

Grain Price Rises Here; Stocks Rally Saturday

VARIATION IS SEEN IN VEGETABLES AND FRUITS SATURDAY

No change in egg, poultry and butter prices, a one cent rise in wheat, and variations in the fruit and vegetable line were noted on the Eugene market Saturday morning.

In accordance with the rise in Chicago wheat, the local dealers went up one cent, advancing the price from 72c to 73c. Vegetable prices ranged both lower and higher than Friday, berries underwent a general drop, except in the case of Youngberries, which advanced to \$1.15 a crate.
