BALTIMORE, June 27.—(AP)—George Zaharias, 235 pound Greek American wrestler from Pueblo, Colo., was under permanent suspension today by the Maryland athletic commission for throwing, not Joe Savold, his 212 pound opponent, but Ed Brockman, the referee.

The feature bout on last night's wrestling card was abruptly ended after 14 minutes when Brockman tried to separate the two wrestlers. Zaharias suddenly released the former Notre Dame star, exchanged cuffs with the referee and then tossed him through the ropes.

The commission ordered the match halted and sent the police into the ring to enforce the order. Later Fred Schanberger, chairman of the commission, announced the suspension and fine on Zaharias.
