HARRISBURG, June 29.—(Special.)—Several changes in the Methodist appointments are of interest to Harrisburg readers. First is the appointment to Harrisburg of Rev. Francis Kinch formerly of the Andes mission conference of South America. Shedd and Harrisburg have been combined and Rev. Kinch will preach at both places, probably at Harrisburg at night and at Shedd in the morning. He will live at Shedd. Harrisburg was united with Haley once but in recent years it has had a minister of its own. Rev. T. B. Mitner, who had the work here for six years, has been returned to the Patton church at Port land, where he has been pastor four years. Rev. W. B. Empey, who was assigned to Harrisburg two years ago but changed to Junction City-River view, was returned to Junction City. Rev. C. R. Mitchell, minister here for the past year, has been sent to

Sutherland-Wilbur. Rev. K. K. Clark, here for a year prior to C. R. Mitchell's coming, was returned to the West Salem circuit. Rev. J. Thomas Cowley is now in Newberg recuperating in health and did not try for a place. He was here three years ago. Rev. Edwin Rounds, Harrisburg minister four years ago, is now in Chicago, studying and preaching. The Harrisburg ball team now has fifth place in the Linn County league after losing the Shedd game Sunday. The score was 8 to 5 in a ten-inning game. The Brownsville team seems likely to be the top notcher at the end of the season. Its standing is now .000, with Sweet Home coming next, its standing being .518. Miss Marjorie Wilhelm has the support of Harrisburg in her race for queen of the Oregon Trail celebration at Eugene. She was born and reared here until moving to Eugene nine years ago. Hugh Sherill, mail carrier, has been seriously ill for several days. Albert Windell has returned from
