POLICE REPEL ATTACK
OAKLAND, Calif., June 26.—(AP)—Violence flared again early today on the Oakland waterfront as 75 policemen drove back 200 striking longshoremen trying to storm a barrier near the Pier terminal.

Police, summoned by a general riot alarm, repulsed the strikers with tear gas and night sticks in what was described as the worst battle in the East San Francisco bay area since the beginning of the longshoremen's strike.

Officer C. R. Kunes was taken to Highland hospital with a lacerated scalp and hand.

Six arrested strikers were arrested.

TIEUP MADE TIGHTER
PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—Portland and its surrounding area, already having withstood a loss of millions of dollars because of the waterfront strike, today faced the prospect of greater inconvenience and further loss.

Union truck drivers refused to move freight which had been sent by rail from California ports where it had been discharged from steamers which had been unable to unload here.

Executives of trucking lines advised shipper company officials that pickets were making efforts, largely successful, to sort out freight that had been moved from the east coast to California by water for discharge there and for delivery here by rail.

This freight was being left at the depot. Union drivers refused to haul it. Most of this freight is marked "re-shipment" and thus is readily identified.

U. S. Without Grounds
The Starr Fruit Products company, threatened with a shutdown because of difficulty in getting fuel oil for its packing plant, reported today it has 40 carloads of canned Oregon products to be delivered to New England centers, which cannot be shipped because of the waterfront strike.

Carl C. Maugh, United States attorney for Oregon, said today upon receipt of information from Attorney General Homer S. Cummings, that nothing has happened so far in Portland that would warrant federal department of justice intervention in the strike.

Donaghy questioned the United States attorney general after John W. Kaste, attorney for the American-Hawaiian Steamship company, and some of the waterfront employers, sought information regarding a federal statute which makes it illegal for any person to interfere with the movement of interstate and foreign commerce.

GENERAL STRIKE ASKED
SEATTLE, June 26.—(AP)—Charles W. Doyle, secretary of the Seattle Central Labor Council, today said letters had been sent all Seattle unions by the striking International Longshoremen's Association asking them to call a general strike if Seattle police are not taken off strike duty.

Police telephone lines to pier 40, where attempts have been made to break the longshoremen's strike by using non-union workers, were cut off last night and about a third of the telephone service in the Magnolia Bluff district was stopped when unknown persons sawed through a trunk cable which contained 200 wires.

Cologne.—Rudolf Hess, Hitler's chief lieutenant and spokesman in Nazi party, claims divine inspiration for Hitler in shaping country's destiny. Declares monarchy shall not return and continues attack on conservative element, which includes big industrialists and land owners.

Rival Groups Clash
Berlin.—Der Angriff, official Nazi party organ, reveals arrest of member of powerful Stahlhelm or steel helmet organization of war veterans, for stabbing Nazi storm trooper at Kolberg, Pomerania.

Kollberg.—Local storm trooper organization orders dissolution of steel helmet organization.

Breslau.—Following similar fate of some other newspapers, "Acht Uhr Tageblatt" ceases publication as financially unprofitable. Weekly periodical to be established so that all employees will not suffer.

In Berlin, the Hitler salute, compulsory for all state officials and expected from ordinary citizens, was abolished for traffic policemen because pedestrians and motorists are confused by it.

thickness, and will also cut a smooth surface equal to a planed surface.

Until just recently there has been no machine on the market for cutting sliced material or veneer, with the exception of rotary type machines, and these could not cut material one-fourth to five-sixteenths of an inch in thickness, successfully. It is stated, Mr. Voigt's new machine is capable of doing this by a straight slice method.

As soon as the general box plant has been completed, construction of an additional unit in which to house the slicing machine and necessary equipment will be started.

The Western Box company recently made application for increase in capital stock to \$25,000. The officials of the company are: George A. Stock, president; Kenneth R. Long, vice-president; Fred J. Voigt, secretary and treasurer.

the water prevents vegetables, macaroni or rice from boiling over.

If food becomes slightly burned in cooking, set the pan in cold water and it will take away burned taste.

Removing Stains

To remove fresh or canned fruit stain from linens or any wash fabric, spread a little butter over stain, roll up and let stand an hour or more, then wash in usual way.

To remove ink stains from fabric of any kind where water may be used, use Lava soap and warm water, making a thick lather of the Lava soap over the spot and rub between fingers and rinse well, or if spot is on a rug dampen with warm water and wet a cloth and rub Lava soap on it and then rub the spot and then with another clean damp cloth take up soap on the rug and rinse.
