SPRINGFIELD, June 30.—(Special)—Many Springfield residents drove to the scene of the S. P. freight train wreck on the Cascade line near Jasper Saturday morning. Reports were first received here that several men were killed. The account of the accident is only five or six miles from Springfield.

County Cannery to Operate On Tuesday

SPRINGFIELD, June 30.—(Special)—The county cannery, which was scheduled to begin operations in Springfield Monday, will not be here until Tuesday, according to word received Saturday by I. M. Peterson, city recorder. It will operate here only one day.

There is very little produce now ready to be canned and that was given as the reason for shortening the run of the cannery in this city. String beans are hardly far enough advanced and peas have been scarce on account of the blight that struck them this year. The berry season is nearly over and there is little else to can except beets. However, it is expected that a pretty busy day will be spent by the canning crew here.

The plant will operate on the vacant lot on Main street opposite the office of the Mountain States Power company. The needy families to be assisted are to furnish their own fruit and vegetables and assistance in canning operations.

Body of Accident Victim Brought In

SPRINGFIELD, June 30.—(Special)—Herman Keeler of Portland, who was with Victor Vunsch at the time the latter was killed when a hit and run car struck him on the highway near Goshen Friday evening, was brought to Springfield and cared for by Mrs. C. F. Eggiman and later sent to the home of the Sullivan family at West Springfield.

The young man was badly unnerved by the accident. He expressed appreciation for the kindness of the people of Springfield. He said he and Vunsch were on the way to California where they expected to obtain work. The body of Vunsch was first brought to the Poole-Gray-Bartholomew chapel here.

And so the inescapable conclusion is—business must use printing and advertising or perish.
