

MIDNIGHT APPEAL MAY SAVE WOMAN FROM 'HOT CHAIR'

OSSINING, N. Y., June 29.—(AP)—A story that came tumbling from the lips of a condemned man even as the hour set for his death was striking, has saved Anna Antonio—for at least a day—from the electric chair.

"She's absolutely innocent of the murder of her husband," said Vincent Satta.

Warden Laws, into whose ear as they sat together last night in the death house Satta whispered his story, telephoned Governor Lehman at Albany. For more than half an hour they talked. Midnight had passed when the governor issued a brief statement:

"I have directed the warden of Sing Sing prison to postpone the execution of Mrs. Anna Antonio, Vincent Satta and Samuel Peraci until Friday night, June 30, in order that I may have time to study and consider a long statement made by Satta."

This he postponed—though only for a day—the execution of the woman and two men who were convicted of hiring to kill her husband, Salvatore, for his \$50,000 insurance money.

Whether Satta's death house statement was just a gallant gesture to have a woman's life or whether it was the solemn truth, spoken by a man about to die, Governor Lehman is to decide today. If he finds it false, the three die tonight.

argument," Mr. Magludry said. "I don't think any of our mills are making any money, but we are giving the men employment and making enough to pay their wages and that certainly is something."

In discussing fire protection in forests of Oregon, Mr. Magludry declared that Oregon has the best protective law in the union and that with its incorporation in the code, the forests of this state are better protected than ever.

There are three phases of the timber protection problem, he declared. There are the protection from disease, the conservation of young trees and reforestation.

In discussing the first phase, he pointed to the great damage done

by the pine beetle in eastern Oregon and said a similar bug was beginning to work on fir trees. Protection against this pest must be an important element in preserving our forests, he said.

As to conservation of young trees, he pointed out that in heavy logging operations it was impossible to protect young trees which would be killed in the process of logging. The only practical way of saving these young trees is by leaving whole patches of timber, he said.

He pointed out that this country enjoys a natural reforestation. While the government program suggests leaving trees along streams and on top of ridges, Magludry reminded the group that when a lumberman buys timber, he pays for all trees in a tract of land and that there must be some compensation for him if he is forced to leave some trees.

Prior to Mr. Magludry's talk, three candidates for Oregon Trail queen were introduced. Hugh W. Reynolds introduced Princess Yvonne, candidate of the labor group; Mark Huth introduced Princess Jo, candidate of the Business and Professional women and veteran groups; and Marion Veatch introduced Princess Marjorie, candidate of fraternal organizations.

Nearly 100 persons attended the meeting.

SEATTLE, June 29.—(AP)—An order extending approval of present minimum mill prices of lumber for an indefinite time beyond July 1 has been issued by Administrator Johnson, the West Coast Lumbermen's association was advised today by the Lumber Code authority.

A price revision to become effective on July 1 had been planned but was postponed because inter-divisional correlation of the revised lists could not be completed in time.

SALEM, June 29.—(AP)—Effective July 1, it will be necessary for all campers who intend to build fires at other than designated camp grounds, to secure campfire permits before entering any national forest in the state, with the exception of the Siuslaw, it was announced today by proclamation of Governor Julius L. Meier.

Campers must refrain from smoking except on surfaced highways and carry tools suitable for fire fighting, consisting of a shovel, axe and bucket, the proclamation stated.
