,546 in 1932. All districts except the southern and
