

DEMAND FOR WOOL REPORTED LIMITED

BOSTON, June 22.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Demand for wool in the eastern markets is limited and prices are hardly changed at a matter of quotation, although territory quotations are purely nominal. Bright fleeces are steady at last week's price level.

Sales of wool are being made in the far west at prices which are sensibly under territory quotations on this market, top-making Oregon wools having been sold at about 63 and 65 cents, clean landed Boston, against nominal asking prices here of about 80 cents. A million pounds of good 12 months wool was sold from Knoxville also at a basis of 70 cents, clean, Boston.

"Foreign markets are reported steadier with a little more business being done. The next Australian clip is estimated at 3,140,000 bales of 300 pounds each, which is an increase.

"The price goods market is still unsettled.

"Mohair is in very moderate demand and steady in price."

Scoured basis: Oregon, fine and F. M. Staple 82-84; fine and F. M. Fr. combing 80-82; fine and F. M. clothing 74-75; Valley No. 1 76-78.

Mohair: Oregon, 40-43; Domestic graded: First combing, 60-62; second combing, 50-55; third combing, 45-50; fourth combing, 40-45; good ending, 40-45; first kid, 75-78; second kid, 65-68.
