MEN OF NATIONAL NOTE SCHEDULED FOR PARLEY HERE
National leaders in educational, economic and political fields, as well as leading educators and business men of Oregon will be present for the conference on higher education, to be held on the University of Oregon campus July 11, 12, 13 and 14, it was announced here today by Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the university.
The list of acceptances for the meet already includes Frederick M. Davenport, congressman from New York; Dr. F. J. Kelly, chief of the division of higher education, Washington, D. C.; Dr. James W. Angell, professor of economics at Columbia University, New York, and an international authority on finance; Dr. George W. Frasier, president of Colorado State Teachers' college; and Dr. F. L. Howe, assistant director of the famous General College of the University of Minnesota.
Four main topics will be taken up at the conference. These will be: "Responsibility of Higher Education to Students"; "Responsibility of Higher Education to Community"; "Responsibility of Higher Education in Adult Education"; and "Responsibility of Higher Education for Social Planning." Several topics will be discussed under each of these sections. Open forums will be held each afternoon in all sections, and a general summary will be presented on Saturday.
Representatives from all institutions of higher education in the West have been invited to attend, and the conference, the first to cover this field so intensively, is expected to attract national attention.
RFC Lays Down Rules on Making Business Loans
WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—Business houses seeking loans direct from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation under the act authorizing such loans for the next six months, must meet a long list of requirements.
They must:
Be members of the NRA.
Have been in business Jan. 1, 1934.
Apply to the nearest loan agency of the RFC.—There are 62.
Supply adequate security.
Be solvent when they get the loan.
Be unable to get a loan from their bank.
Show the loan will increase or maintain employment.
Not ask for over \$500,000.
Declare no dividends without the consent of the RFC.
Let the RFC dictate officers' salaries.
Pay prevailing bank loan interest rates.
Not plan new construction except
