

SCORCHING HEAT SEARS MID-WEST; SCORES STRICKEN

(By the Associated Press)

More than a score of deaths were attributed today to scorching temperatures that scorched much of the continent from the Rockies to the Atlantic seaboard. Generally speaking, no immediate relief was in sight.

Of the mid-western states, Iowa apparently was the hardest hit, with six deaths, three due to prostrations and three to drownings. A maximum of 107 degrees was reached at Waterloo.

Many of the victims in other states died when they took to the water to escape the baking heat. Nebraska counted three dead; Illinois one; Maryland three; Michigan four; Ohio four; western Pennsylvania three; and Indiana two.

An all time heat record of 112 was registered at Mattoon, Ill., while in Chicago, when one person died from the heat and scores were prostrated, the mercury hit 90—a new high for the date.

In the Pittsburgh district records of 40 years' standing went tumbling, and Franklin, Pa., saw a reading of 101, the hottest in its history.

Kansas City's high was 101. Cleveland 100, a record; Cincinnati, 101; Detroit, 104; and Washington, D. C., 93.

Prunes Still Going To Foreign Marts

PORTLAND, June 28.—(AP)—Although the recent flurry of early prunes buying on contract in Oregon appears to have subsided somewhat, trading continues with England and the Scandinavian countries, on the basis of reports in the trade. It is said the hope of securing business in Germany is lost for the time being, because of restricted imports permitted by that country, and because the dollar exchange has practically eliminated business.

Crop conditions in Oregon continue very good and the present idea is for a crop of 30,000 tons compared with 20,000 tons a year ago. Present prices asked for Oregon prunes generally are around 8c for 30/40s; 5 1/2c for 40/50s, and 5 1/4c for 50/60s, although some business has been confirmed below these figures.

The Angels supported Garland's 7-hit tossing with some healthy clouting when it was needed, bunching their hits in the third, sixth, seventh and eighth innings for all nine runs. Jimmy Reese, Los Angeles second baseman, rapped out a triple and single.

A fast ninth inning double play, Doerr to Levey to Jacobs, stopped an Oakland rally that threatened to tie the score and gave Hollywood its third win 5-4. The Oaks got to
