

"Finishing School" At Heilig; McDonald Shows "Murder At The Vanities"

"Death Takes a Holiday" Is State Attraction; March, Venable Star

Boris Karloff, creator of the screen roles of Frankenstein and the Mummy, dispenses even more chilling and thrilling excitement in "The Ghoul," which moved into the Colonial theater Friday night for a 3-day engagement. The story, by Frank King and Leonard Hines, concerns the stealing of a remarkable jewel from a famous Egyptian tomb and the strange man's recovery.

In the capable hands of T. Hayes Hunter, the story has been cleverly directed and the picture is said to provide an abundance of thrills, many of a spine-chilling nature.

The atmosphere of sinister mystery created by masterly lighting effects stand out prominently in the brilliantly clever photography of G. Krampf. Karloff's make-up is considered the last word in monstrous appearance, particularly when he arises from the "tomb."

This is a hair-raising scene if ever there was one.

The acting of Karloff's supporting cast is uniformly excellent, with outstanding performances given by Ernest Thesiger, Cedric Hardwicke, Harold Huth, Clarke Smith, Dorothy Hymson and Anthony Bushell.

A new sort of heroine is presented in "Finishing School," RKO-Radio picture opening today at the Heilig, which shows her as a victim of a so-called smart boarding school. The picture calls for tense dramatic treatment and an appealing love interest.

Frances Dee, Billie Burke, Ginger Rogers, Bruce Cabot and John Halliday are featured at the head of a large cast of players, who are called upon to enact a story full of realism and punch.

The plot involves the trying plight of a young girl who is a student in a boarding school operated by a snobbish, hypocritical woman whose two gods are money and "face."

Ill-advised, and neglected by her society-mad mother, she becomes involved in a romance with a young medical intern.

Suspicious of an affair between the girl and this man, who is outside the select social circles, the head of the school tricks the girl into revealing her secret, and from this point on the plot develops in a string of dramatic episodes until the final scene.

Subtle understanding in the direction of Wanda Tuckwell and George Nicholls, Jr., has made the picture an appealing cavalcade of a young girl's dawn womanhood.

"Murder at the Vanities," the Paramount film adapted from Earl Carroll's stage hit, and which combines for the first time, a brilliant musical show and a murder mystery, comes Sunday to the McDonald theater.

Paramount brought Carroll to Hollywood to supervise the screen production, and he took eleven of his famous New York beauties to Hollywood to appear in the film. After he arrived he then picked seven Hollywood girls to be his eleven, and the eighteen are featured with Carl Brisson, Victor McLaglen, Jack Oakie, Kitty Carlisle, Duke Ellington and his famous orchestra, Dorothy Stickney and Gertrude Michael.

While girls are dancing and singing, and while the audience is in tune with the frivolity of the evening, a mysterious murder takes place. Victor McLaglen, detective pal of Oakie, the theater's press agent, is called and he is no sooner in the theater than a second and more mysterious murder is committed.

The musical show is permitted to proceed, and the film audience sees, out-front, all of the production numbers, while, backstage, the mystery is solved by the final curtain.
