

"Many Happy Returns" Comes To McDonald; Fan Dancer on Colonial Stage

Lupe Velez, Durante In "Strictly Dynamite" On Heilig Screen This Week

The amazingly frank story of the private life of a famous theatrical couple, "The Great Flirtation," which was written by Gregory Ratoff, one of the screen's leading comedians, opens today at the McDonald theater. Lupe Velez, Adolphe Menjou and David Manners have the leading roles, while the supporting cast includes Lynne Overman, Adrian Rosley, George Baxter, Judith Vosselli and Paul Porcasi. The film concerns the hectic love affair of Menjou, Budapest's greatest matinee idol, and Miss Landi, whom he loves. She marries him although she doesn't love him. Her desire for stage fame brings them to America, where Landi becomes a star and finds true love in the person of David Manners, her playwright. Menjou egotistically attempts to block her career, but, in the final dramatic denouement, he is made to realize that he stands behind Miss Landi and happiness. Although she volunteers to help him rebuild his career, he bravely refuses her offer of aid and leaves her with the man she really loves.

Guy Lombardo and his Royal Canadians are accorded the unique honor of top billing in their first motion picture, Paramount's "Many Happy Returns," which is now at the McDonald theater. In this picture, directed by Norman MacLeod, they share top honors with George Burns and Gracie Allen. Three songs by Sam Coslow and Arthur Johnston are featured by the band in the picture "Fare Thee Well," "The Sweetest Music This Side of Heaven" and "The Boogie Man."

What happens when a small town boy wins fame too suddenly in the big city is the basis for serious heart troubles and the romance which accompanies the rousing comedy in "Strictly Dynamite." RKO-Radio Picture co-starring Jimmy "Schnozzle" Durante and Lupe Velez, opening today at the Heilig. Norman Foster plays a Midwest youth who comes to New York to write the great American poem. By a stroke of chance, he wins the role of star-writer for Moxie Slaght, famous radio comic, and then the trouble begins. Success and Vera, Moxie's fiery air partner, go to his head. His clients and his wife sever their relations with him. Moxie saves the day when he recites one of his poetic masterpieces on the "Snuggly Hazy Corset Hour" in one of the most hilarious sequences ever filmed. "Half a Sinner," gay and tense comedy drama of a Kansas crossroads town, is double-billed with "Strictly Dynamite." With the noted stage star
