The Portland Eagles will journey to Eugene today for their second game of the season with the Eugene Townies. The game will start promptly at 2:30. The first combat between these two teams was won by Eagles by the score of 5 to 3, and the Townies will be out to avenge this defeat.

Phillips will probably receive the pitching assignment for the Eagles, and it was he that beat the Townies in their first engagement; Kauffman receiving for Phillips. Kauffman was a member of the St. Louis Cardinals when Frisco Edwards was umpiring there some two or three years ago. Dick Garber, coach at Roosevelt high in Portland, will probably be used at shortstop or second base.

Teams Are Tied
Last Sunday both the Townies and Eagles lost and are now tied in the state league standings. This is the fourth consecutive home game for the Townies, and before they take to the road, will play Albany here, making five home games in a row.

Jack Van Duyn who has been away at the National Guard camp, will again be in the Townies lineup and probably will play some where in the Eugene outfield. So far the Eugene infield has been clicking in fairly good shape, but the outfield has not been doing as well, either from a defensive or offensive standpoint. Coach, recently returned from the National University of Oregon, is rapidly recovering from his knee injury and as soon as he recovers will probably be used at shortstop or second base. However, his leg is not sufficiently recovered to allow him to make the pivots and turns he is forced to make at second, so will probably be used at third in today's game.

Skipper Reinhardt has been putting his proteges through three hard work-outs during the past week. Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and they should be in the best shape of the season.

The Eagles ball club is made up pretty largely of Portland high school stars and ex-stars, and also members of the present Columbia University baseball squad.

NORTHWEST OPEN IS SLATED MONDAY

PORTLAND, June 30.—(AP)—Outstanding professional and amateur golfers of the Pacific Coast states and British Columbia looked toward Portland today where the Pacific Northwest open golf championship will be decided Monday and Tuesday.

More than 60 have joined what promises to be a record entry. The pro-amateur championship tomorrow will be preliminary to the main tournament. In the preliminary 18-hole competition Sunday afternoon amateurs will be allowed three-fourths of their club handicaps.

The championship proper will see 36 holes of golf each day. Amateur contestants will be allowed their full handicaps in the 72-hole championship.

Al Zimmerman's transition to professional ranks finds many pretenders to his abdicated title as Northwest amateur champion. The Simon pure fighting for the crown will include Eddie Hogan and Scotty Campbell of Seattle; Dr. C. F. Willing, Johnny Robbins, Dr. Cliff Baker and Arlo Kyle and Tab Boyer of Portland.

Jimmie Johnson and Gordon Richards, Tacoma pros, played the course today. Johnson had a par-bettering 70 for his first trip around.

Professionals entered included Steve Crockett of Salem and Bill Hackney of Klamath Falls.

Amateurs entered included George C. Beecher of Woodburn.

Considerable comment has been heard here of late over the choice of Joe Cronin as manager of the American League All-Stars and Bill Terry in the same role for the National League. Many Eugene baseball fans have wondered at the decision which ruled out such old baseball hands as Connie Mack and Bill McKechnie. Alan Gould, Associated Press sports editor, has some interesting comments to make in regard to the situation. They follow:

I have no direct means of knowing just what happened, nor is it likely that any of the parties involved would care to enter a personal discussion of the matter, but I would not be surprised if the boss of the New York Giants said something about as follows to the boss of the National League recently:

"John, when you are making up your mind who to name as manager of the all-star National League team, please do not forget that we have a comparatively young man in our employ, Mr. Bill Terry, who has demonstrated the satisfaction of one and all that he is the best manager in the big leagues right now."

"I realize all about this rule of seniority and that there are a number of men older in the business of managing ball clubs than my Mr. Bill Terry. But who can say there are any wiser or more successful managers? Mr. McGraw, who managed your team last year, is dead. There is no one of his stature and reputation left to consider. But there is Mr. Will Terry, who learned the game under McGraw, and within the time afforded him to show results so far has done all that could possibly be asked. I recommend him to you as the best and most logical man to take the responsibilities of leadership."

All this, as I say, is mere supposition but something of the sort must have happened, behind the scenes, to prompt the decision by both leagues to shift rapidly from the older heads, such as Connie Mack and Bill McKechnie, to the youthful player-managers, Joe Cronin and Bill Terry.

In one sense, it is the easy way out. It avoids the possible jealousies and arguments, although I cannot imagine anyone in the American League objecting to having the venerable Mr. Mack again occupy the dean's chair in the dugout for the all-star activities. Nor for that matter, would there be any disposition to begrudge McKechnie the reins for the National League, inasmuch as he is the senior pilot.

The choice of Terry and Cronin, however, sets a precedent. It is fair enough, too, as a reward to the men who prove the most successful leaders. As for managing a team of stars such as each league will put on the field at the Polo Grounds, July 10, maybe the bat-boys could do it.

