

# OLYMPIA POWDER BLAST KILLS 11; VENGEANCE SEEN

OLYMPIA, June 28.—(AP)—Eleven persons were killed and at least five injured Wednesday night as two explosions, one of them setting off eight tons of newly-mixed dynamite, levelled the plant of the Denn Powder company on Hawks Prairie, eight miles northeast of Olympia.

The blasts occurred in the plant's mixing room, the first setting off the dynamite, mixed and ready for packing into sticks.

The explosions levelled the plant, spread wreckage over a wide area and started several brush fires.

**Debris Blown Far**

Witnesses said the second explosion sent clouds of smoke and debris several hundred feet into the sky.

**Identification Difficult**

Identification of the dead was difficult, as all were either burned or mangled almost beyond recognition, physicians said.

Some of the bodies were found as far as 75 feet from the scene of the blasts.

Siuslaw Boom company that a plant of 250,000 feet capacity per day will be built in Mapleton immediately after proper power rates are available, Inman declared.

"At present we are paying 15 cents per kilowatt hour, a rate which eliminates any possibility of large industrial expansion in the lower Siuslaw area," Mr. Inman said here Thursday. "By establishing a power district with authority to bargain for more reasonable power rates, we will lay the foundation for unlimited industrial development in this area."

Tied in with the plans for a power district are plans for a re-survey of the Siuslaw harbor which has been secured Lane county. During the past week two crews of U. S. army engineers have been making preliminary investigations in the area between Mapleton and Cushman, Inman said, and it is expected that definite results will be obtained from these efforts.

The West Coast Power company in Mapleton and Florence, Inman says, has offered to sell its holdings for two percent of the investment figure. The city of Florence has given assurance it will not renew this company's franchise if cheaper power is available and sponsors of the power district believe that by issuing bonds for \$250,000, a power plant of 200 horsepower and transmission lines extending 125 miles can be built to service the area.

"That is one plan we are contemplating," Inman said. "Another plan we have thought of is to tie in with the Rennie project should that plant be built. It is at present estimated that the Rennie lines would run as far west as Elmira and Mapleton is only 18 miles away from Elmira by the route of the Rennie project. This power district could build transmission lines from this distant and purchase power from the Rennie project."

ter car, Paul Schantol, who was in a car passed by Foster, and Ralph Jensen, who also observed the Foster car on Franklin boulevard, being diametrically opposed to the stories told by Foster and Don Wills, his companion, concerning the speed of the Foster car.

**Testimony is Conflicting**

Quinn, Schantol and Jensen all testified that the Foster car as traveling at a rate of speed estimated to be at least 50 miles an hour while Foster and Wills both testified their speed was not greater than 25 or 26 miles an hour during their ride east on Broadway and Franklin boulevard.

The testimony as to the time Foster and Wills were in Springfield also conflicted with the testimony introduced by the city, the two youths claiming they were not in Springfield after 10:30 o'clock the night of the accident in which Patrolman J. J. Jackson lost his life, while the testimony of Jensen and A. J. Cowart, night marshal at Springfield, was to the effect they were at a cafe drinking beer at midnight.

In the face of this conflicting testimony, the jury apparently was unable to agree as to who was telling the truth, it was pointed out. In his closing argument before the jury, Charles Hardy, attorney for the defense, sketched the possibility of Foster losing his job if a verdict of guilty were returned and he stressed the point that the grand jury had exonerated Foster of blame in connection with the accident of the police car.

**Dry Watch Proceedings**

While no action had been taken or was being contemplated as yet, the Lane County Dry association was watching the case with interest, it was reported by Rev. Frank Beistel.

"While intensely interested in the case, we do not know just what course of action we could pursue and we hesitate to interfere in court matters," Rev. Mr. Beistel declared. "We deplore any defeat to the purpose of justice, however, and feel that obviously something must be wrong in this matter."

He indicated that in the event a retrial was not ordered, the groups he represented might issue an expression of their views on the case.

**Whiskers Worth Votes**

If preliminary plans count for anything, princess backers, paranteers, whiskers and hoop skitters are in for the time of their lives. Contests are to be the order of the evening. The growers of the best whiskers will receive 10,000 votes for his favorite princess. to regiment people strictly. They want a social state in which private initiative and property are recognized—not a quasi-communist one.

**Brown Shirts With Radicals**

Both groups have powerful organizations behind them.

Supporting the radicals are the brown-shirted formations of the Nazi storm troopers. Many of them, admits Col. Ernest Reehm, their chief of staff, were recruited from former communist ranks.

Also among the radicals are many members of the labor front of 24,000,000 workers and employes. The majority presses for a more radical course.

Von Papen expressed the fear of the proletariat class in his suppressed speech when he exclaimed: "Have we

gone through an anti-Marxist revolution merely to make reality of the Marxist program?"

Conservatives, on the other hand, are supported not only by those who by nature and upbringing are moderate, but also those who opposed National Socialism from the moment it transferred from politics to religion.

**Von Papen Guards Fences**

When Von Papen issued his strictures he knew he could count upon powerful bodies to begin with—the Reichswehr or federal army; the Stahlhelm, or society of steel helmet war veterans; venerable President von Hindenburg; all landed aristocracy; the large Catholic element of Germany; and many Protestant sects who had not turned German Christians.

Subsequent events showed that he was even supported by many Nazis in high positions, men anxious that freedom of speech and assembly be restored, and that a conservative course in economic matters be steered.

**Hitler Overthrow Not Likely**

The guess of those who think the Nazi system is to undergo fundamental changes would at this stage seem more correct than the guess of those who look for an early overthrow of Hitler and his supplantation by either a military dictator or a monarch.

But the political dilemma into which Hitler has been put by two groups of friends seems small from many points of view as compared to financial and economic troubles which are in the offing.

The Reichsbank is virtually depleted of its gold reserve, yet Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, its president, adamantly refuses all offers of smaller countries to sell Germany raw materials on credit. On the other hand he is just as determined against parting from the gold standard or devaluating the mark.

Just how in these circumstances Germany is to obtain essential raw materials is something that may well cause the chancellor sleepless nights.

**Has Drought Problem**

To increase Hitler's difficulties farmers, who from the beginning were the mainstay of his regime, are in distress over a continuance of the drought.

Still another formidable problem is that of the Reich's relation to the rest of the world. The meeting of Mussolini and Hitler at Venice, it is pretty generally admitted now in informed circles, was not howling success.

The Austrian situation remains complicated.

Great Britain is in an unpleasant frame of mind because of the debts transfer question. Soviet Russia is more reserved than ever since Hitler refused to sanction a non-aggression pact with her.

In America the religious and Jewish questions stand in the way of more cordial relations.

With this multiplicity of problems facing him Hitler during the ensuing month will encounter a supreme test of his statesmanship.

**REBEL UNION EXPANDS**

PORTLAND, Ore., June 28.—(AP)—Extension into the state of Washington of the organization of a group of longshoremen who are willing to return to work under proper police protection was announced here today by the Columbia River Longshoremen's Association.

This group, numbering its sponsors say, as many as 350 active longshoremen, was recently incorporated in Oregon. The Washington unit, to be recognized as the "Washington Longshoremen's Protective Association," already is organized in five Washington ports, the Portland leaders said, and a charter is to be applied for at once in Olympia.

The purpose of the Washington association, the Portland announcement said, is to rid longshoremen of the "dominance of the working majority of non-workers in the International Longshoremen's Association," and to represent to the federal government that only men who were actively engaged in longshore work on May 9, when the strike was called, should now have a chance to vote on settlement proposals.
