\$5000 Budget Voted For Greenleaf School

GREENLEAF, June 30.—(Special)—At the annual meeting of the Triangle district at Blachly, George Worthington was re-elected director and Mrs. A. W. Graham was elected clerk. The voters present considered the budget that the directors had prepared. It called for a levy of over \$5000 and exceeded the six per cent limit but was passed unanimously. The chairman read a summary of the county unit law that was sent out by the county superintendent and invited discussion. After several present had pointed out the discrepancies between the summary and the law as enacted, also the difficulty of ever repealing the law if carried, the lack of local control of the schools, and the opposition of the grant to the measure, those present unanimously cast a vote to oppose this proposed law.