3 WORLD RECORDS SMASHED IN A. A. U. MARQUETTE MEET

MILWAUKEE, June 30.—(AP)—In a thunderbolt finish that stirred the emotions of 17,000 sweltering spectators, Princeton's Bill Bonthron, smooth, clean-shaven and gun, conquered his arch rival, Glenn Cunningham of Kansas, in the 1500 meter run today to smash all existing records for the distance.

Bonthron came from behind to defeat Cunningham, holder of the world's record for the one mile run, and provide a dramatic thrill for the 47th national A. A. U. outdoor track and field championship in which three records were broken.

Records Tumbled
The hot, sultry afternoon, with a temperature of around 90 on the Marquette university field, saw records fall like chaff in the wind. After the day's competition was over, three world's marks had been broken, nine meet records had been broken, and another was tied.

The New York Athletic club, the defending champions, won the team championship by amassing 46 7-12 points with the Olympic club of San Francisco second with 35 and Louisiana State third with 18. Marquette trailed fourth, with 15, and Boston A. fifth with 12.

Torrance Smashes Mark
Jack Torrance of Louisiana State university, 285 pounds, 6 foot, four inch son of the Bayous, tossed the 16-pound shot to a new world's record of 35 feet, inches on his very first attempt. He eclipsed his own record of 35 feet 1 1/4 inches, set at the Drake relays two months ago. Glen Hardin, a teammate of Torrance, smashed the world's record in the 400 meter hurdles, winning the event in 51.8 to wipe out the old mark of 52 established by F. Morgan Taylor in 1928.

Ralph Metcalfe, Marquette's great negro sprinter, achieved the distinction of winning both the 100 and 200 meter races for the third successive year, tying the record of Bernie Weller, coach of the New York A. C., who in 1905, 1906 and 1907 won the national A. A. U. sprints.

EASTMAN EASY WINNER
Metcalfe also ran as anchor man on Marquette's winning relay team in the 400 meter event.

The heralded duel between Ben Easton, former Stanford half miler, and Charles Horsthoel of Indiana, failed to materialize. They hooked up in the 500 meter run, but Horsthoel never was a dangerous contender, finishing third with Eastman winning by twenty yards in 1:50.4 to establish a new meet record.

Ralston Legere's 216 feet, 9 1/2 inch throw of the javelin was sufficient to win that event for North Carolina.

PRESCOTT SR. WINS LAURELWOOD MEET

Robert Prescott, Sr., won the Laurelwood team tournament held during the past month and a half at the Laurelwood golf course, scoring a 4 and 2 victory over Clarence Sutton in the championship match. Earle Curtis, Prescott, Jim O'Connell and Sutton were quarter-finalists.

Roy Graham won the first flight, beating out Harold Henry, while Bob Stevenson defeated Doc Swennes for second flight honors. The matches were both close and hard-fought.

The third flight went to Tom Wright, with a victory over D. Crow. Fifty golfers entered the big tourney, and it was originally slated to last but a month. Postponements, however, strung it out until the present.

Winners and runners-up in each flight received prizes of golf balls.

"In addition to the no-time-limit main event between Castillo and McGuire, I expect to line up three 30-minute bouts, all of which should be plenty hot."

Herb announced the semi-windup, and it's to be Pug Ryan, the tough, heavily muscled lad from the south, against Jack Curtis, the handsome New Mexico bone twister. Ryan had some difficulty with Noel Franklin last week, but that is attributed to Franklin's great amateur experience. Neither Ryan or Curtis have ever appeared under amateur rules, and the bout should be a sensational battle.

The main event is, in the opinion of many local experts, the outstanding bit of match-making Owen has achieved here in several months. Both McGuire and Castillo are lightning fast, brilliant wrestlers, and possessed of a large repertoire of holds. Neither goes in for tough stuff, and their bout will be decided purely on a basis of clever wrestling.

The two met in a 45-minute semi-windup some two weeks ago, with Castillo surviving an Indian death-blow to eke out a victory, after winning the only fall with a rolling key-arm scissors. Fans are still raving about the match, and it was by popular request that Owen re-matched them.

Both, too, will be fighting to regain the top of the local wrestling heap. McGuire lost to Teddy Waters last Thursday, while Castillo dropped a decision to Bulldog Jackson when his arm was dislocated. Each hopes to win Thursday's match in order to challenge the two rough and tough boys.

The last meeting of McGuire and Castillo attracted so much attention that Owen plans to install the big bleachers for Thursday's card, and fans are urged to make reservations early. Capacity or near-capacity crowds have been in evidence for the last two weeks, and Thursday promises to be no exception.
